Compostable Wrap

I am very excited that this edition of Focus is wrapped in 100 per cent compostable wrap.

Biodegradable products will break down into smaller pieces eventually - even plastic! But it can take many years or even decades and leaves micro-plastics and harmful substances in the soil. Compostable bags are made of plant materials and break down during the commercial composting process into non-toxic components.

This innovative new wrap creates less waste, is Earth-friendly with no toxic or micro plastic residues and is a sustainable alternative to regular plastic.

I take Council's environmental actions very seriously and am pleased we have sourced compostable wrap. Remember that compostable wrap is suitable for and best disposed of in green lidded Council organics bins.

Council Elections Have Your Say

Council elections will be held in November 2022. This is your opportunity to have your say on who will represent your Council Ward's interests for the next four years. Perhaps you see yourself representing Burnside?

Nominate

If you are eligible to vote in your local council elections, you may also be eligible to stand for a position on the council.

Becoming a Councillor presents the opportunity to influence local directions and create longterm, positive outcomes within the community and for fellow residents.

The role of a councillor is both rewarding and challenging. It requires commitment, responsibility and accountability.

With very few exceptions you can nominate for a position on council regardless of qualifications, religion, race, gender, experience or profession.

The council actively encourages nominations from people from diverse backgrounds to ensure that a wide range of views are represented.

If you consider yourself to be invested in the future of your community, are willing to learn and participate, and are prepared to contribute strategically to decision making processes that benefit the broader community, then you should explore what it takes to be a Councillor.

Nominations will be accepted by the Electoral Commission SA (ECSA) and close at 12 noon on Tuesday 6 September 2022.

Vote

Voting in council elections is now conducted entirely by postal ballot. Residents listed on the voters' roll will receive their ballot papers in the mail in mid to late October 2022. Ballot papers must be returned in the Reply-Paid envelope provided with the ballot papers, by 5 pm on Thursday 10 November 2022. While voting in the council election is not compulsory, I encourage you to exercise your democratic right to ensure you have a say on who your local representatives are. The right to vote is a hard-fought luxury that many others around the world do not get the privilege to experience, and your vote is a powerful tool to ensure your voice is heard within council.

Nature Festival

The Nature Festival is 11 days of events, encounters and experiences to celebrate our love of nature in South Australia. The festival runs from Thursday 6 to Sunday 16 October. The City of Burnside will participate with a number of events and activities.

- An art exhibition 'Life Among Trees'. Last year over 50 artists submitted entries and we are experiencing a stronger response this year.
- The film River will be shown at The Regal Theatre on Sunday 16 October. The movie explores the relationship between humans and rivers. The event will start at 3.30 pm, with the first 30 minutes dedicated to show some winners from the Nature Festival's new Film competition.

Rose Park Memorial

On Peace Day, 19 July 1919, several hundred residents of the District of Burnside gathered at the junction of Prescott Terrace and Alexandra Avenue in Rose Park to plant, dedicate and consecrate the Avenues of Honour.

In 2020, the City of Burnside became aware that not all the fallen World War I soldiers of the Burnside District are recognised on the Memorial. Historical evidence suggests that some residents planted trees for their fallen loved ones, but they did not register the name.

A research group was formed in June 2021, and included Michelle Toft (Historical and Cultural Officer City of Burnside), Colonel Peter Scott DSO Rtd, Ian Fitzgerald and Ian Sando and were tasked with uncovering the names of unrecognised World War I fallen soldiers of the Burnside District.

Twenty two fallen soldiers, many of whom were born in the Burnside District, have so far been identified. See the full list bit.ly/CoBSoldiersMemorial

This list of names is not absolute, and we are encouraging the community to come forward with names or further research to help us identify all fallen World War I soldiers of the Burnside District so they can be recognised.

On Thursday 4 August the dedication and consecration of the further fallen soldiers at the Burnside District Fallen Soldiers' Memorial was held at the junction of Victoria Terrace and Alexandra Avenue, Rose Park. The City of Burnside unveiled new interpretive plaques and allocated 22 unassigned trees, adding these names to the Memorial on Alexandra Avenue and reuniting the fallen with their mates.





