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Mayor's Message

After a particularly cold and wet winter, I am really looking forward to getting outdoors more and enjoying some sunshine.

The rain has been great for our parks, gardens and reserves and for filling dams and waterways. It has been excellent for our new tree and shrub plantings and our staff have been really busy with this over the past months.

Since our last issue, many important events have occurred that you can read about in this issue. Firstly, we adopted the Annual Budget and Long Term Financial Plan after much consultation and consternation. We had to cut or defer projects and make difficult decisions that impacted our community in different ways. You have told us in surveys what you hold dear to you and those comments inspire me. A good community is a cohesive, safe, confident, prosperous and happy place and positive communities are groups that inspire their members in ways that promote a sense of self-discovery and group connection. That goal is reflected in our Strategic Plan.

We have celebrated diversity and culture through the annual Japanese Cultural Day, Firstival SA, National Reconciliation Week, Disability and Inclusion Expo, NAIDOC Week, Environment and Sustainability Expo, a Citizenship Ceremony and the Pepper St Arts Centre reopening. I have celebrated with the Beaumont Scouts, Rotary, Lions, Burnside Hockey Club, Men's Breakfast, English Speakers, Ladies' Probus, Kent Town Swimming Club, Burnside Painting Group, Dulwitches, Burnside Legacy Widows and enjoyed the company of our fabulous volunteers. I also enjoyed great shows at The Regal Theatre, attended a Ukrainian

fundraiser, welcomed a new minister to St David's Church, met with Local and Federal members of Parliament, and planted my purchases from the annual Conyngham Nursery Plant Giveaway in my garden. We have also received a wonderful donation from Josephine Dey (pictured) of a beautiful table that was brought out to Australia by the Clark family (Hazelwood Park) in 1850 and it is now located in the Mayor's Parlour.

I was delighted to support the learning of children from Years 3, 4, 5 and 6 from Loreto College, Pembroke School, Burnside Primary and St Peter's Girls' during the months of June and July. It is never too early for students to learn about local government, rules and decisionmaking. I welcome all schools to take the opportunity to learn about what councils do and how they operate, to visit the Chamber and the Mayor's Parlour. They are the level of government most directly connected to local communities.

I have been lobbying for nearly 14 years to get interstate freight off the South Eastern Freeway and Portrush Road. State and Federal Governments have come and gone to no avail. But at least now there is a plan, and our CEO Chris Cowley and I ventured to Canberra in July to talk with the Federal Minister of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Local Government, the Honorable Catherine King MP about the Greater Adelaide Freight Bypass funding. We want to get the B-doubles off Portrush Road to improve the safety and liveability for our residents and all those traversing our city. We produced a fact sheet to give to the Minister to support the bypass through Truro and support productivity by building such a bypass. You will find it on our website. The health of all those who live in our suburbs near the current transport route is impacted by air and noise pollution as well as traffic concerns. 2,404 heavy vehicles drive along Glen Osmond and Portrush Roads every day and another eight metropolitan councils are impacted by this freight movement. 273 people have lost their lives or were seriously injured between 2017-2021 as a result of road crashes on Portrush and Glen Osmond Roads and the South Eastern Freeway within our council boundary. This bypass will not happen without Federal Government funding and the State Government needs to provide financial support too. Adelaide is the only capital city in Australia where the National Highway network runs through residential suburbia. We will continue to lobby both governments.

Weekly green organics trial

This month the City of Burnside will be launching a six-month trial of weekly green bin collections, with red landfill bins moving to fortnightly collections.

The trial, occurring only in the suburbs of Beulah Park and Kensington Park (north of Magill Road) will encourage residents to reduce their landfill waste and encourage more environmentally conscious choices.

Disposal of garden organics and organic kitchen waste through green bin composting is 85 per cent cheaper than sending the same material to landfill and assists in taking pressure off council rates.

