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Mayor's Message

Summer is here and the **George Bolton Swimming** Centre and the Tusmore Wading Pool are already being well patronised.

By the time you read this the changes to the facilities at the Swimming Centre should have been completed with new school group and disability friendly change rooms available.

It is predicted to be a very hot summer, so those of you who live in the foothills make sure you have your Bushfire Plan updated and ready. The CFS educators have already been actively engaged through Neighbourhood Watch programs, grass cutting and the carting away of vegetation has been completed by the City of Burnside. Be aware and take notice of Extreme and High Fire Danger days, avoid dropping cigarette butts while walking or driving in the hills and be bushfire ready!

I am very proud of the work of our staff. The City of Burnside has won the 2023 Maxima Host Employer of the Year award. Council currently has 13 trainees and apprentices studying Business, Conservation and Ecosystem Management, Horticulture and Civil Construction. Council has hosted 101 trainees and apprentices through Maxima since 2013 and deserved this excellent award.

Our Council is working actively toward becoming carbon neutral and one of these projects is the seeding of thousands of native trees near Kapunda in the Light Regional Council area. This was the launch of the Burnside Carbon Offset Scheme (B-COS), which is a three-way collaboration between the City of Burnside, not-for-profit organisation Trees For Life and local business Mantina Quarries. The trees will absorb hundreds of

tonnes of carbon, helping to offset Council's carbon emissions.

We are very grateful to the State Government and Minister Nick Champion for a grant of \$50,000 to be used for signage and tree planting that was a response to the wilful damage and removal of a significant number of trees in a Trees For Life site recently in Auldana. I am also happy to see the usage of the EV charging stations installed by the State Government and the RAA in our Civic Centre car park.



Our biodiversity volunteers were busy throughout the year raising over 7,000 plants for the annual Local Native Plant Giveaway. This giveaway has been an institution in Burnside for over 60 years. Over \$5,000 was raised through gold coin donations for the Friends of Ferguson Park. Thank you to all the volunteers and to those who gave a donation for the plants. Recently, we also had volunteers in Chambers Gully planting natives with the Friends of Cleland Park. Our Council has nearly 400 volunteers who support the services we provide, and we could not achieve these outcomes without them. Thank you to everyone who has volunteered this past year.

By the time you read this we will have opened the Dulwich Community Centre and there are photos in this issue of Focus. I have been pleased to be involved over the past 10 years with decision-making, consultations, planning, grants and

now the realisation of a dream. It is a fabulous new space for our Burnside community. Users of the Conyngham Street Dog Park are also excited to return to the recently revamped space which opened in November, I am looking forward to seeing the Your Neighbourhood Budget items being installed in various locations in Burnside. Community members nominated these ideas and they were selected by vote. Tree and

Dulwich Community Centre Opening

One of the main hubs for community groups in the Burnside area, the Dulwich Community Centre has now officially reopened! A new and improved space featuring a new hardwood floored hall and headed by a large stage area, this centre is perfect for a wide array of activities.

Officially opened on 18 November, local residents were treated to an early access tour on 7 November. Thank you to everyone who came out to launch the Dulwich Community Centre, we can't wait to see it brimming with life for years to come.

Annual Report / Financial Audit good result

We are also in the report time of year. Council recently completed its audit for the 2022/23 Financial Year. The auditors gave Council's financials a clean report.

Some of the highlights from the 2022/23 Financial Year worth noting are:

- Small surplus result inclusive of subsidiaries.
- Final borrowings by Council were lower than foreshadowed in the budget.
- Council successfully completed \$17.6m of Capital Works inclusive of Magill Village Redevelopment in partnership with City of Campbelltown and Department of Infrastructure and Transport.

Council also recently completed the 2022/23 Annual Report highlighting many of our undertakings over the past year. Top projects of note include the completion of the Magill Village Project, endorsement of Burnside's City Master Plan and the implementation of 40 km/h zones across five precincts. Council also scored well in our Annual Community Survey receiving an overall 7.3 out of 10.

Auldana Remediation Project

In less happy news, the vandals who destroyed a large reserve of regulated land at Auldana North Reserve and decimated up to 50 native trees have yet to be identified. This incident, which is expected to have occurred in July, saw a 1,200 square metre plot of land callously cleared directly below houses at the end of Patrick Auld Drive.

Following financial support from the State Government we have now cleared away the debris and installed signage at the site. These signs will act both as a call to action for anyone who may have witnessed the incident and as a deterrent for similar behaviour in future.