Home Support Services

Aged Care Services

The City of Burnside is funded by the Commonwealth Home Support Programme to support people over the age of 65 to live independently at home. Services include transport to local shopping centres and personal appointments in the community shopping bus and car, in home respite, social and fitness activities, accompanied individual support with shopping, home maintenance, gardening, minor home modifications and domestic assistance. Volunteers Needed for Community Transport

For the past two years, Vicky Mousoulis and Howard Butler-Nixon have supported local residents to remain healthy and connected by volunteering as drivers for Council's Home Support Program.

The City of Burnside Home Support Program offers community and personal transport services, providing local residents with convenient, affordable and safe transport.

Community Transport Officer Jenny McIntyre says Council is looking for more volunteer drivers. "These services allow residents to keep connected and engaged with their local community and provide a reliable form of transport to get to and from scheduled appointments. However, without sufficient volunteer drivers the service is difficult to maintain."

Jenny says drivers do not need a special licence. Volunteers guide clients safely in and out of vehicles and also assist them to carry small grocery bags. "The car service takes people to appointments such as medical, health care or personal grooming," Jenny says. "You must be over 65 years old and be registered with My Aged Care to make use of the service."

Vicky does two shifts a week driving the car, taking clients to appointments. "I like meeting people in this age group and hearing their stories and being of help to them," she says.

Howard drives the bus at least once a week taking people to Burnside Village and Norwood to do their shopping. "I enjoy making people happy," Howard says. "For some people this is the only shopping they do for a week or a fortnight." Howard helps clients on and off the bus and often carries their groceries to the door.

Jenny says the volunteers are invaluable not only for their driving services but as social connections and supports for the clients. "They chat regularly with clients and take a keen interest in their health and wellbeing," she says. "Volunteers may refer clients to Home Support staff so that they may be linked into other appropriate support services."

Anyone interested in volunteering should contact Council on 8366 4200. Council provides appropriate training in first aid, manual handling and emergency procedures. All volunteers must be fully vaccinated against COVID-19.

"We need a steady supply of volunteer drivers," Jenny says. "These services offer people the chance to be independent, have choices and not rely on friends or family to help them."

Shopping Bus

Pamela is a resident at Cottage Homes, Toorak Gardens and takes the Council bus once a week to Norwood Shopping Mall.

"It's brilliant because I don't drive," she says. "They just pick me up from 9 am on Tuesday and we have two hours. There are other people on the bus and another lady from Cottage Homes," Pamela says. "It is a good service and everyone enjoys their conversations on the bus. I do what I need to do, like go to the chemist and then we have a coffee."

Home Services

At 81 years old, Suzy McNulty is not as active as she used to be. She uses some of the Council services that are available.

"Council is absolutely marvellous," she says. "I can't speak highly enough of the staff." Suzy has a support worker visit each week for 2 hours and takes her grocery shopping. "We get on well and after shopping we have a coffee." She also has her windows cleaned and gutters cleared on a regular basis. When she has doctor or hairdressing appointments she uses the car transport service. "Everyone is so willing and very keen to take the time to help," she says.

The Shed

The traditional Men's Shed is now known as The Shed and has classes exclusively for women. Sarah Britten-Jones has been attending regularly since 2020.

"My husband was a carpenter and had a shed full of machinery and tools," she says. She has picked up some skills at The Shed and uses them to fix up furniture. "I like to fix things. I buy at auctions things that look derelict and fix them up." Sarah told a friend about it and she also attends and they have regular gin afternoons away from The Shed. "It's about the group dynamics," Sarah says. "I live alone and can go days without talking to anyone so this is great interaction. You get an appreciation for other people and their problems – everyone has a story. It's really important to me - I won't miss it."

Annual Business Plan and Budget Summary. 2022/23

This summary of the Annual Business Plan highlights Council's key priorities for the 2022/23 financial year in addition to providing information on how Council's funds will be allocated, with a commitment to continue the 118 services currently provided and maintaining more than \$720m of community assets to agreed condition levels.

Our 2021/22 achievements

Council delivered a Reconciliation Action Plan to build strong relationships with First Australians and to develop a deeper understanding of the Traditional Owners of the area of the City of Burnside, the Kaurna People.

Council completed the Kensington Gardens Reserve Wetlands and ETKG Tennis Club redevelopment in the south-eastern corner with support from Federal and State Government grants, from Green Adelaide and Tennis SA, and introduced its new co-name Kensington Wama.

The Tusmore Wading Pool redevelopment project was completed.

The Glenunga Tennis Clubrooms were redeveloped and the Newland Reserve tennis courts were resurfaced.