Residents not included in the trial zone can still make a difference through the use of kitchen caddies and remaining vigilant in placing waste in the correct bins. If you do not currently have an organics kitchen caddy for your home, each household in the City of Burnside is entitled to one free caddy and two free rolls of compostable bags which can be collected from the Civic Centre.

Greater Adelaide Freight Bypass

At the beginning of July Mayor Anne Monceaux and I travelled to Canberra to attend the Australian Local Government Association's National General Assembly and to lobby on behalf of the Council in support of reinstating federal funding for the Greater Adelaide Freight Bypass (GAFB). These efforts included a meeting with Federal Minister for Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Local Government the Hon Catherine King MP (pictured). Adelaide is the only capital city in Australia where the National Heavy Vehicle Regulator's heavy vehicle network, the major arterial route, runs through the residential suburbs of a city, a unique distinction we no longer wish to hold as a matter of public health and safety.

Through the creation of a freight bypass, we will reduce the volume of heavy vehicles on Portrush Road and Glen Osmond Road thus increasing traffic flow and reducing noise and pollution. National Freight Data Hub statistics from 2018 reveal on average over 2,400 heavy vehicles access these roads every day and the creation of the bypass would relocate 877,000 heavy vehicles from the route per year.

It is our hope that through these efforts we will see federal funding return to the Greater Adelaide Freight Bypass and a reduction of heavy vehicles on our roads.

Expo success

The Burnside Civic Centre recently hosted both the Environment and Sustainability Expo and the Disability and Inclusion Expo, with both events an outstanding success.

Thank you to all those who came along and spoke with industry leaders as well as supported local businesses and community groups. We look forward to these annual events continuing to service the community in future.

Re-use and Recycling Hub

Did you know the City of Burnside has introduced the Re-use and Recycling Hub to help you dispose of some unwanted items that cannot be thrown in landfill?

Items like mobile phones, spare cords and chargers, empty printer cartridges and old X-rays need to be disposed of properly to avoid damage to the environment. Other household items like light bulbs, eyeglasses, loose CDs and DVDs, small e-waste and blister packs are better recycled than put into landfill.

This new free drop-off point located at the Burnside Civic Centre allows anyone to dispose of the listed items during Civic Centre business hours. Larger items, like televisions, microwaves and computers can be disposed of at the monthly e-waste drop-off location at the City of Burnside depot.

KGR dogs on-lead trial amendment

Following a Council Resolution, there has been an amendment made to the specifications of the dogs on-lead trial in the north-western corner of Kensington Gardens Reserve / Kensington Wama.

The trial will now be in effect until 13 December 2024 under the following new rules:

- The area declared as a dog on-lead area is all land within the area bounded by the below map in red, totalling approximately 7,840 square metres.
- During school terms set by the South Australian Department for Education, the dog on-lead area will operate between 8 am and 9 am as well as between 3 pm and 4 pm Monday to Thursday.

Appeal for the Greater Adelaide Freight Bypass

On 2 July, CEO Chris Cowley and Mayor Anne Monceaux travelled to Canberra to attend the Australian Local Government Association's National General Assembly, using the opportunity to lobby on behalf of Council in support of reinstating federal funding for the Greater Adelaide Freight Bypass (GAFB).

The City of Burnside is in favour of a reduction in the volume of heavy vehicles on Portrush and Glen Osmond Roads via the GAFB, which will have a range of benefits, including an increase in freight productivity, a reduction in damage and injuries because of traffic collisions, improved traffic flow, a reduction in noise and pollution and more. Wheelchair squash is coming to Burnside

A new wheelchair squash program will be coming to the City of Burnside later this year, with almost \$40,000 of federal funding supporting this inclusive initiative.

As part of the Australian Sports Commission's Play Well Participation Grant Program, the City of Burnside is one of 29 councils to receive funding and the only metro council in South Australia to share in over \$10 million of funding nationwide.

