1 Introduction

1.1 This policy aims to guide decisions relating to the City of Burnside's streets and associated public domain spaces, in order to provide a clear vision of what our community can expect from these important community spaces.

- 1.2 The streetscape is an important component of the City and can have a significant impact on how people experience, perceive and interact with their surroundings and neighbourhood. Streetscapes help define a community's activities, appearance, identity and transport conditions.
- 1.3 High quality streetscapes offer a range of benefits including economic growth, prevention of urban heat island effects, increased biodiversity habitat within the urban core, spaces for passive and active recreation, places for residents to interact with neighbours and increased civic pride.
- 1.4 Council supports taking a well-rounded view of streetscape design incorporating environmental, social and financial sustainability, neighbourhood character including any heritage aspects, positive aesthetics, habitat creation, increased usability and safety.
- 1.5 The Policy will assist Council to achieve the Streetscape Vision of:

"An integrated, safe, accessible, functional, engaging and sustainable streetscape network that conserves a characteristic sense of place, supported by fit for purpose and cost-effective infrastructure that enhances the community's experience of the City."

5 Interpretation

For the purpose of this policy, the following definitions apply:

5.1 "Road" means an area within the road reserve that is specifically developed for, or has as one of its main uses the driving of vehicles, and includes the kerb and gutter;

- 5.2 "Road Reserve" means the strip of land between opposite property boundaries, specifically for the provision of public right of way. It includes the road carriageway, as well as footpaths and verges;
- 5.3 "Streetscape" is the appearance and functions contained within the road reserve in relation to the built form on private and public property. Streetscapes consist of street furniture, signage, landscaping including street trees, fencing, traffic treatments, paths, driveways, street surfaces and utility services; and
- "Verge" is that portion of the road reserve not used for median or traffic purposes, and excludes the kerb and gutter and includes that part of the road reserve between the carriageway kerb and nearest boundary of the adjacent properties. The verge generally accommodates footpaths, streetlights, street trees, street furniture, signage, landscaping, driveways and public utilities.

6 Policy

Council will seek to deliver on the following guiding policy principles:

6.1 HERITAGE AND DISTINCTIVE CHARACTER

- 6.1.1 Streetscapes will reflect the distinctive character and history of the City of Burnside.
- 6.1.2 Design principles will use elements within streetscapes that complement and reflect the City's distinctive character and history, as well as the distinctive character and history of the local area they reside within.

6.2 CONNECTED STREETS

- 6.2.1 Each street within the City of Burnside will be considered in terms of its role and connections within the larger network.
- 6.2.2 Streets will be considered as part of a coherent network that creates a distinctive City streetscape, and consideration will be given to design aspects which encourage greater safety, accessibility and civility, while allowing the safe and convenient passage of all road users, including pedestrians, cyclists and motorists.

6.3 ACTIVATED STREETS

6.3.1 Streets, particularly those around activity centres, will be coordinated and themed areas in order to create vibrant and activated spaces that can be used by local businesses and members of the community. Streetscapes will take into account the particular needs of an area, considering aspects such as creating an identity of place, shade, outdoor dining, safety bollards, bins and seating.

6.3.2 Streetscape designs will aim to encourage community activity such as cycling, walking and incidental social interaction.

6.4 COORDINATED STREETSCAPES

- 6.4.1 Streetscapes will be considered as a whole, rather than as a series of separate components, and will take into account the multiple uses of the various streetscape elements.
- 6.4.2 All components of the streetscape will be co-ordinated as far as possible, taking into consideration the history and sense of place of a neighbourhood, as well as how people use the streets. Designs will aim to create a clutter-free public domain, allowing free movement as far as possible for people with all ranges of abilities, including those with limited mobility, sight and hearing. Street trees will be a core consideration in the design and functionality of any streetscape, in order to preserve and enhance the City of Burnside's reputation for leafy green suburbs and in recognition of the environmental benefits trees provide. Trees will be selected in line with the Urban Tree Strategy.
- 6.4.3 Attention will be given to the multiple uses and functions of streets to create integrated, cool, green, coherent streetscapes which are both functional and engaging.

6.5 ENVIRONMENTAL SUSTAINABILITY

- 6.5.1 Streetscapes will be designed and managed in an environmentally sustainable manner, and consider opportunities for Water Sensitive Urban Design (WSUD) and greener travel options.
- 6.5.2 As part of climate change adaptation, strategies to mitigate urban heating will be incorporated into design principles.
- 6.5.3 When upgrading or renewing a streetscape, material selections will take into account whole-of-life considerations, including financial, environmental and social aspects. Opportunities to reduce emissions, conserve resources and reduce stormwater pollution and run-off will also be considered, particularly in the context of climate change adaptation.

6.6 LONG TERM VALUE

- 6.6.1 Streetscapes will be well-designed and feature low-maintenance, long-life solutions.
- 6.6.2 When selecting elements for streetscapes, promotion will be given to those which will minimise the long-term costs, ensuring they are robust and easy to maintain, whilst still providing the required functionality and complementing the heritage and character of the area.

7 Review and Authority

7.1 This Policy will be reviewed every four years at maximum in line with Council's Policies and Protocols Framework.
