Mayor's Message



I am looking forward to warmer weather and this Spring season. It was terrific to see Waterfall Gully roaring back in June, but it has been cold and wet. It will not be long until the George Bolton Swimming Centre reopens and I cannot wait. Thank you for your feedback on so many different consultations this year, such as the Annual Budget and Long Term Financial Plan, Your Neighbourhood Budget, 40 km/h Precincts and the Pumptrack. It is important that we hear your views.

Congratulations to staff, designers, project managers and builders for their work who won 4 awards recently. The redeveloped Kensington Wama/Kensington Gardens Reserve won the Award of Excellence for Parks and Open Space, Healthy Parks and Healthy People Award and the Water for Life Award. The Magill Village precinct also won the Landscape Architect Award. We are very proud of all who made these places happen that are for you to enjoy. Kensington Wama has also qualified for the National Award in the Excellence for Parks and Open Space category, that will be announced in October.



Since the City of Burnside declared a climate emergency back in 2019, we have been driven to make changes. With our goal of being Carbon Neutral by 2030, our Environmental Team has been proactive and provides the council with regular Environmental Sustainability Reports that measure our progress. Our ES Scorecard records that we have reduced our carbon footprint by 56 per cent, planted 1,541 trees on Council land, supplied or planted 20,863 plants for private and public planting programs, given 7,103 plants to residents, reduced our waste to landfill, included more water sensitive design features and doubled our collection of recycled materials. Thank you for your support with these projects. I hope that you have seen the 24 Burnside Neutral 2030 series of videos on our website and Facebook page that tell you more about our work. The latest one is about solar panels that are being added to many of our buildings to save energy. It is also good to hear from our staff about how proudly they serve our community in other videos made by our staff videographer.

Burnside's first Disability Access and Inclusion Plan (DAIP) was presented to Council in July 2020. It is being used by Council to improve overall participation and access to programs, services and facilities for people with disabilities and of different cultural backgrounds. Inclusion is more than just access, it is about helping people to be present in community programs, to improve two-way communication, to develop confidence and a greater sense of belonging. Council has an Access and Inclusion Community Advisory Group that is working towards creating 'Burnside Together'.

I have enjoyed a number of spectacular shows at the Regal since she reopened three years ago after COVID closure allowed us to renovate and restore the interior of the theatre. Did you know that it opened as a pantomime theatre and silent movie theatre in 1925 called the Princess Theatre? In 2025, it will turn 100...so we will be celebrating this momentous occasion! Keep this date for Carols in the Park: Friday 8 December. It returned in 2022 and was most successful with its new format. I am now looking forward to the completion of the Dulwich Community Centre redevelopment that will take place later this year. I try to keep you up-to-date through 'Burnside Highlights' videos on our Facebook page and website with current and future events.

CEO'S Message

2023/24 Budget

It's hard to believe we are already now into the 2023/24 financial year. The new budget was approved by Council in June 2023, including the adoption of an overall rates increase of 6.01 per cent, with an average residential rate increase of 5.8 per cent.

Council is dedicated to keeping the downward pressure on rates and appreciates the issues faced by residents with the rising cost of living, however, after a rate rise of 3.5 per cent over the last three years combined, Council considered an increase is necessary to continue to deliver our diverse range of 118 different services to our community. This raise is the second lowest in the metropolitan area.

New KPIs

Council also approved new CEO Key Performance Indicators (KPIs) for the 2023/24 financial year.

Many of the KPIs focus on maintaining and improving our incredible community service offerings while continuing to further our environmental and social impact.

With changes coming to Aged Care Reforms and the ceasing of the Commonwealth Home Support Program, Council will be conducting a review on our Aged Care Service offerings and future options for the programs. Rest assured, the City of Burnside remains committed to providing support and community to our senior residents and those who rely on these services.

There is also an increased focus on developing a draft Innovate Reconciliation Action Plan following endorsement of the City of Burnside Reflect Reconciliation Action Plan and completion of our new RAP artwork. If you haven't seen it yet, I encourage you to visit the Civic Centre and see this remarkable and moving piece of art for yourself.