The City of Burnside is dedicated to protecting our urban forest. In October we achieved a successful conviction before the District Court of Adelaide for the illegal felling of a regulated tree in Rosslyn Park by a tree lopping business.

CEO takes a local ride

Gaining a perspective of the daily hazards faced by cyclists, Chris also listened to BBUG member's suggestions on how Council could facilitate safer road interactions.

'It was a fantastic opportunity to cycle through the City of Burnside with representatives of the BBUG, looking at ways we can enhance rideability and safety on some of our bicycle routes,' Chris said.

To increase road safety the City of Burnside has been engaging with residents on implementing select 40 km/h zones to create safer streets as part of the ongoing City Master Plan.



The City of Burnside has taken another step towards becoming carbon neutral, seeding thousands of native trees near Kapunda for the launch of the Burnside Carbon Offset Scheme (B-COS).

A three-way collaboration between the City of Burnside, not-for-profit organisation Trees For Life and local business Mantina Quarries, the trees will absorb hundreds of tonnes of carbon, offsetting the Council's carbon emissions.

Carbon offsets are a responsible way to mitigate the negative environmental impacts of greenhouse gas emissions. When organisations release greenhouse gases into the atmosphere through activities like driving or air-conditioning, they contribute to global warming. Carbon offsets offer a way to

counterbalance or 'offset' these emissions by investing in projects that remove an equivalent volume of greenhouse gases from the atmosphere.

Suitable space for this scale of planting was not available in Burnside, but with support from Light Regional Council, land for the project was able to be sourced in the Kapunda area. Local resident and Mantina Quarries Director Rino Obbiettivo was happy to offer property near Kapunda at no cost to ratepayers. The project is converting over six hectares of open pasture to woodland.

City of Burnside CEO Chris Cowley said the advancement of the project marked significant progression in Council's goal to become carbon neutral by 2030.

'The launch of the Burnside Carbon Offset Scheme marks an important step for our City and residents,' Chris said. 'This represents the culmination of years of work by so many of our team – and this is just the beginning.

'We are dedicated to reducing our impact on the environment so future generations can experience it as we have, or in some cases, we will leave it in a better shape.'

Trees For Life Direct Seeding Manager David Hein said the project could result in upwards of 10,000 new plants, all native vegetation that grows well in the area.

'There are sixteen different species in the mix. Over the years they sort themselves out into natural-looking vegetation, providing habitat for birds and wildlife,' David said.

City of Burnside Coordinator of Environmental Sustainability Dr Philip Roetman said the B-COS planting will offset emissions from Council's George Bolton Swimming Centre and Regal Theatre.

'The project is not funded through Council rates. Rather, people using the Swimming Centre and Theatre







pay a small, 10 cent contribution per visit. These individual contributions are minor, but collectively they enable Council to minimise the environmental impact of these facilities,' Philip said.

General Manager for Mantina Group William Short said Mantina Group was excited to provide land for new trees. He described the project as a win-win for all involved.

'We can provide land to plant thousands of trees. It helps the community offset emissions and the trees will be habitat for wildlife. We also benefit as the trees and wildlife will improve the overall visual amenity of the area and provide valuable buffers along property boundaries,' William said.

Along with the thousands of new trees planted for this project, the City of Burnside continues to show leadership in environmental sustainability. Last year, Council installed solar power systems at numerous sites, including the Council Depot, Dulwich Community Centre and the George Bolton Swimming Centre. Over time, these systems will reduce the running costs of the facilities and further reduce Council's carbon footprint.

In October the City of Burnside signed the State Government's Electric Vehicle (EV) Fleet Pledge, helping to support our state's clean energy transformation through the transition to and investment in EV's and smart charging.









As a three-time Tree City of the World, the City of Burnside understands the pivotal role local government plays in leading the way towards a greener future for the community.

With the goal of leading from the front as environmental custodians, the City of Burnside's goal is to continue to develop a prosperous community that is healthy, safe, connected and allows people and nature to live harmoniously.

Council is maximising greening programs, including the development and expansion of the city's Urban Forest, currently comprised of over 42,700 trees, with over 1,000 new trees every year.

A fully mapped and catalogued ecosystem, Burnside's urban forest can be explored in-depth online with an interactive breakdown of parklands, reserves and street trees.

This project was one of the first of its kind to be developed in Australia and provides exclusive insight into industry-leading environmental commitments by the City of Burnside. You can view the Urban Forest Interactive website at trees.burnside.sa.gov.au.

