Mayor's message

Welcome to the Autumn Focus for 2021. The setting for the Australia Day celebrations and the Citizenship Ceremony was in idyllic Hazelwood Park. We were honoured to have the Governor of South Australia, the Honorable Hieu Van Le AC and the Deputy Premier, Attorney General and local member for Bragg, Vickie Chapman, present at our celebrations. The Governor presented the three annual Citizen Awards to people who have given notable service to our community.

The Burnside Citizen of the Year is Jenny Cooper. She began the 'Breadtags for Wheelchairs' programin Australia in 2018, having been previously involved in it in South Africa. To date there have been 14 wheelchairs purchased for disadvantaged people, through the recycling of these plastic breadtags and she and her supporters have removed over 5.4 million of them from our environment.

The Senior Citizen of the Year is John Moore, who at 94 years of age only recently retired from looking after the St Saviour's Church cemetery at Glen Osmond. It is an historic cemetery dating back to the settlement of Burnside and John has cared for it for nearly 30 years.

John White was awarded the Youth Citizen of the Year. He has been the conductor of the Burnside Youth Concert Band for the past six years and played in the band for many years before that. Our sincerest thanks to these individuals for their commitment and devotion to our community.

Sixty two people became Australian Citizens from 22 different countries on 26 January. They came from countries as far and wide as Morocco, the Phillipines, USA, India, Egypt, Pakistan, Mexico, UK, China, Sri Lanka, France, Poland, Columbia, Thailand, Afghanistan, Hong Kong, Singapore and Zambia.

Many had waited years to become Australians and they were all excited about their futures.

In 2021, climate change continues to challenge us and the City of Burnside is currently taking action, as a priority under its Strategic Plan and policy, to become carbon neutral by 2030. These actions include energy efficient infrastructure initiatives in facilities and vehicles to reduce Council's energy use.

We will use more solar energy and carbon offset initiatives, such as tree planting and water sensitive urban design projects. To enhance our reputationthrough the United Nations award as a 'Tree City of the World', we will continue to plant thousands of trees and plants each year. Much of this is also to make up for the losses we suffer through tree removal in the development of private land.

We still have the challenge of reducing waste goinginto landfill. In 2020 you helped us decrease waste to landfill by 151 tonnes, but we still need to do much more. We all need to do more to 'put it in the right bin', especially maximising the use of our green bins, reducing what goes into our red bins and reducing food waste generally. If you do not have a compostable waste bin in your kitchen, or bags to go in it, please call in to Council and collect them.

We have a focus on customer service this year and our CEO wants his staff to be responsive to your customer concerns. If you have a query or a concern, please contact Council directly, by phone, but preferably email, or get in touch with your local Elected Members. You can use the Council website, or the MyLocal app for contact information and reporting concerns. Your Elected Members' contact details are on the back of this newsletter.

The CEO has also challenged his staff to be creative and innovative with ideas and actions to increase efficiencies. He has encouraged them to suggest ideas that they may have to help reduce costs. So if you also have some ideas, share them with your local members or me!

In this Autumn Focus, you will be able to identifyarticles that relate to the three themes of our Strategic Plan: Community, Environment and Place. Each is identified by a different graphic symbol that will appear in each issue.

Our Regal Theatre has been a hive of activity during February with great Australian movies like The Dry, Penguin Bloom and High Ground, and also with live Roulette Shows featuring Marina Prior, Casey Donovan and Tim Draxl. Open Community Letter

As the current Mayor of Burnside, I need to comment on the Ombudsman's report released in December 2020, and the subsequent media articles in *The Advertiser*.

The Ombudsman investigated expenditure on credit cards, for food and beverages by senior staff that occurred from June 2015 to June 2017.

He found the Council guilty of maladministration. I need to assure you that changes have been made under my watch, and that these practices of the past, no longer occur.

I am limited in what I can say, with regard to our former CEO because of continuing legal action over his dismissal. But I can say that many improvements have been made since I became Mayor in November 2018, and since the new CEO, Mr Chris Cowley was appointed in January 2020.