Burnside's commitment to our 2030 carbon-neutral goal continues to advance. With the recent installation of solar panels at the George Bolton Swimming Centre and plans to convert the pool heating to electricity instead of gas, our biggest energy-negative will soon become a positive.

The City Master Plan remains a key vision for Council and as such, the development of the Marryatville Precinct Master Plan and detailed design and costing of the Regal Theatre will be progressing in the coming months. Community consultation on Stage 1 of the Marryatville Precinct Plan has opened and you may submit your feedback by visiting engage.burnside.sa.gov.au. Further information on the Regal Theatre upgrades will be available for community consultation in the coming weeks as planning progress is made. Following recent Council approval, we will be making advances on the implementation of 40 km/h zones after strong community support – watch this space for updates on these projects and more.

Glenside Lions Compostable Bags Collaboration

The Glenside Lions Club now supports an environmental initiative of the City of Burnside to provide residents with two free rolls of compostable rubbish bags per year.

Approaching the City of Burnside in 2022, the Glenside Lions Club was eager to become involved in more community environmental initiatives.

Prior to the partnership, residents could only pick up their allocation of bags from the Burnside Civic Centre, however, the stock is now also available to pick up from the Bookmart on Kennaway Street, Tasmore.

Originally receiving over 100 rolls of bags back in November 2022, the Bookmart has distributed their entire allocation with incredibly positive public feedback.

President of the Glenside Lions Club, Leonie Varga said the initiative came back to servicing the community.

Operating out of the Bookmart, the Lions Club also provides community services including free vision and skin checkups with partnering charities, as well as donating Bookmart proceeds to local and international causes.

Solar Projects

The City of Burnside is committed to reaching carbon neutrality within the next seven years as part of our Burnside Neutral 2030 plan.

One of the main avenues for Council to be able to reach this goal is through the advancement in capacity and optimisation of solar power systems. Solar panels provide an environmentally friendly source of electricity. By harnessing the power of the sun, solar panels produce electricity without emitting greenhouse gases or other harmful pollutants. This reduces our reliance on fossil fuels and helps combat climate change, making solar energy a key component of the transition to a greener and more sustainable future.

Currently, the City of Burnside is undertaking several projects to increase the output of solar power at many of the city's main electricity-consuming assets, in order to combat high power expenditure and reduce emissions.

George Bolton Swimming Centre in Hazelwood Park is the most energy-intensive site in the City of Burnside. In June, a 48-kilowatt solar system was installed covering the roof in brand-new high-quality solar panels to help assist in the powering of this area. In the summer months, these panels will provide a massive saving in power across the centre's demands. There are also plans to convert the pool heating system from gas to electricity in the near future.

Down the street, the Council depot is also receiving a solar upgrade, with a 40-kilowatt solar system installed to help reduce the impact on the environment. Offices, mechanical workshops and electric vehicle charging stations will all benefit from this upgrade and help to slash maintenance costs. We have also commenced replacing petrol-powered equipment with electric and battery alternatives.

Finally, as part of its redevelopment, the Dulwich Community Centre on Union Street will be receiving a 5-kilowatt solar system to help power its daily operations, while the Burnside Civic Centre will have the number of active solar panels increased to boost intake.



Time-of-Use Electricity Plan

Did you know electricity is super-cheap in South Australia during the middle of the day when solar power is pumping into the grid?

As of 1 July, the City of Burnside has been taking advantage of this cheap power, maximising low electricity costs from 10 am - 4 pm through a newly signed 'Time of Use' electricity plan - this is called the 'solar sponge' rate.

This six-hour window provides the optimal time for charging, heating, cooling, pumping, and anything else that consumes electricity. Outside of this timeframe, electricity prices can be five times more expensive, even rising to nine times higher during out-of-business peak use hours (5 pm – 9 pm).