With environmental, health and aesthetic benefits, the urban forest provides many services to those who live and work within the City of Burnside and will assist in safeguarding the community against the effects of climate change. This includes through regulating temperature, improving air quality, supporting biodiversity and enhancing both physical and mental wellbeing of residents and community members.

In line with Council's efforts to preserve and grow the urban forest, residents of the City of Burnside play a critical role in ensuring the advancement of environmental goals through the protection of trees and vegetation on public land – a role more urgent than ever following a recent spate of incidents in which numerous mature trees were illegally felled or heavily damaged.

These incidents follow a landmark first for the City of Burnside, which after many years of court proceedings was able to reach a successful prosecution at Adelaide Magistrates Court on 21 July 2023 for the illegal removal of a street tree

In April 2021 a mature seven-year-old Golden Rain tree was witnessed being illegally removed. After discovering that the removal was not approved by Council, a local resident took photographs and notified the City of Burnside of the incident. Council investigated and with enough evidence to prosecute, issued a summons for the matter to be heard in court.

After a two-year case, City of Burnside CEO Chris Cowley said he was happy with the outcome which was successful largely because of a supportive resident and Council's passionate Urban Forest Team.

'It's been a long and protracted case taking a year to investigate and a further year in the courts,' Chris said. 'It would never have been successful without the quick thinking of the resident who witnessed the incident and reported it to Council.

'I hope that this example highlights the seriousness of the issue and the commitment from Council to take strong action to safeguard the urban forest." Senior Urban Forestry Officer Chris Hawkins said that this was a win in the battle to preserve the urban forest for future generations.



'I've worked as an arborist for 10 years and this is the first successful street tree prosecution that I know of,' Chris said.

City of Burnside Technical Officer Conservation and Land Management Dr Mark Ellis said the impact on local ecosystems from illegal removals like this one ran extremely deep.

'Many of our parks and reserves, especially in the Hills Face area contain remnants of the original indigenous vegetation of the area prior to European settlement. These areas are priceless and are managed for the wide range of flora and fauna they support,' Mark said.

'In our rapidly changing climate it is imperative that we do everything we can to support our local ecosystems, if we lose elements of our urban forest, we also lose the species that depend on those trees.'

Chris Cowley asked the community to help Council defend the City of Burnside's urban forest by reporting any treedamaging activity and gathering evidence where possible.

'We need everyone to know that this illegal behaviour is not acceptable in our community,' Chris said. 'Photographs and statements are what can really change the outcome.'

As the maximum punishment in South Australia for this illegal activity, the courts can impose a \$5,000 fine and record a criminal conviction.

Unfortunately, even following the prosecution of this one offender, Council continues to identify numerous acts of individuals illegally damaging and/or removing sections of the urban forest.

The most notable example comes in the form of approximately 50 mature indigenous trees that were felled in Auldana North Reserve earlier this year. Showing a blatant disregard for the law and a deep disrespect for the importance of the natural area, this act will, unfortunately, go unpunished without community intervention.

In late October, the City of Burnside in partnership with the State Government unveiled signage at Auldana North Reserve calling for community support in finding information on the destruction.

Providing \$50,000 in support, the State Government funds covered the cost of debris removal on site, significant signage, CCTV surveillance, a walking trail through the area and the planting of 15 new mature trees around the City of Burnside.

Burnside Community Grants

The City of Burnside Community Grants Program offers funding support of up to \$5,000 for community groups that provide services and programs to residents that would otherwise go unfulfilled.

Burnside Community Grants 2024/25 applications open mid-January 2024.

Glenunga Rams Basketball Club - Training Facilities and Equipment

Seeking to increase interest in competitive basketball for local players, the Glenunga Rams Basketball Club received a grant to assist with the purchasing of new uniforms, training equipment and court hire.

With around 120 participants - 80 per cent of whom identify as living in the Burnside area, the club has seen quick growth over the past 12 months.

Next on the agenda for the Rams is expanding their girls' teams offerings through recruiting more female players, as well as addressing the urgent need for more volunteer coaches. A low-cost club to join, the Rams will also begin approaching local schools to secure access to indoor training facilities.





Norwood Community Creche Sensory Native Garden

Caring for and educating young children for over 40 years, Norwood Community Creche's philosophy focuses on nature, community engagement and child-initiated activities. With the goal of helping their children flourish and learn about environmental sustainability, the creche was awarded a Community Grant to assist the centre with building a sensory native garden.