I stood for Mayor to bring about change and to improve Council's accountability to ratepayers. I immediately took all the actions I could within the restrictions placed on Mayors by the *Local Government Act*. The ombudsman's report set out the actions that I took. I ceased the provision of alcohol to elected members and staff after Council meetings. I reduced excessive costs of meals provided to elected members prior to meetings, and suppers afterwards. And I pay the cost of the Christmas dinner for elected members, the CEO and their partners. With management, we reassessed and restricted the provision of alcoholic beverages at Council and community events.

I initiated the development of an entertainment and hospitality policy and asked questions of the former CEO about credit card usage by staff, and was assured that changes had been made to improve accountability and transparency.

The current CEO has made further improvements to the credit card protocol, to the number of cards in use and he has placed stricter limits on their usage to ensure accountability.

The first of two reports on these actions came to Council on 28 January and a second one in February. The 13 Ombudsman's recommendations pertaining to credit card management will be implemented.

Burnside is a beautiful city to live in. As a Council, we are currently a leader in innovation within the Local Government sector, especially in the areas of environmental sustainability and climate change action.

We are renowned for our tree cover, our parks, and heritage areas. We have a wonderful community, with staff, elected members, volunteers and neighbours who all work hard to make Burnside a great place to live.

As a Council, we are committed to making Burnside a home we are all proud of.

Burnside news

Our Strategic Community Plan Themes

The new Strategic Community Plan – *Burnside 2030* – was featured in the last edition of Focus. This is a plan that will define how Council delivers services and projects to meet the needs and desires of the Burnside community in threekey theme areas – Community, Environment and Place.

These themes reflect the shared priorities of our community and Council and are consistent with our proud history and vision for a liveable future.

Now the work begins to ensure the plan is not left to 'gatherdust on a shelf'! Three new icons have been created for each of the three themes. You will see these icons used for the first time in this edition of Focus to identify work areas, and which key theme area the work is contributing to.

KGR Project

At Kensington Gardens Reserve (KGR) work is underway on one of the City's most significant environmental and recreational projects.

Council's contractor, Camco, has commenced earthworks to transform the existing lake into the new wetland. All memorial plaques and monuments located within the project site are being stored for safe keeping during construction and will be reinstated once works are complete. Kaurna Traditional Owners continue to work closely with Council and Camco and more exciting news is to come on plans to recognise the Reserve's cultural heritage significance.

Magill Village Project

The cities of Burnside and Campbelltown, with the support of the State Government, are undertaking worksto underground power and refresh the streetscape

on Magill Road to improve Magill Village for businesses, residents and visitors. The power lines located in the Village heart are now underground. Work on developing final design for the streetscape refresh has been completed with the Department for Infrastructure and Transport recently approving the design. Work is underwayto consult with traders to ensure that the construction phase of the project will account for their needs. Tenderswill soon be called for the construction work and once awarded it should commence in early-mid 2021.

Depending on weather and other considerations that mayimpact works like service relocations, the construction methods and staging of the works will be aimed at minimising the disruption to traders and the community. It is estimated that the works will take 8-12 months.

In August 2020, the Magill Village Master Plan won the Parks and Leisure Australia 2020 Strategic Planning Award for the South Australia/Northern Territory region, and was awarded as a Finalist in the National Awards (October 2020).

Single-use plastics

From 1 March 2021 a ban on theuse of single-use plastics commenced in South Australia. The State Government has launched an education campaign to help businesses and the public prepare forthe changes. The first bans are on single-use plastic items like straws, cutlery and beverage stirrers and will expand to include other items such as polystyrene cups, bowls and plates in early 2022.

Businesses are urged to prepare now by deleting these items from inventories, ordering alternatives, having signage in place and training staff. Help for businesses is available at www.replacethewaste.sa.gov.au

The floor will be replaced in our stateheritage listed Burnside Ballroom*, with the support of Heritage SA. There are no other known examples of this style of 1950s civic interior design intact in South Australia. The new floor will see the Ballroomremain a destination venue for years to come.

