### Introduction

Situated at the top end of The Parade, Magill, Penfold Park is a refuge from the surrounding built-up suburbs, with Park users enjoying the large open space, trees and relaxed atmosphere. Courts, playgrounds and a rotunda with a barbecue add to the appeal, while vegetation helps to shield much of the Park from surrounding streets.

Despite the high level of community interest in the Park, it is relatively underutilised when compared to some of the City's other large parks of similar size, including Glenunga Reserve, Bell Yett Reserve, Newland Park and Tusmore Park. This master plan will provide an evidence-based and strategic approach to future works and use, and will ensure that Penfold Park is able to cater to all members of the community now and in the future, as the need for open space increases. Further, the master plan will ensure that future works are not ad hoc, but rather planned and complementary. It will also provide a basis for scheduling works in a financially sustainable way.

The need for a master plan was identified in Council's Open Space Strategy. It has been developed by analysing the following:

- Council's strategies and guides,
- current and future demographics of the area,
- emerging trends and community needs,
- community consultation results, and
- requests from the community relating to the Park in recent years.



Penfold Park is named after Christopher Rawson Penfold, first Chairman of the Burnside District Council in 1856 and founder of the Penfold Winery. The Park, previously known as Penfold Reserve, was redeveloped from a barren space by Council in 1993, after extensive community consultation.

Minimal modifications have occurred since the Park's construction in 1993, apart from a change to the location of the large playground.

In 2019, the toilet block was updated to a semi-automatic version in order to address antisocial behaviour associated with the facility.

In 2019, extensive community consultation explored the idea of developing the City of Burnside's first skate park. Four sites were investigated, including Penfold Park. The site was well-suited to a skate park, and consultation showed that of 754 responses, 397 would use a skate park. Of the four locations, Penfold Park was the second-most popular location, with 291 respondents selecting this as a suitable site, behind Kensington Gardens Reserve. However, due to opposition from a number of residents who live around the site, it was decided not to pursue Penfold Park for a skate park.

## The Park in 2021

At 37,930m<sup>2</sup> Penfold Park is the sixth largest urban park in the City of Burnside. It caters for a range of active and passive recreational opportunities, including walking, tennis, netball and basketball, playgrounds, picnics and relaxing. A toilet and off-street car park provide ease of access to the Park.

### **Key Site Features**



#### **Furniture**


Older style benches and picnic settings are provided throughout the Park.





#### Rotundas

The Park contains two rotundas. The large rotunda is used by walkers as a rest stop, and also for family gatherings and events.



## Drainage area and stone bridge

A drainage basin consisting of a soakage pit and silt trap channels water from the eastern side of the Park. A raised stone bridge ensures pedestrians are able to pass through the Park during heavy rain events.



#### **Pathways**

Pathways provide connections and access points for pedestrians. The main path through the Park from Romalo Avenue to The Parade is paved, while the remaining paths are compacted rubble or dirt.

#### Courts

Two courts are marked for both tennis and netball. The courts are set up for netball during the winter season, and are used by the Morialta Netball Club. They are set up for tennis during the remainder of the year. A basketball hoop and key adjacent the courts is the Park's newest addition.





## Tree groves and lawn area

A key feature of the Park is the large open lawn area, as well as the extensive tree grove, consisting of ornamental pear trees providing a change of colours throughout the seasons. Wellestablished native plants including wattles, eucalypts and Cypress pines are planted along the eastern, western and southern edges of the park, providing shade for park users, and a screen from traffic.





#### Playgrounds

The Park features a small playground catering to young children, and a large playground with more challenging elements for older children. The large playground is covered by a shade sail.





#### Car park

An off-street car park located off The Parade caters to the Park users. Additional on-street parking is available on Romalo Avenue.

## **Strategic Alignment and Trends**

### **Strategic Alignment**

The Burnside 2030 Strategic Community Plan articulates Council's vision, goals and priorities over a 10 year period, and is the overarching guiding document for Council. It helps to direct projects and programs, while also responding to emerging opportunities and challenges. Its three goals are all relevant to the Penfold Park master plan:

- A resilient, healthy and connected community.
- Our city will be a leading environmental custodian.
- A city of accessible and liveable precincts, open spaces and treasured heritage.

This master plan has been prepared as a result of a need identified in the Open Space Strategy, and ongoing suggestions from residents for various improvements at the Park. These suggestions appear to be increasing, likely due to the ageing facilities in the Park, which has remained largely untouched since it was developed in 1993.