Featuring dozens of native plants, the garden acts a resource to develop the creche's themes of 'Belonging, Being and Becoming'. Norwood Community Creche Co-Ordinator Susan Burgess said the centre's indoor and outdoor play-based style would benefit from the promotion of environmental engagement through the grant.

Zonta Club Adelaide Torrens – Breast Cushion Project

A self-funded organisation, the Zonta Club Adelaide Torrens provides support projects for girls and women in the local community.

Provided with a Community Grant to support their Breast Cushion Project, funds from the grant were directed towards the purchasing of raw materials required to create the cushions.

These cushions, of which the club produces around 300 per year, are donated to the Burnside Hospital's Breast and Endocrine Centre. Given to patients post-surgery, the cushions provide comfort and assist through the healing process.







The Shed Building Support for Women

Usually a space to socialise and assist each other with DIY woodwork projects, the participants of the Women's Shed Program held at The Shed are now putting their skills towards a bigger cause - supporting local charity Catherine House.

Dedicated to helping women who are experiencing homelessness, Catherine House offers crisis, longer term accommodation and support services for women over the age of 18, unaccompanied by children.

Building household items like chopping boards, grazing boards, tables, trays, barbeque trays and picture frames, The Shed's women's group has focused on supplying pieces that can be gifted to women upon their exit from Catherine House's services.

Contractor with The Shed for three years and one of the facilitators of the Women's Shed Program, Rose said the group members thought supporting Catherine House would be a positive goal.

'We thought it would be nice to support other women who need a hand up,' Rose said.

Following a Women's Health Week morning tea attended by a member of Catherine House at the start of September, Rose, a self-employed carpenter for 35 years, said the group had been building items whenever they got a chance.

'Catherine House have been very positive. But now it is on us to bring as many women on board as we can, who want to come to The Shed and who want to participate.'

Redeveloped in 2020, The Shed has since become home to both men's and women's groups, acting as a touch point for those over 65 living in the eastern regions. An asset of the City of Burnside, The Shed programs are funded by the Commonwealth Home Support Programme (CHSP) to provide subsidised low level support services and programs.

'This facility is available to help meet the needs of women in the area regarding social aspects, but also meet the needs of women who are wanting to make, or learn to make, fix and build using tools.'

Reinforcing the community feel of The Shed, Rose said there were no expectations of women who came to the facility and that training and support were available throughout the process.

'If any women have an idea about something they would like to work on, they can be assisted through the whole process of what they would like to build. Skill level doesn't matter, we can assist the whole way through,' Rose said. 'We can cater to all types of personalities and how people work. We also do a lot of community projects for businesses and organisations.'





Employee at the facility and facilitator of the Women's Shed Program since the redevelopment three years ago, Helen said the all-female dynamic of the group allowed for more open discussion on aspects of life.

'The community atmosphere of The Shed I think is really important,' Helen said.

'Some of our ladies are single, some of them have partners, when you have that dynamic of being all female, the things you talk about may be the type of thing you can't talk to a family member or partner about. The social aspect is important.'

The Shed's Women's Program runs on Thursday mornings with mixed gender in the afternoon, while Men's Shed Programs run Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday and Friday.

Eastwood & Glenunga Ward Cr Di Wilkins

After long delays, the **Greenhill Road and Hallett** Road intersection upgrade has been completed through Federal "Black Spot" funding.

We hold reservations on whether the new design fully addresses the former safety concerns, or whether some further adjustments are needed, particularly to some of the marked traffic lanes. We would like to hear from regular users of this intersection regarding the success of the new design. Is it working well or are some further tweaks still needed?

We are pleased that our Council colleagues recently fully supported proposed traffic calming measures for the southern section of Lockwood Road. Plans include extending the 25 km/h school zones by 50m each this financial year, the addition of compliant kerb ramps and the installation of heritage style road surface paving at three key intersections (both as part of draft 2024/25 budget considerations), plus the retention of the current "variable message" traffic speed display devices. The effectiveness of the 24/25 measures will be reviewed following installation. We particularly thank the contributions of local residents and Council staff in preparing the report which led to this next step.

We have approached the State Government seeking funding to beautify the roundabouts on Penfold Road at both Kensington Road and The Parade intersections, as a gateway to the heritage Magill vineyards. Though so far unsuccessful, we will pursue the matter through Council as an alternative.