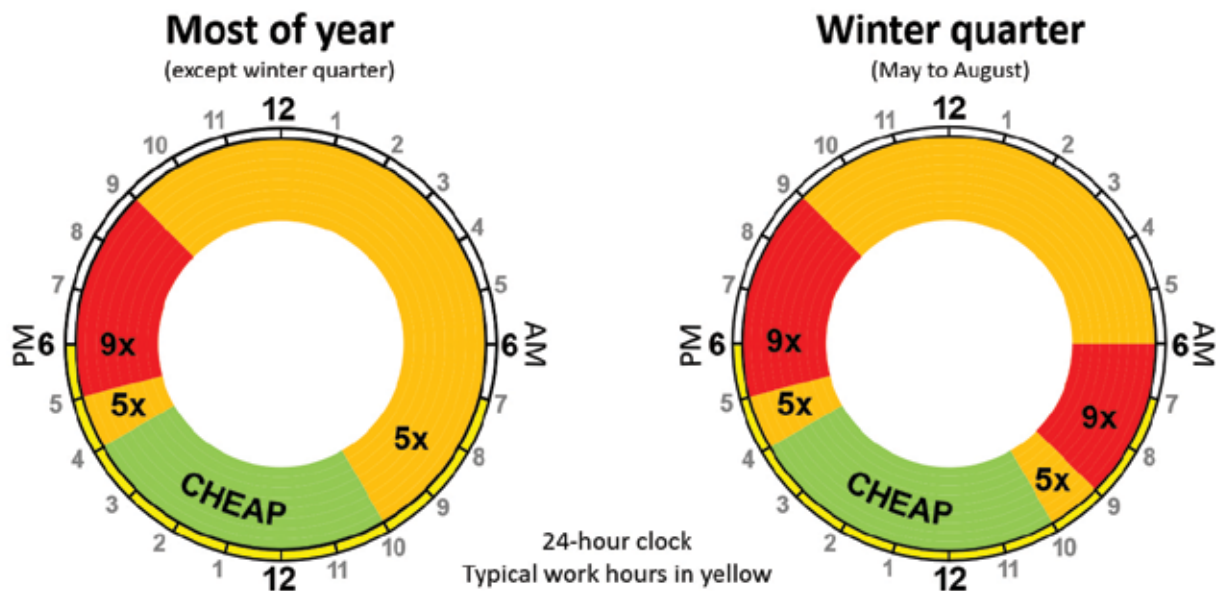
Further, during the winter quarter, from May to August (inclusive), when solar power is least productive, there is an additional morning peak to avoid, with electricity being nine times more expensive from 6 am - 9 am during these four colder months.

It is not just businesses and local governments that are eligible to take advantage of these cheaply rated hours, residential households can also sign up for Time of Use plans.

Many large appliances like dishwashers, washing machines and pool pumps all pull a lot of power, but they are also programmable and can be set to run during the day during cheaper hours.

Maximising the consumption of solar power is a win-win. Saving money is a big win. It's also saving nasty greenhouse gas emissions by focusing our consumption when solar power is available.

River Red Gum Saplings Continue Burnside Legacy

In a bid to continue a famous lineage, the City of Burnside has recently undertaken a tree-planting initiative in Hazelwood Park, in conjunction with Burnside Village, by planting 12 new juvenile River Red Gums.

River Reds are native to Australia and are highly valued for their striking appearance and contribution to the ecosystem. These majestic trees can grow up to 30 metres in height and offer numerous ecological advantages, including providing habitat for various wildlife species, aiding in soil erosion control and purifying the air.

However, the dozen saplings are not from any ordinary River Red Gum, these saplings were harvested from the famous gum around which the current iteration of Burnside Village was framed.

The 18-metre tree, which was removed from Burnside Village in 2013, was beloved by the Burnside community and will now be able to live on for future residents through the next generation.

Director of Burnside Village and the Cohen Group, Andrew Cohen said the former tree was linked to the history of Burnside Village, the Burnside community, and his family, and as such was an important legacy to maintain.

'These tree saplings are now replanted in Hazelwood Park for the community to enjoy,' Andrew said.

'Perhaps in time when the tree canopies are grand enough, I may sit in the shade and recount this story to my children and their children.'