Work was completed on a Traffic Calming project on Dulwich Avenue.

Work commenced on the City Master Plan and continued on The Regal Theatre Master Plan.

13,080 plants grown for public and private planting programs.

1,621 trees planted on council land.

3,396 plants given to residents.

4 per cent decrease in tonnes of landfill compared to previous year.

Successful bin-tagging pilot project completed. This project helps to educate the community on putting household organics in to green bins. A larger scale bin tagging project will be undertaken in 2022/23.

78 people from 24 countries became Australian Citizens.

The Dollars and Sense in the Yellow Bin

It is important to take responsibility for sorting recyclables at home. Why? Because it saves money and makes good environmental sense. It is a lot cheaper to send materials to be recycled than it is to send them to landfill, but we can save even more.

The contents of the yellow bins are sent for sorting at a *Materials Recovery Facility* (MRF). Imagine a huge shed, filled with large machinery:

- A 'trommel screen' helps separate small pieces of glass.
- A 'bounce conveyor' helps separate paper from plastic containers.
- Magnets and 'eddy current' devices help separate ferrous and non-ferrous metals.
- Hand sorting and robots help separate plastics and other containers.

Following these processes, the MRF has collections of materials that are sold to manufacturers. For example, the paper is sold to manufacturers who make recycled paper products. Glass, metals and plastics are also sold. The revenue from these sales offsets the cost of the recycling processes – it saves us money.

To get the best possible price for materials, it's important they are not contaminated, like having paper that is free of plastic. But the processes that help to separate materials are not perfect. For example, it's very difficult to distinguish between paper and soft plastics. So, some soft plastic can make it through the process – it's called contamination.

Materials that don't belong in the yellow bin, like clothing and crockery, are also contamination. If these materials are put in a yellow bin, they need to be separated at the MRF and sent to landfill, which creates double handling and all costs money. Even worse, some contaminants can jam or damage the recycling devices, which creates downtime at the MRF and costs more money.

What's the solution? The industry is improving the automated systems. But developing and implementing new technology can be costly, and the cost comes back to us. Another option would be more hand sorting at the MRF. But again, that cost would come back to us.

Why does the cost come back to us? Well, the council pays for the recycling services – costs which are covered by council rates. So, if you are paying council rates, or renting a house and paying rates indirectly, you are paying for the recycling process.

The responsible option is to make sure we all sort our recycling at home. If we reduce contamination, we all save money! It's important to make sure that the only things that go in our yellow-lidded recycling bins are paper, cardboard, glass, metal and plastic containers. In Burnside, we have relatively low levels of contamination in our recycling bins. Most people are doing the right thing, which saves money at the MRF. There's more good news, too. The materials are recycled, saving the demand for virgin materials, and in turn reducing carbon emissions. It's really a win-win-win, that saves us dollars and makes great sense!

The future is in *wheelie* good hands

Luke Nordestgaard is a two-year-old spreading the word about responsible waste management.

Luke's Mum Emily can't say for certain where Luke's fascination and passion for bins came from. "Since he was able to crawl and walk, he showed interest in our shiny silver kitchen bin, but he also seemed to recognise early on that bins come in many different shapes, sizes and colours," Emily says. "He would get very excited to point them all out! We walked him around in his pram a lot on a trip to Sydney when he was 20 months old, and noticed he would point and exclaim, 'Wawa!' (his made-up word for bin) whenever he saw a bin, often before we had seen them."

Family, friends and his childcare have supported his interest. He picks up rubbish at the playground (and sometimes his friends even join in!), and his childcare made a special book with photos of bins from around the world. He has various rubbish bin and rubbish truck related toys, he loves helping his Grandpa take out the bins. His second birthday party had a bin theme, where people could dress in the colours of their local council bins. His Nana even made a green bin birthday cake and sewed a rubbish truck picture on his favourite jumper.

Luke knows what goes in each of the bins at home and really enjoys taking out the rubbish, including to the 'squishy plastic bin' at the shops. He even loves saying hello and goodbye to bins, and telling us which bins need to go on the road for collection each week!

Asked to name what goes in each colour bin Luke says: Yellow – cardboard rolls and paper. Green – food scraps and leaves. Red – rubbish and nappies.

It's great to see someone so young continuing the great work of residents in the City of Burnside!