Regarding Council funding, there were several infrastructure projects scheduled for the Burnside Ward in 2023/24, which were put on hold to

keep rate increases to a manageable level. These include the Anzac Lookout upgrading (top of Kensington Road), further enhancements at Bell Yett Reserve, the Moorcroft Reserve heritage bridge restoration, Newland Reserve biodiversity site re-vegetation, interpretive heritage signage within the Ward at various locations, and stobie pole art on upper Greenhill Road. These will now be considered as part of the 2024/25 budget process as well as any new proposals including a review of service levels for residents.

We remind residents that should you wish Council to mow your verge you can opt in for this service either by phoning the Council, or via the website (typing "verge maintenance" in the Search function will take you to the online form).

We both strongly encourage residents to contact us if you have any local government matter requiring support or local knowledge to progress. As recent examples, we are currently investigating the traffic flow in Penfold Road South to determine ways to increase safety in this part of Stonyfell. We also remain alert to funding opportunities to include appropriate female changing facilities within the Newland Reserve clubroom.

One of the gems in our Second Creek walking trail is Michael Perry Reserve, which is located at the eastern end and adjacent to the quarry. The Reserve was established in the 1970s with the subdivision of the former historic Clifton Estate (which dates back to the 1850s). Have a visit and enjoy!

We wish each and every resident of the Burnside Ward our very best for the coming festive season and New Year. We very much look forward to continuing to represent you throughout 2024.

We are fortunate to have these wonderful spring days to enjoy the gardens in our neighbourhoods in Burnside.

Visit the Friends of the State Library website during the Nature Festival, and watch a fascinating illustrated lecture titled "Sowing, Mowing and Growing", describing gardens from the early days of settlement in SA.

Thank you to residents who take the time to mow, weed, water and care for their verge and the tree planted by Council staff. Fertilize and water the tree this summer, as this will reduce the 'heat island' effect in our neighbourhoods and benefit the whole community.

Of concern to the residents of our inner city suburbs is the increasing 'cutthrough' traffic still speeding though our streets. I urge all residents in Eastwood to be careful when walking and driving in our neighbourhood. The parking rangers are being vigilant in patrolling the 'Residents Only" parking in our streets.

Thank you to the many parents, friends and coaches, residents in Burnside, who have supported players in the local Glenunga Rams Junior and Senior football teams this year.

Their commitment to this popular sporting club in our community, has enabled an explosion of young girls wanting to play football from 80 in 2017 to 250 junior girls registered this current season. The 2023 season enabled 11 junior girls teams, the largest girls football club in SA, within the junior program of 35 teams. In August, the Under 13 Junior Girls won their Grand Final in front of a jubilant crowd of parents and supporters at Glenelg Oval.

Grown Up Storytime Comes to You







As part of the City of Burnside's Disability Access and Inclusion Plan, Burnside Library has been trialing a new specialty event aimed at increasing community outreach to residents living in local assisted living and aged care facilities - the Burnside Home Library Grown Up Storytime.

In August 2023, the program delivered its first group sessions, visiting both Regis Burnside and Estia Health Toorak Gardens for 90-minute readings of poetry and short stories by Burnside Library staff, with a second event held in mid-October.

Run in conjunction with the Home Library Service, the Grown Up Storytime initiative aims to increase social interaction and mental stimulation for those living in assisted care who are unable to make it to the library in person.

Burnside Library Customer Service Officer Melissa Davenport said the program will hopefully make a difference to the lives of those they visit.

'In the Home Library Service, we see the difference we can make in people's day even with such a small interaction - this is the magic we are hoping to recreate through this idea,' Melissa said.

'The library is an incredible community resource and we try to make sure that everyone can benefit from it even if they cannot visit the library.'

During their stay in assisted living facilities, residents may experience social isolation, depression and anxiety. Studies indicate that consistent social engagement can aid in reducing these potentially detrimental effects, offering improvements in mental wellbeing and fostering a sense of belonging within a community.

Burnside Library Coordinator of Customer Service Judy Brown said it was still the early days of the trial program, but hopes were high that with more exposure the service would be able to grow to reach more people across more facilities.

'We've had positive feedback from our previous two events,' Judy said.

'Burnside Library is always looking to innovate our service offerings to residents and the wider community.

'We have plans to deliver a special Christmas-themed event later in December that we are extremely excited about."

Still in the early stages of development, Burnside Library is currently taking expressions of interest from any other aged care or assisted living facilities in the City of Burnside area that would like to participate in the Burnside Home Library Grown Up Storytime program.





Australia's Chess Capital January 2024

In conjunction with the SA Chess Association and GIHS, the two national championships will feature Australia's best players and showcase high-level competition and strategy.