This exciting new program will be held in the Kensington Community Leisure Centre, 342 The Parade, Kensington Park, in partnership with Squash Australia, Squash SA and YMCA SA.

Frank's Coffee SA partners with Wellness Hub

At the Glenunga Hub, Frank's Coffee has partnered with the Wellness Hub to donate \$2 for every coffee sold during the program to the Rotary Club of Burnside, until the end of the year. The owner and founder of Frank's Coffee, Julian La Starza, said supporting the program was a great way to give back to the local community.

The Burnside Wellness Hub is a collaboration between the City of Burnside and the Rotary Club of Burnside, providing a monthly program for elderly residents featuring unique guest speakers and the opportunity to connect with likeminded members of the community to increase social interaction.

New dog on-lead areas

Earlier this year the City of Burnside went out to the community to consult on whether four areas with high biodiversity value should be declared dog on-lead areas. In total, 751 valid responses to the community consultation were received, with strong support for requiring dogs on-lead to protect wildlife. This ranged from 75 per cent support for Michael Perry Botanic Reserve, to 79 per cent support for the wetland at Kensington Gardens Reserve / Kensington Wama.

At the 18 June 2024 Ordinary Council Meeting, Council supported new dog on-lead areas in Chambers Gully Reserve, Heatherbank Reserve, Michael Perry Botanic Reserve and the wetland area at Kensington Gardens Reserve / Kensington Wama.

Plant Giveaway raises funds for local conservation

This year, residents have generously donated just under \$6,000 in return for native plants grown in the City of Burnside Biodiversity Nursery as part of the annual Native Plant Giveaway. These funds will be given to Friends of Ferguson Conservation Park to help support community bush care volunteers working to restore Ferguson Conservation Park, including the preservation of threatened native orchid populations.

Weekly Green Organics Trial

The City of Burnside has commenced an exciting new initiative - a trial of weekly green organics bin collection.

Starting in September, around 1,300 households and businesses in Beulah Park and the northern side of Kensington Park will have their green organics bin collected weekly and their red landfill bin collected fortnightly. The collection of yellow recycling bins will remain fortnightly.

Although a first for the city, similar trials have been successful in other South Australian councils. These trials have had great support among participating households and have reduced waste going to landfill.

Why trial weekly green organics collection?

Bin collection should meet the needs of most households

Most household waste is organic waste from the kitchen and the garden. Additionally, most household landfill bins do not need to be collected weekly because they are half full or less. So it makes sense to increase the capacity of the green organics bin collection to better suit the community.

Ease of use

Households will have their organics collected weekly, so do not need to worry about the smell or waiting another week for the collection of organics.

Reducing landfill volumes

Providing weekly organics collection has been shown to increase the use of green organics bins for food waste. In this way, households are sending less material to landfill.

Financial savings

It's five times cheaper to compost organic material such as food waste, rather than sending it to landfill. Therefore by increasing the composting of food waste, weekly organics collection keeps pressure off Council rates.

Improving environmental sustainability

The contents of the green organics bins are turned into valuable compost, rather than being wasted in landfill. When food waste is composted, it breaks down quickly. In contrast, when food waste goes to landfill, it breaks down slowly and releases methane, a powerful greenhouse gas.

Creating local jobs

The composting industry creates and supports more jobs than landfill sites.









What do locals think?

Rob from Beulah Park

City of Burnside resident for 25 years, Rob said his household is always mindful of what materials are placed in the organic and landfill bins.

'This just makes sense to me and I'm very keen to be a part of the trial,' Rob said.

As part of his gig on Coast FM, Rob produces a monthly radio segment called 'Which bin', where he 'talks trash' and the benefits of proper waste disposal. Rob said he tries to instil his passion for waste into his family and the wider community.

'We use a kitchen caddy for kitchen scraps, and we are very mindful – even when our grandchildren are here – that they know the right product that goes in the green bin and caddy.