Harvested by Burnside Village and provided to the City of Burnside, the saplings were raised in a council nursery for over a year and provided with all the necessary resources to thrive, before making the journey to their new home in late June.

Now mature enough to handle life outside in the elements, and firmly planted in a cluster on the northern side of Hazelwood Park, the 12 juvenile trees are adjoined by an irrigation system and will be monitored by the City of Burnside Parks Team moving forward.

Friends of Hazelwood Park member and volunteer at Koala Rescue Joylene Fraser said the community response to the saplings had been overwhelmingly positive.

'This is rather special to so many of us and a celebration of that majestic gum living on,' Joylene said.

'We are always in favour of more trees.'



Burnside New Ultra-rapid EV Chargers

City of Burnside residents and visitors now have access to some of the fastest electric vehicle (EV) chargers in South Australia, following the installation of four new powerful charge points at the Burnside Civic Centre.

These charge points host four Ultra-rapid speed chargers capable of a maximum output of 200kW, making them some of the fastest chargers available within South Australia and perfect for shorter visits to the Civic Centre. Charge times can range from as little as 10 minutes to a maximum of 45 minutes.

These stations are owned and operated by the RAA as part of a State Government initiative to establish the first statewide EV charging network, with more than 500 charging points to be installed at 140 locations in 2024.

City of Burnside CEO Chris Cowley said the new chargers, which feature a mix of CCS2 and CHAdeMO plugs, were a welcome addition to the two pre-existing EV chargers at the Civic Centre.

‘We’re delighted to welcome the RAA in establishing four new EV chargers at the Burnside Civic Centre, which provides a great expansion to our public charging capabilities,’ Chris said.

‘Since declaring a climate emergency in 2019, the City of Burnside has sought to divest from carbon emitting technologies and facilitate green energy solutions wherever possible.

‘Electric vehicles are the future of our roads and as uptake increases over the coming years, having the infrastructure to support these vehicles is critical.

‘The installation of these chargers is a positive step forward in welcoming cleaner vehicles to our streets and I hope both residents and visitors of our city enjoy using this new infrastructure.’

RAA CEO Nick Reade said the RAA had a proud history in innovation and was building the infrastructure to support the uptake of EVs.

‘The rollout of the RAA Charge network is now well underway, with the construction of all 140 charging sites to be completed in 2024 – all powered by renewable energy,’ Nick said.

‘Importantly, 75 per cent of our charging sites will be in regional areas and 98 per cent of those charging sites will be located less than 200 km apart – this will go a long way to making range anxiety a thing of the past.’

Remembering Bill Potts

August 2023 marked 30 years since the passing of Bill Potts, whose legacy is still felt throughout the City of Burnside's local parks and reserves today.

Born in Newcastle upon Tyne in 1917, Bill served in the Royal Engineers during the Second World War and was evacuated from Dunkirk, captured in North Africa, and escaped captivity from a POW camp in Czechoslovakia during the Soviet's westward advance in 1945.

In the 1950s Bill emigrated to Australia and became the City of Burnside's first Director of Parks and Gardens, a position he held from 1959 to 1982. During his tenure he was instrumental in leading works in many parks and reserves including Hazelwood Park, Tusmore Park and Michael Perry Botanic Reserve.

For Bill's son, Ian, this ongoing legacy is felt in more ways than one.

'Dad was a racer; we have that sort of racing blood... I was raised in that racing household,' Ian said.

'I remember driving around the Wayville Showgrounds for the Royal Show, just around the main arena on the dirt track getting sent sideways a little bit, thinking "This is pretty fun!"

'The funny thing is he was really into cars whereas I was more into racing dirtbikes growing up, but I also had an appreciation of the cars.'

In the 1960s, Bill purchased and completed the assembly of an HRG 1500, which had been a collection of parts in 1939, assembled as a chassis for export in 1947, and never fitted with a body.

'This car, along with four or five others, came to Australia in a chassis form, just a rolling chassis,' Ian said.