Your Neighbourhood Budget Winners

The winners of the 2022/23 round of Your Neighbourhood Budget (YNB) have been announced. Five community projects will be installed by Council as a result of public voting.

Your Neighbourhood Budget is a participatory budgeting program in which residents nominate ideas for the community to then have an opportunity to vote on.

As voted on by local residents, the five projects which will be delivered are:

- Landscaping, park south of the Botanica apartment complex in the Glenside development, Eastwood (\$1,000).
- Heart defibrillator, Tusmore Park wading pool, Tusmore (\$3,000).
- Rock Swap Shelf, Tusmore Park, Tusmore (\$200).
- Shelter, Kensington Wama/Kensington Gardens Reserve, Kensington Gardens (\$20,000).
- Landscaping, corner Old Norton Summit Road and Rebecca Avenue, Auldana (\$20,000).

Glenside Landscaping

The Environs Club is a group of residents in the new Glenside development. Formed by David Everett, the group aims to improve the immediate environment and attract wildlife to the area.

"There are some really large gum trees but very little understorey growth," says David.

"We applied for the YNB funding to purchase plants and shrubs."

Council's Technical Officer, Conservation and Land Management, Dr Mark Ellis, visited the site with David. "He was great," says David. "Mark is so knowledgeable and he knew just the right plants and shrubs to suit the area."

Mark put together a pack of 19 different species of wildflowers, grasses and shrubs from Council's biodiversity nursery. David and his neighbours planted all 215 of them.



Tusmore Park

Sisters Amber and Penny Trappel made two suggestions for Tusmore Park, a defibrillator and a rock shelf. "My sister and I would like to have a heart defibrillator at Tusmore Park Wading Pool to help save lives," their application read. Mum Sharon says their grandmother often accompanies them to the park and she has a pacemaker. "Our grandma has a bad heart and we want to keep her and the community safe," said Amber and Penny.

Bell Yett Master Plan

Bell Yett Reserve consists of a car park, two netball/tennis courts, a basketball hoop, a storage shed, a playing field, biodiversity zones in the south and west sections, a playground, amenities block, bench seating, drinking fountain and rubble pathways. Stonyfell Creek runs through this Reserve.

Council conducted a very successful community-led co-design approach to create a master plan that provides a holistic and strategic direction for the future of this Reserve.

Informed by an initial round of community engagement, draft master plans were developed in consultation with a community working group of almost 70 residents, alongside landscape architects.

Feedback was then sought from the wider community on their preferred option.

The community chose Master Plan 2 and this was endorsed by Council. The Master Plan document outlines a vision to guide the future of the Reserve in a sensitive, planned and complementary way. It sets out objectives and strategies to manage change over time, based on the needs of the local community and other users.

Key features of the Master Plan are:

- · Upgraded paths.
- Adding seating and lighting.
- Upgraded sports area and associated facilities.
- Upgraded main entry points.
- Additional play areas near playground.
- Trike track, which is aimed at young children.

Implementation of the master plan is commencing this financial year. 2022/23 works include new signage and bins with dog bag dispensers at the three main entries, improved paths, additional seating and the planting of two new iconic trees.


The Importance of Your Vote

While voting in Council elections is not mandatory it is an opportunity for you to have your say on who makes decisions for your community.

Ann is a long time resident of Burnside and says it is absolutely important to vote. "Over the years Burnside Council has been controversial and has been in the news. The new members have changed all that and things have settled down," she says.

Voting is also a means of showing appreciation for council. "Council is very active in the community," she says. "The upgrades to the Civic Centre indicates Council cares. We as a community enjoy lots of activities, events and services. There are lots of sporting and interest clubs and many events in the library."

Ann says we should never take for granted the democratic right to vote. "Just look around the world and see people who can't vote," she says. "We are very lucky."





To vote in the 2022 Council election you must be enrolled on either the state electoral or Council voters roll.

State electoral roll

If you are already on the state electoral roll to vote within our council boundary, you will automatically receive your voting papers.

However, if you have recently moved house or changed your name you will need to update your enrolement. State electoral enrolment forms are available at your local post office and at www.ecsa.sa.gov.au

Council voters roll

If you are a landlord, business lessee or resident non Australian citizen you will no longer be automatically included on the Council's voters roll. To enrol on the roll visit www.burnside.sa.gov.au for an enrolment form.

As the election draws closer, more information will be provided about how to nominate as mayor or a councillor and how to vote.