Continuing our upgrades to The Regal Theatre, the air conditioning is scheduled for replacement, external concrete repair works will commence and the screen and AV equipment will be replaced as will canopy lighting. There will also be external lighting and painting.*

The Curator's shed in Michael Perry Reserve has been repaired. The work team rebuilt the front wall and part of the side wall, reinforced the whole structure, repainted exterior, installed a new roof, updated the electricity meter box and installed a light and power points. This is to be utilised as a storage shed for landscaping volunteers. (\$32k)





Two barbecues were replaced at Kensington Park Reserve including a new reserve path to access the barbecue in the south west corner. (\$27k)



Bollard replacements were undertaken in Kensington Gardens Reserve. The permapine posts and rail were replaced with new bollards made from recycled material. (\$24k)

At Penfold Park and Kingsley Avenue Glenunga the retaining walls were replaced. (\$12k)

The irrigation pump in Kensington Gardens Reserve was replaced. (\$19k)

Bike racks in Burnside Civic Centre and Kensington Park Reserve have been replaced. (\$5k)

Carbon Neutral by 2030

Response to climate change


With the future of our city and our community our absolute priority, the City of Burnside is working strategically to respond to Climate Change, including a commitment to becoming carbon neutral by 2030.

The Council's approach will achievelong-term benefits including cost reductions through savings on powerand fuel, lower greenhouse gas emissions and the planting of thousands of trees. As Council workstoward a Carbon Neutral Burnside, it will continue to support the community through this transition to enhance environmental sustainability and community prosperity.

Carbon Neutral Burnside 2030

The City of Burnside's carbon footprint is generated throughpowering of council facilities, streetlights and vehicles.

The Council has conducted a thorough analysis to determine how best to reduce its carbon footprint and save money, with the graph below showing Council's proposed forward plan



Council's 10 year plan to achieve carbon neutrality will be delivered through smart investment in:

- Energy efficient infrastructure, including facilities and vehicles.
- · Initiatives to reduce Council's energy use.
- · Solar energy systems for buildings.
- Carbon offset initiatives (including the Burnside Carbon Offset Scheme, a major tree planting partnership to offsetcarbon emissions from the The Regal Theatre and George Bolton Swimming Centre).

Recent Achievements

26 % decrease in Council's carbon footprint between 2019 and 2020.

Almost 4,000 streetlights upgraded to LED, saving around 500 tonnes greenhouse gas emissions – the equivalent of taking 165 cars off the road.

Electricity use reduced by 12% at the Burnside Civic Centre, with upgraded lighting and air conditioning saving around 56 tonnes greenhouse gas emissions a year – the equivalent to taking 19 cars off the road.

Solar panels installed on the new facility on Conyngham Street.

Purchase of hybrid electric vehicles and installation of two electric vehicle charging stations.

In 2020

- 1,500 trees planted on public land
- 8,500 indigenous plants grown at the Burnside Biodiversity Nursery
- 11,000 plants used in public and private planting programs
- City of Burnside recognised as a Tree City of the World

Water Sensitive Urban Design (WSUD)

Council is improving the way stormwater is managed, to reduce runoff and utilise this valuable resource. During 2020, Council installed rainwater tanks, permeable paving and numerous devices to capture and re-use stormwater in verges. There are around 500 examples of WSUD in action, with more delivered each year.

Major concerns continue to be managing traffic and parking in our streets – for residential amenity and the safety of our young and mature age pedestrians and cyclists. We are keen to consider reducing speed limits.

Climate change and the risks it presents to the quality of life of residents and to the natural and built environment has been acknowledged by Council. A Climate Change Policy has been introduced to acknowledge this, provide leadership and to guide our Council decision making.

Our first meeting in January this year, also saw Council vote for Administration to develop an Asset Management Plan for our urban trees. The City of Burnside spends over \$1 million a year managing and maintaining our trees and developing this Asset Management Plan will highlight the importance of maintaining this key asset; our logo and an icon of the Burnside area.

Over the course of the last year there has been much focus on providing optimal value to rate payers and how administration can provide savings while still providing and maintaining our current levels of service. We have started the budget process for 2021/22 and welcome your feedback when the budget is sent out for community consultation.

Having withstood the slings and arrows of last year, 2021 promises to be a year of renewal and nowhere more than in Magill Village.

