

our history is your history

You are the latest in a long line of people from all parts of the world who have come to live here over many thousands of years.

The first people were the Kaurna people (pronounced 'ghana'), who occupied the Adelaide Plains. Records show that groups of Kaurna people in the Burnside region lived by the creeks, harvested local animals and plants and held ceremonies with dancing and singing. From 1836, when the first official British settlers came to the colony of South Australia, many hoped to take up land in this beautiful region of Burnside. Within a few years, the Kaurna people had been largely dispossessed of their traditional lands.

The new population's growing demand for farmland resulted in the establishment of large landholdings. In addition to general farm produce, olives, grapevines and fruit trees were grown and became important for the emerging colony. By the 1870s the villages of Magill, Burnside, Beaumont and Glen Osmond were established to serve this rural area, which was later to become modern-day Burnside.

The name Burnside originated in 1839 from a Scottish migrant, Peter Anderson, who farmed land adjacent to Second Creek. Anderson named his property *Burnside* using the Scottish word *burn*, which means creek or river, signifying his farm's location alongside the Creek.

Soon, Glen Osmond became home to Australia's first metalliferous mine, named Wheal Gawler - 'wheal' being the Cornish name for mine. This mine operated from 1841-51 and produced lead and silver. A neighbouring mine, Wheal Watkins mine (operated 1844-50) can be seen in Wheal Gawler Reserve today. Its remains, along with the smelting chimney at Glen Osmond, are some of the last physical remnants of the area's early mining history. Evidence of the early stone mines can also be found in Magill Stone Reserve.

Hazelwood Park circa 1900

One of the City of Burnside's major and best-loved reserves indicates life over 100 years ago. The Clark Family lived at Hazelwood from 1853 to 1911 and in 1915 sold the land to the State Government at a concessional rate on the understanding it would be preserved as a public park. In 1964, the land was acquired by the City of Burnside. First Creek flows through the park, lined by beautiful River Red Gums and Blue Gums and occupied by many colourful birds and other wildlife.



The City of Burnside is one of Adelaide's oldest councils, having been established in 1856. In 1869, the Council moved to the purpose-built Council Chambers that still stand on Glynburn Road. The current Town Hall and Council Chambers were opened in 1928, with later additions of the Library, community facilities and the Ballroom. The City of Burnside crest illustrates our city's tradition and heritage. Two early industries are represented: a bunch of grapes for winemaking and a barrel and olive leaves for oil production. The Old Tollhouse in Glen Osmond is also on the crest, which was built in 1841, closed in 1847 and still stands today.

Our cultural and natural history is important to us, as it is the thread that links thousands of years of history of the Kaurna people through to Burnside's rural settlement to the beautiful city of today. Many qualities remain within our city that need to be protected. Among the monuments of our past are the huge old trees and some native vegetation in Hazelwood Park and buildings such as Beaumont House, The Regal Theatre and many interesting and gracious old buildings.

The City of Burnside welcomes new residents from across the world to be part of our continuing history.

Dogs

The following is information about dog laws and your responsibilities, registrations and fees, missing or wandering dogs and microchipping.

- Microchipping all dogs and cats (with limited exceptions) that are over 3 months of age are required to be microchipped.
- Desexing all dogs and cats born after 1 July 2018 must be desexed by the age of six months.
- Dog registration Dog registration is via an online process (not Council process) at www.dogsandcatsonline.com.au
- Breeders a person must no sell a dog or cat they have bred unless they are registered as a breeder with the Dog and Cat Management Board.
- Sellers requirements for certain information to be provided to the buyer for details refer to www.doqsandcatsonline.com.au

If you fail to register your dog you run risk of being fined for an unregistered dog. Your dog must wear its registration disc when off your property.

The registered owner must be a person aged 16 years or over, and that person must notify the Council as soon as possible if:

- The dog is moved to different premises;
- The dog dies, or is missing for more than 72 hours;
- Ownership of the dog is transferred to another person.

Dog registration renewals are sent out in early July and you have until 31 August to pay (after this date, a late fee is added to the registration fee).

Dogs being exercised in a public place, such as a road, footpath or a designated 'dog on leash' area, must be on a lead not exceeding 2 metres in length. In 'dog off leash' parks or reserves dogs must be kept under effective control. Dogs are not permitted in designated 'dog free' areas.



