Origin of present name

The history of the naming of this street is quite unusual. The developers of the district, south east of Kensington and Penfolds Road chose five streets of grape varieties (frontignac, grenache, gordo, muscat and reisling) and were at a loss to find an appropriate name for another. They asked the secretary of the syndicate for a suggestion and she chose *Kamali*.

It may never be known why she selected that name but the developers recorded it.

Karrayerta Drive

Glenside

Origin of present name

The Kaurna term Karrayerta was recorded for the Burnside area by C.H. Harris, a Department of Lands surveyor in the early 20^{th} century who had an interest in place names. He defined this as 'gum trees on the margin of [a] stream'. A more contemporary translation might be 'redgum country'.

This was one of several new roads that were established as a result of the development of the Glenside Hospital Campus with the names confirmed by Council in Feb 2014. The roads that were established at that time were Cramond Drive, Eucalyptus Lane, Harriet Lucy Drive, Karrayarta Drive, and Mulberry Road. The name Alexander Deane Street was also assigned at that time even though the road had not yet been built.

The hospital was originally established on the 134 acre Section 264 here in 1870 when it was known as the Parkside Lunatic Asylum. It carried that name until 1913 when it was renamed the Parkside Mental Hospital and then again renamed Glenside Hospital in 1967. With the advances of treatment options, new drugs and home care, further development with the less extensive accommodation of the Glenside Health Services facilities was completed in 2014.

The Adelaide Studios of South Australia Film Corporation moved into the main precinct. (See also, Alexander Deane Street.)

Kennaway Street Tusmore

Origin of present name

Named after Rt. Hon. Sir John H. Kennaway Bart, MP.

In 1911 Sir John Kennaway was a member of the Colonial Board of Advice of the South Australian Company who owned Section 291, which was the land bounded by Portrush Road and Greenhill Road, and approximately by Barr Smith Street and Tusmore Avenue.

Other streets in the vicinity with names associated with the names of the members of that Board when this land was subdivided in 1911 are Bakewell Street, Barr Smith Street, Fisher Street and Stirling Street.

Earlier name(s) if different from present name

Britannia Road.

Waterhouse Road, probably in the Kensington area.

Packhams Road, leading to Stonyfell.

Origin of earlier name

When considering the full length of what is now Kensington Road from the city to the hills no doubt the western end was originally Britannia Road, near the hotel of the same name.

The First Hundred Years records Britannia Road, Waterhouse Road and Packhams Road as earlier names of parts of the road but does not say which parts. However the following historic points may be relevant to those names:

- Britannia Road. No doubt named after the Britannia Hotel or vice versa. This name probably refers to the portion passing Rose Park and Toorak Gardens.
- Packhams Road. David Packham worked the quarry in Gandy's Gully (which is near the end of Kensington Road) and grazed cattle in the area until 1867 when he established a chaff cutting business in Kensington. Later he was Mayor of Norwood/Kensington and MHA for East Torrens. This name probably refers to the portion passing Kensington Park, Kensington Gardens, Leabrook and Erindale.
- Waterhouse Road. Between 1851 and 1857 the *Wattle Grove* house and estate, which is near the south east corner of the junction between Kensington Road and Hallet Road was owned by George Waterhouse MLC and later Premier 1861-1863. This name probably refers to the portion passing Wattle Park and Rosslyn Park.

Origin of present name

Named after the suburbs through which it passes, Kensington, Kensington Park and Kensington Gardens.

The suburb Kensington was named in 1839 after the suburb of that name in London.

Keyes Street Linden Park

Origin of present name

Named after Admiral R. J. B. Keyes (1872-1945).

Keyes was an Admiral during World War I, later becoming First Baron of the name. He was associated with the raid on Zeebrugge in 1918, and was commemorated by the South Australian Company which owned the land at the time of the subdivision.

Other streets in the vicinity with names associated with Admirals of World War I (1914-1918) are Beatty Street, Craddock Street, Hood Street, Jellicoe Street and Sturdee Street.

When the suburb was laid out this was a pathway. The Burnside Council later decided that the paths should have names so that they could be more easily identified.

Canon King was Rector of St Theodore's Anglican Church for many years, including when the church was built in 1915.

The walkway is directly opposite one entrance to St Theodore's.

Knox Street Frewville

Earlier name(s) if different from present name

Queen Street.

Origin of earlier name

Queen Street stretches west from Portrush Road to Glenunga High School where it terminates. The original plan was presumably for it to continue along the current Knox Street, but renaming this small portion of it would have been a sensible way of handling the split units of the road.

Knoxville Lane Glenside

Origin of present name

Named after the former suburb name of this vicinity.

Nathaniel A. Knox (1797-1880) came from County Antrim in Northern Ireland and owned the two Sections 272 and 273 which were bounded by Conyngham Street, Portrush Road (which he is reputed to have named after the town in Northern Ireland), Bevington Road and Greenhill Road. He called the area Knoxville, but it has since been renamed Glenside and (the northern part of) Glenunga.

Soon after his death the 268 acres were subdivided into 430 allotments.

Nathaniel Knox's son, also Nathaniel was later the owner of *Clifton* in Stonyfell.

The adjacent former Knoxville Congregational Church was opened in 1887 and was nicknamed the *Pepperbox* by locals on account of its unique architectural style. It was a totally independent church sponsored by the finance of the congregation for the minister and the assets. In about 2010 it was converted into a residence.

The nearby Cranwell Street (off Allinga Avenue) was named after an early Superintendent of the Sunday School.

Origin of present name

Named after the house *Kurralta* which was built for Dr William Wyatt (1805-1886). The name is Aboriginal for 'set on the hill' and the house which is still located at 23 Kurralta Drive was designed in a Georgian style by the famous colonial architect George Kingston. After Dr Wyatt's death his wife Julia continued living in the house until she died in 1891 aged ninety one. After a period under the control of Wyatt Beneficial Institution it was purchased by George Freeman and then by John Dunstan in 1910. In 1919 Percy Ifould purchased the house

The property originally extended down to First Creek in Waterfall Gully where flowers, vegetables and oranges were grown.