This is the year when the achievement of major elements of the Magill Village Project, in progress since the adoption of a Master Plan in 2013, come to realisation.

The planning work and the funding are in place. Some elements are already complete – improved Village branding through signage and the undergrounding of the power lines between Vine Street and Windsor Avenue providing a clear streetscape. The major work will occur this year.

Street furniture, tree planting and landscaping are planned to enhance the streetscape of Magill Road and boost the village feel, present in Magill since it was first subdivided in 1838. Pavements will be upgraded to augment the beauty of the village, capturing the famed clay elements of Bennetts Magill Pottery. Road treatments will be introduced through the village which will calm the through traffic to the benefit of drivers and village users alike – an improved opportunity for all to appreciate the charm of Magill Village.

The proposed investment in the surrounds of these businesses will lift the Village to be a high quality urban environment. Pedestrian users will enjoy a fairer share of this historic zone and we will see private investment rise to match.

Magill Village is one of the most historic locations in metropolitan Adelaide and the Magill Village Project will both pay homage to its past glories and guarantee its future.

Council has recently decided to refurbish the Tusmore Wading Pool. The pool is a local institution, which was constructed in the 1960s.

The working group, with a number of external experts, has been working hard to find innovative ways to achieve its goals for the heritage of Burnside.

What a great joy it is to live in a part of the world where trees are valued.

Magnificent evergreen native trees, through the foothills to the plains of Adelaide – the only Australian city enclosed by parklands.

Our array of deciduous trees bring autumn beauty. Oaks, elms, cedar and plane trees line our streets and drop their leaves. Before they do completely, they give us a splash of colour.

Perhaps the only bad thing about autumn is the leaf blower. It sounds like an insect but it's a two-leggedlocal or blow-in-contractor with a horrendous noise.

I can remember when people used to come to Alexandra Avenue to collect the leaves that had fallen from the oaks. They are full of nutrients to compost and recycle.

Autumn's a form of recycling. Trees drop leaves, go dormant, rains soak the soil. By spring new buds grow, the leaves reappear to shade us from the summer heat and the cycle begins again.

Burnside Council also has to remember that many of the European street trees were planted in memory of fallen soldiers. In winter they are a stark reminder of the loss of life on the Western Front and elsewhere.

It's beholden on us to care for these trees as they are in a sense living gravestones. Drive through Osmond Terrace, Prescott Terrace and Alexandra Avenue and think of the sacrifice made by all those young people from Burnside and Norwood.

Lest we forget.

South Eastern Freeway

Pavement Rehabilitation

Toll Gate to Heysen Tunnels

The Department for Infrastructure and Transport is undertaking major pavement rehabilitation works on the South Eastern Freeway between the Toll Gate and the Crafers Interchange.

The works involve removing around 300 millimetres of existing pavement and replacing it with new asphalt.

Major asphalting works like these were last undertaken on this section of the freeway over 20 years ago. These works will ensure the long term safety and integrity of the freeway for all road users.

Major works commenced in February and are expected to be completed by July 2021, weather permitting.

Motorists who use the South Eastern Freeway regularly should consider alternative routes or expect delays.

Annual Community Survey

Key findings

The City of Burnside conducts an annual survey to understand the community's perceptions of the Council's service delivery performance. The Annual Community Survey is the only fully representative survey conducted in the City and the results of this survey are a genuine reflection of our community's opinion. The results from these surveys are used to inform decision making at Council.

Satisfaction with Council

Overall satisfaction with Council is high with a mean score of 7.7 out of a possible 10.

This is compared to other ERA (EasternRegional Alliance) Councils, where the average satisfaction achieved is 6.725out of a possible 10.

Most improved

Performance of Elected Members in beingtransparent, ethical and reflecting the bestinterests and values of the community saw the largest improvement, increasing from 5.86 in 2018 to 6.9 in 2020.

Council's financial management, improving by 0.89 to 6.86 in 2020.

Top Four

Library services 8.77 out of 10.

Presentation and cleanliness of the City 8.41.

Providing and maintaining parks and reserves 8.39.

Providing passive recreation opportunities, such as walking, picnic locations or pursuing hobbies 8.21.

Communications




Tusmore Wading Pool