Burnside Chess Club member Joe Giarratano said the chance to have the national competition in Adelaide was a great way to bring eyes to the sport and Burnside.

'This was all organised by the City of Burnside and the SA Chess Association, it will be a big event,' Joe said.

Having experienced an upswing in popularity the past few years, chess is a captivating and intellectually stimulating sport offering endless enjoyment to players of all ages and skill levels. Combining intricate strategy and forward-thinking, chess presents endless possibilities, ensuring that no two games are the same. Whether a beginner learning the basics or a seasoned Grandmaster, the timeless appeal of chess lies in its ability to engage your mind, spark creativity, and foster a strong sense of competition.

President of the South Australian Chess Association Alan Goldsmith said the recent surge in the popularity of chess could be attributed to numerous factors. From excess free time during the pandemic, improved access and quality of online sites and mainstream attention through the highly rated Netflix show *The Queen's Gambit*.

'People often think of chess as a sport or an art form or even a science, some like doing puzzles or studies and some enjoy the psychological struggle with an opponent,' Alan said. 'But whatever the reason, it appeals to people of all nationalities, ages and backgrounds.

'It is not only a good social outing but also a great way to keep the brain active.'

With numerous activities and events to be held at the Glenunga Hub and Burnside Library during the tournaments, residents are encouraged to get along and support local players.

'There will be a carnival-like atmosphere with free chess workshops for beginners through to advanced players, simuls against chess masters, community tournaments and other special presentations by some of Australia's best chess players,' Alan said.

'We are very grateful to the Burnside Council for all their support and we hope to see many more of the community taking up or returning to the game. It's a fabulous way to make new friends, ward off loneliness and keep your brain sharp and active - the game is beautiful!'

'We are an amateur club, we are people who just want to come play chess. Come in, socialise, have a good game, you win or you get beaten, it's for the fun,' Joe said.

Fire Danger Season – What you Need to Know

Changes to available services on catastrophic fire days.

On Extreme and Catastrophic Fire Danger days there will be a reduction in the services that Council provides in the Mt Lofty Ranges Fire Ban District. Services will recommence following a return to normal weather conditions with extra servicing for domestic waste collection to maintain an up-to-date service.

Services will be uninterrupted on Moderate or High Fire Danger days.

The Service Delivery Matrix is based on a risk management approach to ensure the safety of the community and workers, through controlling services if they are likely to cause/contribute to a fire risk or place the community or workers at risk.

While Council may not be in a position to provide certain services on Extreme or Catastrophic Fire Danger days, residents can still raise requests for services online at bit.ly/CoBAction or by phone on 8366 4200 for attention when safety permits. For further information on service reductions visit bit.ly/CoB_changestoservice.

Australian Fire Danger Rating System

Most of the City of Burnside area is leafy suburbia with no direct bushfire risk. However, on the eastern extremes of the Council area is the Mt Lofty Ranges Fire Ban District. This area extends along the foothills of the southern Mt Lofty Ranges, one of the most fire prone areas in the world due to the Mediterranean climate and characteristic hot summer months.

Every year the Adelaide Hills experience a number of summer days with occasionally strong dry northerly winds and low humidity that create conditions for extreme bushfire risk. If you live within the Mt Lofty Ranges Fire Ban District, danger is on your doorstep.

The Australian Fire Danger Rating System (AFDRS) is your simplified survival tool, telling you how dangerous a bushfire would be if it broke out, and what you need to do to stay safe on Moderate, High, Extreme and Catastrophic days. Go to bit.lv/CFSAFDRS.

You can also refer to the City of Burnside website for further information and advice at bit.ly/CoBFire.

If you and your home are not fully prepared for a bushfire, or if you have any doubts about your ability to defend your home, you should plan to leave early.

Prepare now: clear around your property, pack an emergency kit and know your closest Bushfire Safer Place.

Plan ahead: do your five minute bushfire plan and share it with loved ones today and plan for all your pets and livestock.

Stay informed: check the Fire Danger Rating each day and stay informed using more than one source of information in case a fire starts near you.

Know your Fire Danger Rating, monitor local conditions and keep informed.


Backyard Burning

Outside of the fire danger season, you can apply for a permit to burn vegetation as part of your fuel reduction program. Permits will only be granted for residents in the Hills Face Zone.

During the fire danger season you will not be granted a permit to burn fuel. Please ensure your fuel reduction program is concluded prior to the fire danger season. While no permits for burning will be granted for the fire danger season, residents are able to light a fire for cooking food or providing comfort (all year) provided conditions are met, except on a total fire ban day.