'The trial is an excellent initiative and I

fully support it.'

Resident for 10 years and a busy mum to Amelia, Rebecca is another resident who will be part of the six-month trial.

'We compost any food scraps that we have, and we make sure to not over shop and buy too much food,' Rebecca said.

'It's quite easy to do at home. Council provides the caddies and liners for free. All you need to do is have it on the bench, chuck your scraps in it and take it out to the green bin. It's no more difficult than recycling or taking out landfill.'

'I just encourage people to be invested in the trial because the more we do as individuals, it can make a big difference collectively.' The trial is an excellent initiative and I fully support it: - Rob

Further information

The trial was approved by Council to support responsible waste management. The trial will run until the end of February 2025. The results will be reviewed by Council prior to the conclusion of the trial and residents will be updated on progress.

Households involved in the trial will receive a welcome pack, including detailed information and project resources. While most households are ready for this change, some households will need extra support. For example, Council can provide a larger landfill bin to help households.

Olympic Medallist Thrives in 3R's Program



The City of Burnside is proud to be home to many remarkable individuals, including Norma Thrower of Glenside, a former Olympic 80-metre hurdler who now participates in the city's 3R's program.

Representing Australia at the 1956 Melbourne Olympics, Norma earned a bronze medal in the 80-metre hurdles, finishing behind fellow Australian Shirley Strickland. However, it was her gold medal win at the 1958 Commonwealth Games in Cardiff that Norma cites as the pinnacle of her athletic career.

'Winning the Commonwealth Games in Wales, that was my career highlight. In Rome, I was in the team, but I bombed out in the semi-final,' Norma said with a laugh.

Inducted into the South Australian Sports Hall of Fame in 2023, Norma was honoured as one of the state's premier athletes. Beyond her Olympic achievements, she has excelled in golf and tennis and was formerly the captain of the South Australian A-grade women's basketball team.

Norma's family has always been at the core of her journey. Married at 20, she has two children and four grandchildren. Her father, Arnold Austin, was a pivotal figure in her career as her lifelong athletics coach.

Norma has been a member of the City of Burnside's 3R's program – Respite, Recreation, and Revitalisation – since the start of this year. Encouraged by her daughter, she now attends weekly sessions at the Civic Centre.

'A group of us come every Wednesday; we're all over 80. I enjoy coming in, I always have a ball,' she said.

The 3R's program offers a variety of activities designed to keep participants engaged and uplifted, while also providing essential social support. 'We have musicians come in, and we have a dance. It really boosts your mood. Other days, we've had an exercise instructor visit and art workshops,' Norma said.

The program aims to foster a sense of community and wellbeing among senior residents, offering opportunities for social engagement. Norma's experiences reflect the program's impact.

'After a few years, the girls start to rely on each other and lean on each other to talk. It's a supportive environment.'

The 3R's program is designed for individuals over the age of 65 who are socially isolated and want to connect with the community. Funded by the Federal Government through the Commonwealth Home Support Programme

(CHSP), the program is accessed via a My Aged Care referral. Groups meet weekly from 10 am -2 pm, with coffee and lunch provided, and offer a variety of activities including exercise, art, music, puzzles, and entertainment, all with the goal of getting people out of the house and enjoying themselves.

Koala Season is Here

Spring is now here, and with it, our local koalas are becoming more adventurous.

September to February is peak koala breeding season, with male koalas more mobile, and young koalas becoming independent and moving away from their mother in search of their own territory. This increased activity results in a high number of reported koala incidents across parklands, private property and roadways. Early evening and hours of darkness are when koalas are most active and may come down to the ground.

It is the responsibility of all residents and visitors to remain vigilant when driving through koala-inhabited areas as they may venture onto the road in search of food.

If you're walking your dog in our parks and reserves, please ensure your pet is always under control. Koalas often descend to the ground to move between trees, making them vulnerable to curious or aggressive dogs. Keeping dogs on lead and under supervision helps safeguard both your pet and the koalas.