Under the *Dog and Cat Management Act* 1995, effective control is defined as:

- The dog is on a chain, cord or leash that does not exceed 2 metres in length restraining the dog; or
- By command, the dog being in close proximity to the person and the person being able to see the dog at all times.

Dogs and Cats Online is the central database for microchipped and registered dogs and cats and annual registration payments. Register your dog at www.dogsandcatsonline.com.au

Found a dog? Lost a dog?

Phone 8366 4200 – our Rangers will be sent to collect any dog reported and will be able to respond if you have lost your dog.

Should the report be out of normal business hours (8.30 am - 5 pm) the matter can still be reported on this number and attended to by our after hours service.

We recommend you also contact:

- The Animal Welfare League on 8348 1300
- Local veterinary clinics
- You may also consider placing notices on public notice boards, or doing a letter box drop in your local area (please do not place signs on the stobie poles).

To make sure you are reunited with your dog as soon as possible, please ensure your dog always wears its collar and registration tag, and if microchipped, your details are kept up to date. It is also a good idea to have a disc on their collar with the dog's name, your phone number and current address.



Cats

The City of Burnside encourages cat owners to be responsible by ensuring their cats don't create a nuisance by straying into neighbour's properties or by attacking wildlife.

The *Dog and Cat Management Act* requires: mandatory microchipping of cats and desexing of cats born after 1 July 2018.

If you lose your cat please phone 8366 4200 so we can let our Rangers know. Should the report be out of normal business hours (8.30 am - 5 pm) the matter can still be reported on this number and attended to by our after hours service.

Vermin Control

Rats are widespread throughout the metropolitan area and in our community. It is almost impossible to completely eradicate them. However, this does not mean that we should just accept rats, as there are certain things that householders can do to reduce the problem.

Trapping and poisoning will kill rats on the premises, but this is only a temporary measure as rats will return if favourable conditions for existence persist. For complete extermination and protect against reinfestation, rats must be deprived of food and shelter.

Ensure that all food scraps, poultry and animal food are stored in a container with tight fitting lids. If compost bins are used, keep the base of the bin clear of any vegetation and do not throw meat or dog faeces into the compost bin. Where there are fruit and nut trees, regularly clean up any fallen fruit or nuts. If poultry are kept at your property ensure that their yards are kept clear of all waste products and excess feed.

To help prevent nesting, clear house and land of all rubbish and timber, or stack it at least 300mm above the ground and keep all grass cut short around your property.

Mosquitoes

The mosquito is a pest that bites and annoys both humans and animals, but some species also have the potential to spread disease.

With the possibility of contracting Ross River Virus from mosquitoes present in South Australia, mosquito control is an issue of high importance. The best way to control mosquitoes is to prevent them from breeding.

As mosquitoes breed in water you can help reduce the number of mosquitoes in your area by removing or treating water storages around your property. Popular breeding sites include containers that hold water such as rainwater tanks, neglected swimming pools, bases of pot plants, tyres, buckets, blocked guttering, ornamental ponds, fountains or bird baths and pet bowls.

European Wasps

European wasps are attracted to sweet foods and meat and are commonly a nuisance at outdoor eating events and barbeques. The European wasp is identifiable by: its black and yellow body; its yellow legs and triangular markings on the abdomen. Do not aggravate a European wasp if detected on your property!

What if you are stung?

Unlike a bee, wasps can sting repeatedly. Apply an ice-cold pack to a sting to relieve the fiery pain and red swelling. Take oral analgesics if SEVERE pain occurs.

Multiple stings to the face or neck can lead to severe swelling and/or allergic reaction. If this occurs and the person has difficulty breathing contact an ambulance, hospital or doctor.

As a resident within the City of Burnside you have the right and responsibility to ensure that the City is a safe and healthy place to live.

The Eastern Health Authority (EHA) provides a wide range of environmental health services to the community in the eastern and inner northern suburbs of Adelaide.

To protect people's health and wellbeing, the Authority's main functions include provision of immunisation services, surveillance of food safety, sanitation and disease control, and licensing of supported residential facilities.