'So, my father designed the body on the Le Mans model and there was an Italian coachbuilder in Adelaide who used to work for Maserati. My father

got in contact with him, and he built the body and that would have been around 1968, ever since then it's been in the family.'

After completing his education at Norwood High School, Ian followed in his father's footsteps and worked at the City of Burnside from 1979 to 1989, learning the ropes in landscaping and completing further education at TAFE. Today Ian operates his own landscape gardening business.

Ian said he has fond memories of working at the City of Burnside during his father's tenure, and that Bill was well respected by his peers.

'He was a people person, everybody liked him,' Ian said.

'He respected all his workers, and they respected him. It was a big team effort; it wasn't just him.

'My father had an eye for detail and perspective, he was more interested in civic landscaping on a big scale rather than gardens.'

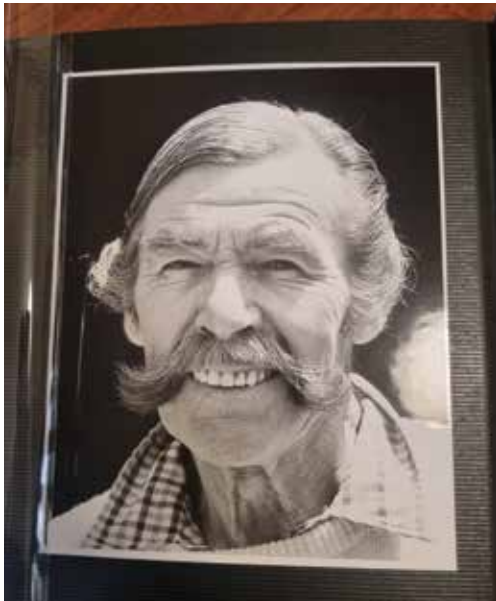
Bill Potts passed away in August 1993 and is commemorated at the Bill Potts Memorial Garden in Hazelwood Park, featuring a magnificent Moreton Bay fig tree as its centrepiece with ornamental planting beds in the surrounding area.

Meanwhile, Ian continues to hold warm memories of his father and plans to keep the HRG 1500 close by as a family member.

‘When I drive by Greenhill Road and I look over at Hazelwood Park it fills me with so much pride, knowing how much my father contributed to this place,’ Ian said.

‘He always said to me in Australia he spent most of his time getting water into the garden, whereas back home he spent all the time getting water out of the garden because it just rained so much.

‘He really was nature’s gentleman.’

Nature Play with Fiona Jackson

Back to the basics of inquiry-based learning – that is the goal for Stonyfell resident and family daycare provider Fiona Jackson.

Operating out of her home four days a week, Fiona is dedicated to guiding the children in her care to expand their knowledge through nature play and imagination exploration, with local parklands Michael Perry Botanic Reserve, Hazelwood Park, Bell Yett Reserve and Langman Reserve just a few of the spaces used.

A former childcare worker in London, Fiona, or ‘Fi-Fi’ to the kids, has been based in Adelaide for 14 years and remains in awe of the quality of reserves in the Burnside area.

‘It was wonderful over there [in London],’ Fiona said. ‘But it is somehow even more wonderful here.’

‘Michael Perry Reserve has evolved in such a beautiful and magical way; the team has done wonders there. It was so foresty, all the children have seen the development. Burnside has done an incredible job leading the way for discovery and creating a beautiful community space.’

Aged between three and five, the children in Fiona’s care are taught the importance of the environment as well as a deep respect for nature. Studying stream flows, flowers, trees, and birds, the children are encouraged to guide themselves through their interests of the day.

‘We meander and they lead me, they lead me down the footpath of curiosity and go through what they wish to do.

‘I don’t tell them what to do, I facilitate their inquiry, but I want them to learn through their senses. Life is so structured, here it is completely different.

‘My aim is to grow their creativity, critical thinking skills and social-emotional literacy, by cultivating a collaborative and respectful group dynamic.’

With so many high-quality reserves on her doorstep, Fiona and the children take daily trips to the local spaces to familiarise themselves with the local wildlife and vegetation.