If you come across any injured wildlife including koalas, please call Fauna Rescue SA, or another wildlife rescue group.

Men's Breakfast

An initiative of the City of Burnside funded by the Commonwealth Home Support Program, the Men's Breakfast has been meeting every Monday morning for over 10 years to provide mateship, social interaction and general life support to one another.

Member of the Men's Breakfast since day one, Burnside resident Graeme said the group dynamic always rings with positivity and is a great social outlet for so many in the area.

Having formed a cycling group with other members, Graeme and others have shaped tight bonds extending beyond the breakfast.

Meeting every Monday morning, the Men's Breakfast promises jokes, stories, positive vibes and a delicious hot meal. Always welcoming of new members, all you need is

Your Neighbourhood Budget Webb Street Reserve Little Library



In Rose Park, tucked away in Webb Street Reserve, is the newest community project as funded by the 2023 Your Neighbourhood Budget.

Full of books for all ages stands the Little Library, the latest in a lineage of community projects funded through the program.

Webb Street Reserve is known for its red firetruck play equipment and is bordered by Rose Park Preschool and Rose Park Norwood Scout Group. Both Rose Park Community Childcare and Rose Park Primary School are also within a stone's throw.

Submitting the proposal in 2023 for the Little Library was Rose Park resident of 57 years Joy Shepherd. The submission also covered the restoration of the fire truck play equipment.

Joy's idea was sparked after comments from her grandchildren regarding the lack of play equipment in the park for older children, and after seeing an advertisement for Your Neighbourhood Budget, she set to work. With assistance from her daughter, Joy letterboxed all the houses along Watson Avenue and Hewitt Avenue asking for suggestions of equipment to help widen the appeal of the park.

Joy said she was thrilled with the engagement from residents in the area.

'Some people replied with quite clever ideas, one of them was the little library.'

After deciding on the Little Library, Joy reached out to Rose Park & Toorak Gardens Council Member Lilian Henschke to assist her with the submission process. During the following community voting period, the Little Library received the most votes of all proposed projects.

'We had the support of the kindergarten, the parents and members of the community, they all voted for us. We hope this will appeal to people of all ages in the community,' Joy said.

Following approval, the Little Library was constructed by members of The Shed on Conyngham Street, before being handed over to local artist Sarah Moller, who in collaboration with the children at Rose Park Preschool designed the artwork for the exterior of the Little Library.

'I came in and spoke with the children about some designs,' said Sarah who is also a parent at the preschool.

'We incorporated designs from various picture books including *Garden Stew* by Carrie Gallasch.

'We have a pear tree on the box that is inspired by the pear tree at the back of the preschool and the lemon-scented gum from Webb Street Reserve. It took about 20 hours over one month to paint.' Director of Rose Park Preschool Marie Kelakios said after working with Sarah the children were extremely excited to see the new installation and be able to read the books inside.

Known as a community hub for the area, Webb Street Reserve is utilised daily by the preschool parents, Scouts group, nearby businesses and a local mother's group.


In attendance for the installation of the Little Library that she assisted with the submission for, Council Member Lilian Henschke said community initiatives like those from Joy were important for community and youth development.

'When we hear from the community, ideas emerge, especially from the youth,' Cr Henschke said. 'This time it was from the grandchildren of a long-term resident.

'Spots like this where a child can walk out into the open air near a playground and then to be able to engage with a book in play is so important for their development and their growing love of reading.

'The experience of where you read is really important. We all reflect on our first memories of when we started reading, it is fundamental to create that foundation.'

The Webb Street Reserve Little Library is now available for your reading needs. Residents are encouraged to take and leave appropriate books for all reading levels.

The Regional Landscape Levy is a State Government imposed tax, which councils are required to collect on behalf of the State Government under the Landscape South Australia Act 2019 with all funds going to the State Government and not the City of Burnside.