Domestic waste collection services for the City of Burnside are largely managed by East Waste, including recyclables, organic waste and waste for landfill.

Each rateable property in the City of Burnside is entitled to:

- One bin for kitchen and garden organic waste (green lid)
- One bin for recyclables (yellow lid)
- One bid for waste-to-landfill (red lid)
- One kitchen organics baskets
- An annual supply of compostable bags (150 bags)

The compostable bags and kitchen organics baskets are available from the customer desk at the Burnside Civic Centre. You can find information about Burnside waste collection on the East Waste website eastwaste.com.au/city-of-burnside/or contact East Waste directly on 8347 5111.

The waste section of "My Local Services" app includes quick access to waste collection dates. The app also includes "Which Bin" information and provides bin collection reminders and helpful recycling tips.

New Bins

New bins can be ordered if no bins have previously been provided to the property. Residents can order a standard or varied suite of bins for their property. Applications for new bins are managed by East Waste. Residents can contact East Waste for assistance on 8347 5111. The new Bin Service request form is available at eastwaste.com.au/city-of-burnside

Purchase of additional bins

Residents can request additional recycling or green organics bins. Fees and charges are applicable for additional bins (see the request form). Applications for additional bins are managed by East Waste. Residents can contact East Waste for assistance on 8347 5111. The addition Bin Service request for is available at eastwaste. com.au/city-of-burnside

Lost or stolen bins

Lost or stolen bins can be replaced. The property owner is required to provide a statutory declaration signed by a Justice of Peace (or duly Authorised Officer) in order to secure a new council bin free of charge. Bins damaged by the waste collection contractor or that have a manufacturing fault will be replaced by Council at no cost to the property owner. Bin repairs

Bin repairs may be conducted for bin wheel, axle, lid or hinge issues. In some cases bins may be replaced. Residents should contact East Waste for assistance on 8347 5111. The Bin Repair Request form is available online at eastwaste.com.au/city-ofburnside/

Bin not emptied (missed services)

If your bin(s) are placed out for collection but are not emptied, please contact East Waste immediately. If you contact East Waste before 12 noon your bins will be collected on that same day. Contact East Waste on 8347 5111 for all missed bin collections. You can also report missed bins through the My Local Services App.



Requests to change bin sizes

Each property will be supplied with a standard suite of bins. This includes a 140 lt red lid bin, a 240 lt yellow lid and 240 lt green lid bin. Residents can request to have the size of their organics and recycling bins changed to the smaller 140 lt option to suit your circumstances. Fees and charges are applicable for changing bins (see the request form). Applications for changing bins are managed by East Waste. You can contact East Waste for assistance on 8347 5111. Surrendering unwanted bins

If you no longer require your Council provided bin(s) you can return them. To surrender unwanted bins, residents can contact East Waste directly on 8347 5111.





Graffiti Management

Graffiti occurring on public property needs to be removed as quickly as possible. Rapid removal has shown to reduce the likelihood of reoccurrence. Council's graffiti volunteers aim to have all offensive graffiti removed from Council property within two days and non-offensive within five working days.

How to report graffiti?

Residents who have graffiti on their property can lodge a service request on Action Burnside at action.burnside.sa.gov.au or contact Customer Service on 8366 4200 and report the details of the graffiti including:

- size and colour
- · the type of surface that has been defaced, and
- · whether they are the owners of the property.

Prior to removing the graffiti the owner of the property must sign a Consent Form giving permission for Council to assist. Depending on the type of surface affected, the graffiti will either be painted over or removed using proven substances and high pressure water spray.

Damage to Infrastructure

Council maintains a wide variety of infrastructure which includes stormwater drains, roads, kerbing, car parks, footpaths, lights, signs, playgrounds, reserves and many more. If you notice any damaged infrastructure, please report it to our Customer Service Centre on 8366 4200 or via Action Burnside at action.burnside. sa.gov.au to lodge a service request so we can investigate the damage and log it onto our Works Program.

Street Lighting

In most instances, SA Power Networks (SAPN) maintains public street lighting on behalf of Council and Department of Planning, Transport and Infrastructure. To report a faulty street light, please contact SAPN on 1800 676 043 or visit their website https://slo-apps.sapowernetworks. com.au with the exact location of the faulty light. A small number of street lights are still maintained by Council. In this instance SAPN will advise Council on your behalf.