Burnside Technical Officer of Conservation and Land Management, Dr Mark Ellis said Fiona was developing great environmental values in the children by teaching them how to interact with nature while understanding the delicacy of their surroundings.

‘Fiona is fantastic and has a really well-thought-out philosophy of nature play and education,’ Mark said.

‘She respects our sites and instils this in the children - so often nature play means destroying what we are trying to preserve, but Fiona finds that balance.’

The City of Burnside was once again named a Tree City of the World for 2023 by the Arbor Day Foundation and Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations, providing some of the safest and most diverse reserves and parklands in South Australia.

There have been a number of welcome developments in Beaumont Ward recently, notably concerning Beaumont Common and Portrush Road.

Beaumont Common is the oldest park in Burnside, given to the villagers of Beaumont in 1849 by Sir Samuel Davenport. Where once it was fenced and locked off to all but the said villagers, it has, for many years, been accessible by all.

What is remarkable, given its age, is that it is almost entirely devoid of development. No tennis courts, bowling greens, swimming pools. Just a bridge over the creek, some benches and a monument to Sir Samuel. It also contains the finest remnant Grey Box Grassy Woodland in the metro area. If you want to see what most of Burnside looked like prior to European settlement, take a trip to Beaumont Common.

Several residents expressed concerns to us that the woodland was expanding to the detriment of the grassed areas of the Common, so we successfully moved that Council put in place a Management Plan to define precisely what the Common will look like. Similar in concept to the Tregenza Oval Master Plan in Linden Park that we pioneered and which was copied in Bell Yett Reserve and Penfold Park.

It was pleasing that there were over 250 responses from local residents to community consultation on the Plan and that over 60 local residents gathered at Beaumont Bowling Club in April for the first co-design workshop. Beaumont Common will be 175 years old next year and we are confident that the Management Plan will set it up for the next 175 years.

Portrush Road forms part of National Highway One, which connects the South-Eastern Freeway to the North-South Motorway. Over 3,000 trucks, many of them very large B-doubles, travel through the heart of Burnside each day, passing no fewer than 10 schools. Indeed, the Portrush Road crossing at Hay Road, which many children use to get to Linden Park Primary School, has been rated the most dangerous crossing in South Australia.

Once the North-South Motorway is complete, this traffic will shift to Cross Road, which will be great news for Burnside residents (if not residents of Unley and Mitcham councils). But this will do nothing to fix the extraordinarily dangerous junction of the Freeway and Cross, Glen Osmond and Portrush Roads.

There was therefore good news in May, when the State Government Transport Department announced that the Greater Adelaide Freight Bypass from Murray Bridge to Port Adelaide was economically justified, with a benefit-to-cost ratio of more than one. No funding for it though alas.

However, hope may be on the horizon. In June, our local Federal MP, James Stevens, hosted a roundtable for councillors from Burnside and Norwood, Payneham and St Peters to discuss the bypass with Senator Bridget McKenzie, the Shadow Minister for Infrastructure & Transport. To get some Federal interest in funding the bypass is a real breakthrough.

That's it from us. As ever, we are both available to address any council issues that you may have.

I hope you are feeling the joys of spring after our wet winter and are preparing for the anticipated hot, dry summer ahead?

The new Council has taken enormous care to develop the 2023/24 Budget as we try to maintain the high levels of service and cost efficiencies expected, while being acutely aware of the cost of living pressures you are experiencing across the community.

In terms of Climate Change and environmental sustainability, we are continuing work to maintain and preserve our tree canopy with plantings across our streets and reserves. There is important work being undertaken in partnership with Green Adelaide to measure our tree canopy coverage using LiDAR technology.

Other work is planned on our streetscapes to beautify, improve and regenerate the plantings, flowers, shrubs and biodiversity growth as well as ensure a healthy environment for trees, control of weeds and to encourage wildlife.

Assistance to facilitate recycling rates includes a proposal for a central drop off hub for recycling of products such as x rays, batteries, mobile phones etc. A Trial is being undertaken to determine the feasibility of a weekly Green Bin collection as the community actively and increasingly supports disposal of garden and kitchen waste in the green bin for recycling, thus reducing waste to landfill and associated costs.