The chamber recently adopted our latest budget and long-term financial plan for 2024/5 which represents a rate rise of 9.8%.

The original recommendation from the administration, via our Audit and Risk Committee, was a one-year rate increase of 14%, keeping us in surplus, with a return to regular rates next year, with no disruption to services.

As it stands, the endorsed plan for the coming financial year sees the budget in deficit and a reliance on a second year of an above inflation rate rise in 2025/26. Alongside this is a cut in expenditure to recurrent programs, operating projects and new and renewal capital projects. It also relies on councillors not introducing any new projects, upgrades or service provisions until 2026/7 at the earliest.

The underlying issue has been, at least for the six years we have been in the chamber, that we are collecting income at a rate too low to match our expenditure. We have generally had community satisfaction both with our low rates (nearly the lowest in Adelaide) as well as the services we provide. The solution council has adopted has been to fund new capital expenditure through debt over 15 years, which of course comes with additional interest payments. It also means that today's projects are being paid for by future residents.

An alternative model would be to have higher rates now, giving us a 'war chest' with which to pay for new capital, with little to no borrowing. However, our economic reality involves operating with debt, which is done by governments, businesses and households world-wide.

Council's financial situation then further deteriorated because of the two-year rates freeze put in place during the COVID-19 pandemic.

We did this during the previous council term, to help out ratepayers without cutting any spending. We need to play catch up now, but the proposed 14% solution comes during a 'cost of living crisis' which many cite as a reason to reject such a bandaid measure.

The difference between the adopted budget and the proposed adjustment equates to a difference of \$88 for the average household, which is \$1.70 a week. It might be easy for some to write this off as an insignificant saving but this 'cup of coffee a fortnight' argument discounts the other 'cups of coffee' that are proverbially being sacrificed by cost-of-living pressures from utility bills, mortgage rates and supermarket visits.

What seems clear to us is that if we want to remain a council that has rates lower than most other places in the state, then curbing our spending and avoiding debt as much as possible needs to be a priority. How to spend less though, but still provide the services and facilities that are so valued by the residents of Burnside? The answer will lie in us making tough

decisions about future funding levels and service provision, which is what you have elected us to do. We are always available at

As we anticipate some warm spring weather it's great to see our many community, cultural and sporting activities resume apace.

Burnside is proudly an increasingly culturally diverse community with around 33% of our population born overseas. We have developed into a rich multi cultural society of distinct ethnic and cultural groups – from our First Nations people with their rich history, to our pioneering Anglo Celtic and German settlers, to post war migrants from Italy and Greece and our more recent Chinese, Vietnamese and Indian migrants.

While blended into a fantastic community, we celebrate our diversity by aiming to provide an environment where all of us enjoy equal access to life's opportunities and our terrific staff coordinate important programs promoting inclusion, offering a range of services so there is no cultural or social isolation.

On environmental matters, with my dedication to preserving our tree canopy it has been a great concern to lose so many of our SA blue gums across Kensington Oval Reserve over the last 18 months.

Expert investigations indicate this may be caused by a Phytophthora pathogen and treatment has been started by soil drenching sites with phosphoric acid before any tree replanting can take place. It is anticipated that understory plantings with acacia species will then help manage, if not control, the impact of this soil pathogen.

There have also been some tree losses in Hazelwood Park, east of Wombat Waterhole with the cause yet to be determined for these.

I am thrilled to share some exciting developments in our community.

One significant change is the approval of 40km/h speed limits in many new areas. This measure is a crucial step towards enhancing road safety for all residents, particularly pedestrians and cyclists.

We are embarking on an innovative research project: a local repair hub. This investigation aims to create a space where residents bring broken their items and skilled local volunteers offer support to repair them. This project fosters community spirit and promotes sustainability by reducing waste. While exploring this concept, we are also investigating the possibility for a hard waste exchange hub within the City of Burnside. Essentially, this hub would function as a central location where residents can bring used goods to trade with others. Unlike our current hard rubbish system, which requires scheduling, this aims to create a more accessible and efficient solution for reusing items. A report is due back to Council by October.