Council maintains public lighting in public areas such as reserves, sporting grounds and public pathways. To report a faulty light, please contact Council at your earliest convenience. Our friendly customer service team will log a request for the light to be repaired or visit our websiteaction.burnside.sa.gov.au and lodge a service request.

Rates can be paid in full by 1 September or in four approximately equal instalments due in the first weeks of September, December, March and June. A new notice is sent out a month before the due date for each instalment. For payment options please refer to your Notice of Rates.

Penalties for late payment still apply if you do not notify Council of your change of details.

It is the driver of a vehicle's responsibility to ensure they are aware of all parking restrictions. The Australian Road Rules are available at legislation.sa.gov.au or visit our website burnside.sa.gov.au

Some offences are not so well-known. Here are some examples.

Parking on narrow roads

Narrow roads are a frequent occurrence in the City of Burnside with approximately 30 per cent of Council's roads considered narrow (less than 7 metres wide).


When vehicles park directly opposite each other on narrow roads the remaining width is typically insufficient for many cars to pass, and may not allow access for larger vehicles such as fire trucks, ambulances and waste collection trucks.

Australian Road Rule no 208 (7)

You must position your vehicle so that there is at least 3 metres of the road alongside your vehicle enabling other vehicles to pass. Expiation notices may be given to vehicles that park too close to another vehicle.

Australian Road Rule no 208 (8)

You must position the vehicle so your vehicle does not unreasonably obstruct the path of other vehicles or pedestrians. Expiation notices may be given to vehicles that unreasonably obstruct the path of other vehicles or pedestrians.





Driveways

Australian Road Rule no 198 (2)

You must not park your vehicle on or across a driveway (even partially), even if the driveway is to your own property.

You are allowed to stop across a driveway only if you are dropping off, or picking up passengers, do not leave the vehicle unattended and complete the dropping off, or picking up within 2 minutes of stopping. Expiations notices will be given to vehicles that park across driveways.






Parking near solid white lines

Australian Road Rule no 208 (6)


If the road has a continuous dividing line (solid white line) or a dividing strip, you must position your vehicle at least 3 metres from the continuous dividing line or dividing strip. Expiation notices will be given to vehicles that park too close to a solid white line or dividing strip.



Parking on the Council verge (nature strips)

Australian Road Rule no 197 (1)


For the safety of, and as a courtesy to, pedestrians, and for the better maintenance of your environment, you must not park (even partially) on footpaths or the nature strip. Expiation notices will be given to vehicles that park on the Council verge.



Parking near an intersection Australian Road Rule no 170 (3)

You must not stop within 10 metres from the nearest point of an intersecting road at an intersection without traffic lights.


The rule also includes laneways which are classed as a road for Australian Road Rule purposes. Expiation notices will be given to vehicles that park too close to an intersection.



No stopping on a road with a yellow edge line

Australian Road Rule no 169

You must not park or stop at the side of a road marked with a continuous yellow edge line. Expiation notices will be given to vehicles that stop on a yellow line.

No Stopping


To 'stop' a vehicle means to stop and remain stationary for even a short period of time. You must not stop or park your vehicle in any area where a 'No Stopping' sign or a continuous yellow edge line applies, even to pick up or set down passengers or goods.



No Parking

You must not park your vehicle in an area where a 'No Parking' sign applies, unless:

- you are dropping off or picking up passengers or goods; and
- you do not leave the vehicle unattended
 that is, move more than 3 metres away; and
- you complete the dropping off or picking up as soon as possible – in any case, within two minutes.

our heritage is your heritage

You are moving into a district with a rich heritage, with creeks lined with old River Red Gums, bluestone cottages, historic mining remains and sites of significance to the Kaurna people, the traditional owners of the Adelaide Plains. The City of Burnside is proud of its heritage and is committed to preserving it.

When the first official British settlers moved to the area and the land was surveyed and sold, landowners changed the natural landscape of open grassy woodlands. They established farms and built grand homes, like *Undelcarra, Benacre* and *Woodley House,* as well as small cottages, many of which still stand today. Remnants of their orchards, gardens, vineyards and olive groves can be found in Burnside. Our early mining and business heritage can also be visited, particularly in the areas of Glen Osmond and Magill.

