#### Origin of present name

Named after Robert Norton.

Robert Norton arrived in South Australia in 1836 with the first settlers. He built a house of logs and clay at the place that now bears his name and this was the first road that ascended the tiers of Mount Lofty to his property at Norton's Summit. One hundred and fifty years later the house was still in good preservation and tenanted.

William Sutton was another pioneer in the same area and it was a toss-up whether the place should be called Norton's or Sutton's Summit. Sutton later built the Scenic Hotel.

Robert Norton's daughter Mary was the first female to be married in St George's Church Magill when she married William Cook.