In closing, congratulations to our Toy Librarian and the staff of our fantastic Toy Library who have both won Awards for excellence. Also the revitalised Kensington Wama Wetlands and Magill Village have been Awarded for landscape design.

To this end, I was proud to lead a Motion that Council request the State Government to conduct a safety audit of the roads, streets and infrastructure around local schools, especially on Kensington Road, the site of a terrible accident in March.

I am pleased to report that there has been a positive response from the Transport and Education Ministers, and we can look forward to Council and State Government working together to create safer roads for all, especially young people, and our senior residents.

On the topic of young people, I was also happy to support a Motion for the creation of a Youth Council as a means of promoting political and community engagement amongst students and young people. Although the motion wasn't successful, I am pleased to update that we have approved a youth officer commencing in the second half of next year, 2024.

Like all of us, I am conscious of the need for households to use our organic waste more productively, rather than simply disposing of it in landfill where it has no further use. This is why I was glad to support a Motion that would see Council adopt a model in use in other areas in Adelaide, namely the introduction of a weekly Food Organics Green Organics bin collection trial.

St Peter's Girls' School Makes a Visit

St Peter's Girls' School in Stonyfell understands the importance of encouraging student engagement with local government, having for the third time in recent years visited the City of Burnside to learn about all things council and the importance of environmental sustainability.

Meeting with Mayor Anne Monceaux, two classes of Year 4s were taught about the many services the City of Burnside oversees, before touring the toy library and spending time with the Burnside Environmental Team to learn about recycling.

Mayor Anne Monceaux, a St Peter's Girls' School alumni herself, said educating future leaders of the community about the vital functions of the City of Burnside is always a pleasure.

'Seeing the next generation of our community so involved and eager to learn is a promising sign for the future,' Mayor Monceaux said.

'It is important for students to understand that council provides many more services than just the three R's of rates, roads, and rubbish.'

Educator at St Peter's Girls' School, Olivia Coulter said part of the school curriculum was to study local council, how it affects the lives of its citizens, and the democratic processes behind it.

'This visit helps them feel more involved in their community,' Olivia said. 'When the students get hands-on experience, it is much more impactful. It helps bring the council to life.'

'They get back to school from this visit and want to make immediate changes, "Can we compost? Do we have the right bins? Can we do this and that?"'

During the visit Environmental Sustainability Officer at the City of Burnside, Sarah McConaghy-Beasley ran the students through the importance of proper at-home waste disposal and hosted the ever-popular Recycling Relay Challenge.

'The students love the recycle relays,' Sarah said. 'This is where they take one item and run to place it in the correct bin, then run back and tag the next person, then when all the items are in the bins, we talk about a few key items that were right or wrong and why.'

Sarah also noted the students are always keen to share the proper recycling practices once back at home.

'I do notice that they talk about what they do at home, most students understood the importance of placing food waste in the green bin and were already doing so at home. They are all very excited to tell everyone at home the importance of recycling and composting.'

Fragmented, an exhibition of textiles

Join Pepper Street Arts Centre for the newest local artist exhibition 'Fragmented', from **Friday 1 - Friday 29 September**.

A journey in texture and mood, 'Fragmented' is brought to you by the Fibre Artist Network (FAN), a community group of over 100 artists who have been collaborating for over 20 years.

Featuring the work of 21 artists, including group convener Suzanne Gummow, the exhibition promises to challenge the broad idea of memory, art and form through an experience in style and technique. And with a stipulation requiring artwork displayed in the exhibition to stand one metre tall, 'Fragmented' promises to deliver some strikingly dynamic visuals.

Local artist and member of FAN, Cathy Boniciolli specialises in seascape visuals, focusing on the Fleurieu Peninsula's stunning oceans and beaches, describing the sea and sands as good for the soul and a place to feel at peace.

'We look at textiles as an art form, not a craft,' Cathy said. 'Each artist is challenged to interpret the theme individually to create a diverse exhibition.'