Our trial for weekly green bins will soon commence in parts of Kensington Park Ward. This initiative is designed to reduce landfill waste and support the circular economy, which is becoming an integral part of our community activities.

Addressing the concerns from residents about prolonged traffic congestion caused by parked cars, we have implemented new safety measures around Pembroke School, particularly on The Parade and Walsall Street.

Burnside Ballroom Goes Platinum

Officially opened on Saturday 11 December 1954 by Mayor J H Parkinson, the Burnside Ballroom is this year celebrating its milestone 70th birthday.

With the interior of the building on the State Heritage List, the Ballroom is an iconic building in the history of the City of Burnside and the wider Adelaide region. Mostly untouched since its unveiling, there are few known examples of this modernist style of interior left in South Australia, with most of the Ballroom's fixtures and fittings still in their original condition.

The Ballroom was originally built to accommodate the growing population, as the Burnside Town Hall was unable to handle the increasing numbers. The residents voted overwhelmingly in favour of the concept and the construction took place over twelve months at a cost of £32,000. Architects Evans, Bruers, Philpott & Partners designed the building and Fricker Brothers Limited were contracted for construction.

The Ballroom offers a spacious ground floor and mezzanine level, entrance foyer, ladies' powder rooms and gentlemen's cloakrooms, bar areas on both levels and a ground floor kitchen. The venue also features a stage and seating booths with tables along the eastern and western walls. As an additional wing to the 1928 Town Hall and Council Chambers, the exterior was designed to complement the existing Inter-War Free Classical architecture. The interior is an exceptional example of 1950s modernist design, with art-deco style proscenium, vinyl seating booths, and decorative metalwork.

A high-quality venue with world-class features, the Ballroom was a popular hot spot for many in the community. In the three weeks alone following its grand opening, the Ballroom hosted three balls, three concerts, and a radio show. The space also became the home of the Princeton Club, a popular venue for teenagers from across Adelaide in the 1960s.

Established in 2020, the City of Burnside Heritage Reference Group was created to discuss and propose strategies and projects that identify, promote, preserve, and enhance the City of Burnside's built and cultural heritage including the Ballroom.

One member of the Heritage Reference Group is Colin Harris. For Colin, the Burnside Ballroom holds a special place in his heart and history, having had his first date with his wife Elizabeth at a Burnside Ballroom event.


Following their date at a Girton Girls' School (now Pembroke School) Old Scholars Ball in 1965, the two were married in 1969.

'For us, the Burnside Ballroom was the start of a wonderful partnership with two daughters. Whenever I see the Ballroom my thoughts go back to that date,' Colin said.

A third-generation Burnside resident, Colin is also a Former President and now Life Member of the Burnside Historical Society and a Fellow of The Royal Geographical Society of South Australia.

Today, the Ballroom continues to be a popular community space for parties, musical events, concerts, exercise classes, volunteer celebrations and civic receptions. Annual events in the Ballroom include the Japanese Cultural Day and the upcoming Annual Glenside Lions Art Show. It has also played host to music acts such as the Penny Rockets, Vonnie Jay, The Clefs, Fraternity, the Twilights and John Farnham.

The State Planning Commission is seeking feedback on draft planning rules to enhance housing diversity for South Australians and provide more affordable options for different household types, life stages and lifestyle choices.

The proposed Future Living Code Amendment seeks to enable new forms of co-located housing development that allows more homes to be built without impacting on the existing character and streetscape of established suburbs. This Code Amendment encourages existing houses to be retained, altered and extended to create co-located housing, rather than demolished and the site subdivided for multiple homes.

The co-located housing model incorporates communal, open gardens and shared facilities.

We're back!