The Open Space Strategy suggests that a master plan be prepared for the Park to increase function and capitalise on existing facilities, and to establish the Park as a key district recreation park. The City of Burnside uses the public open space hierarchy to determine the catchment area of any park. The public open space hierarchy has four levels (from smallest to largest): Local, Neighbourhood, District and Regional. Penfold Park is classed as a District park. District parks have the capacity to attract people from more than just the nearby suburbs, due to their size, facilities, quality or level of activity.

For this reason, it is important that Penfold Park is designed to meet the needs of a wide range of visitors, who may come for a variety of reasons, including organised or social sport, dog walking, social events and children's play. The need for the Park to cater to a wide range of users is in line with the Community Land Management Plan, which sets out a series of management objectives for the Park. These management objectives state that a range of recreation opportunities for a variety of users should be provided, to facilitate a high level of use.

The Open Space Strategy lists a number of specific suggestions for improvement at Penfold Park, which have been considered in the development of this master plan. Recommendations include:

- Upgrade, modify and provide additional pathways where required to achieve accessible and appealing routes for walking.
- Provide additional seating to playground areas with increased connections (locate seating to higher side of playground for surveillance).
- Develop shade and review location of playgrounds.
- Provide additional landscape treatments to drainage reserve and detention basin.
- Increase connection to adjoining reserves particularly Romalo Reserve.
- Relocate picnic benches adjacent to playground areas and barbecue.
- Increase seating within gazebo to improve function and usability.
- Consider the development of tennis courts as a 3-on-3 basketball court to increase function and youth activity.

In line with the State Government's 'Game On' framework, it is expected that a revised Sport & Recreation Strategy will have a strong focus on unstructured activities. It is important that Penfold Park encourages members of the community to be involved in unstructured physical activities that suit them. A review of the Sport and Recreation Strategy will occur in 2021/22, subject to the 2021/22 budget process.



## **Strategic Alignment and Trends**

### Demographics

In 2019, it was estimated that the population density for the suburb of Magill was 24.18 persons per hectare, higher than the City of Burnside's average of 16.65 persons per hectare.

In 2016 the dominant household type in the area (Magill, Rosslyn Park, Auldana and Skye) was couple families with dependants, accounting for 34.4 per cent of all households. It is predicted that this trend will continue in 2031 and 2041. For this reason, it is important that Penfold Park contains facilities which can be used by youth and their parents to explore nature and be active, whether this is through unstructured activities on the open grassed areas and playground, or through structured sport on the courts.

While households consisting of families with children is the most populous household type, lone person households are expected to increase by 2031 and again by 2041, when they will make up 27.2 per cent of households in the area. Along with facilities for youth and their families, it is also important to create a space which encourages and provides for intergenerational social opportunities, to ensure that members of the community remain connected.


### **Community Engagement**

To assist with the development of this master plan, community consultation was conducted to determine the key priorities for local residents and users of Penfold Park. Consultation was mailed to houses in surrounding suburbs, and was also available online for any member of the community to complete. To complement this, an information session was held at the Park in October 2020, where members of the public were able to meet with Council staff to ask questions and provide feedback. A second round of consultation on the draft master plan was completed in March 2021. The results form part of an evidence base which has informed the development of the master plan.

The elements of the Park that the community rated in worst condition were lighting, barbecue areas and seating.

## **Principles**

#### Accessible

- Improve pedestrian access through the Park.
- Ensure Disability Discrimination Act (DDA) compliance, allowing safe and convenient access for all.
- Improve connectivity through a network of pathways, to link key Park features.

#### Atmosphere

- Provide a place for all members of the community to enjoy a range of active and passive recreation activities.
- Provide a large open space which people can enjoy and feel safe in.

#### **Family friendly**

- Enhance opportunities for families/friends to gather and socialise.
- Provide park furniture and recreational facilities which allow children and their parents/grandparents/carers to safely play.

#### **Natural setting**

- Maintain and enhance the natural setting, including the open grassed areas, tree plantings, wildlife habitat and linkages, and creek area.
- Provide educational opportunities for Park users to explore and learn about the Park's flora and fauna.
- Use recycled materials where possible in the Park.

#### **Unstructured exercise**

- Offer a range of opportunities for Park users of all ages to engage in unstructured activities that help them be physically active.
- Maintain facilities that promote physical activity to a high standard.




The following table and map indicate future works for Penfold Park, to be conducted from 2021/22 onwards. Each element has been included based on results of the community consultation, maintenance requirements, adherence to relevant Council strategies, policies and plans, staff input, and legislative requirements.

The priorities have been set in a staggered manner, to ensure that there is sufficient budget to accommodate these over coming years. Items will be replaced or installed in line with Asset Management Plans or when budget is allocated through the annual budget process. Elements which are also listed in Council Asset Management Plans, as well as those which rated particularly highly in the community consultation and community expectations, or which have a higher level of risk in their current state, received a higher priority.