Our heritage is reflected in many of the houses, streetscapes, large trees and parks. These include Hazelwood Park, Kensington Gardens Reserve and Tusmore Park and our reserves within the Hills Face Zone. A State Heritage-listed River Red Gum is one of the largest trees in Australia and can be found growing on Glynburn Road.





You can learn more about the history of the City of Burnside in books such as Elizabeth Warburton's *The Paddocks Beneath:* A *History of Burnside from the Beginning,* through our video series 'Our History', and through information available in the Local History Room in our Library. We have a Historical and Cultural Officer on staff who can also help you with research.

The Burnside Historical Society runs above-ground tours of one of the historic mines, conducts walks through historic areas and holds monthly meetings with guest speakers in the Civic Centre. Brochures for some of these walks are available online at www.burnside.sa.gov.au. The Burnside Historical Society also has a website and Facebook page. You can find out about the National Trust, State Heritage buildings and the monthly tours of Beaumont House at nationaltrust.org.au/sa and sa.gov.au websites.





At the City of Burnside we value our trees highly. Trees add character to our landscape, preserve biodiversity, and provide shade, shelter and habitat.

You can learn about Burnside's trees on our Urban Forest Interactive website. Thousands of street and park trees have been identified, valued and mapped: trees.burnside.sa.gov.au/

Council's Arboriculture team manages approximately 30,000 street trees and 10,000 reserve trees so that Burnside residents receive all the benefits trees bring to the City, including:

- · increasing property values
- creating a distinctive character for Burnside
- cooling urban areas, including parks, streets and our homes
- providing habitat for wildlife, including koalas and numerous bird species
- improving air quality and reducing particulate matter in the air
- reducing and cleaning stormwater runoff.

Council has a number of significant, memorial and landmark trees throughout its streets and reserves. Many of these trees have historic and cultural relevance and may have been planted to signify a person or an event.

Council recognises the enormous value that its trees provide to the city and has developed robust policy and strategy documents that guide tree management practices to retain this asset for future generations.

Street tree maintenance includes replacing dead and dying trees and pruning to manage hazards and maintain the amenity of the City.

Trees are pruned to:

- remove dangerous branches
- · reduce fire risk
- allow people and traffic to pass under the branches freely
- allow enough space underneath branches when they are near buildings
- improve their health
- · ensure they don't block traffic signs.

You can help Council care for its street trees by providing any of the trees surrounding your property with a regular drink of water in the hotter months of the year by watering the verge surrounding its trunk.

Trees of a certain 'significant' size may be Regulated or protected under State legislation.

The City of Burnside has a Regulated and Significant Tree Assistance Scheme available for residents upon application. This scheme is for financial assistance for the maintenance of a regulated or significant tree.

The City of Burnside is renowned for its green and leafy environment and Council is committed to managing our precious natural assets.

Burnside is still home to many native plants and animals but the natural woodlands and grasslands that once supported them have almost been lost.

By looking after the native plants of Burnside we are providing food and shelter for wildlife, including small birds, butterflies and lizards.

What Council does

We aim to conserve and manage remnant local native plants where they occur on council land in both the urban areas, creeks and in the hills face reserves.

Depending on the needs of the site, we remove invasive weed species, allow natural regeneration and establish indigenous plants grown from locally collected seed.

Some of the weeds that are displacing native plants and animals are trees and shrubs that have escaped from gardens. Examples are olive, pine, buckthorn and hawthorn. Do not be concerned about the gradual removal of these plants as they have little habitat value and constitute a major fire hazard. They are being replaced with indigenous vegetation that is far more useful to native wildlife.



We also:

- propagate local native plants for planting in parks and reserves
- provide advice about the conservation of remnant indigenous trees and native vegetation
- develop and maintain walking trails through the hills face reserves and
- eradicate new weeds, such as Fountain Grass, to prevent them becoming established in Burnside.

We aim to protect, conserve and restore native vegetation and wildlife habitat and, in the hills face areas, to create landscapes which are easier to maintain and are less of a fire hazard.


