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Mayor's Message

Welcome to the Summer Focus. We farewelled our CEO, Chris Cowley, who has led the team for nearly five years and we welcomed Martin Cooper as the Acting CEO, who will lead the Council until we have selected a permanent replacement and this process is well underway.

By the time you read this, the George Bolton Swimming Centre and the Tusmore Wading Pool will have reopened. I know that these will be very popular over summer, especially since it is predicted to be a very hot and dry one. Please be considerate of the neighbours when using Tusmore Park and keep dogs clear of the zone. Food and drinks are not allowed in the water area. I cannot wait to be swimming again in the Burnside pool. Looking at a ceiling is nowhere near as pleasant as watching the sky, birds and trees as I exercise. Club training and lessons are underway again and it is great to see people enjoying Hazel's Poolside Cafe once more.

It is Fire Danger Season once again, so if you live in bushfire areas, update your Bushfire Plan. Please take care when walking, riding, working or driving in the hills. Cigarette butts and power tools are hazardous already when the grass is long and dry. Keep to paths, carry water when you walk and take your rubbish away with you up on the Hills Face walking and biking trails.

Two great service organisations celebrated special birthdays in the past months. Burnside Country Fire Service celebrated 90 years and they gave me a special baseball cap with my name on it for my support of the service over the past 14 years. Meals on Wheels started in Port Adelaide 70 years ago by Doris Taylor who lived in Norwood. She began this incredible service that continues as her legacy all these years later, with the Burnside Branch operating for 60 years. Thank you to all the volunteers!

The Commissioner for Young People in SA, Helen Connolly, recently collected feedback from 18,328 primary school children aged 8-12 from all over the state. Her report titled 'A 6-Point Plan to Make SA a Better Place for Kids', July 2024 found that young people want to be listened to before changes are made that affect them. They want to be understood more and to have adults spend more time with them. They want more places to play and more things to do. They want increased safety and to feel safe when at play. They, like us all, would like to have the cost of living come down, as it is impacting on their families. They also have much concern for each other, particularly in relation to people being kind and non-discriminatory. They also care for the environment and want their cities and towns to be more sustainable by creating more nature parks and getting people to recycle more and put their rubbish in the bin.

The City of Burnside now has a Youth Development Officer, Jessica Watts, whose role is to support youth in our city. As part of our Youth Action Plan, we need to know what support, events and programs you want. So the Future Focus Gen Z survey is a call out to young people in our city to hear from them by 15 December. This is open to 12 to 25-year-olds and this is a fast-growing part of our community. What do Burnside young people want? Go to our website for a Chinese translation of this Gen Z survey.

On 14 December at the Rose Park Fallen Soldiers' Memorial Statue at the corner of Alexandra Avenue and Prescott Terrace, there will be a commemorative service to mark 100 years since the *Helping Hand* statue was installed and dedicated. It was sculpted by Charles Web Gilbert and manufactured in France. With its poignant message about mateship, this will be a time to give thanks and remember the fallen.

CEO's Message

It has been my pleasure to step into the role of Acting CEO while Council continues our search for a permanent replacement for former CEO Chris Cowley, who as of November has moved on to new opportunities.

Chris was a valued leader for Burnside over the past several years and his shoes will be hard to fill. The process to replace him is expected to last into the new year. I look forward to keeping you all up to date on this process as it unfolds.

George Bolton Swimming Centre and Tusmore Wading Pool

The City of Burnside is incredibly fortunate to be home to two publicly accessible pools, with each proving a unique experience in the summer months. The iconic Tusmore Wading Pool is one of the most popular spots for relaxing and is a great place to introduce your young ones to the water, with no entry costs.

While George Bolton Swimming Centre continues to be the premier location in the eastern suburbs for more competent swimmers, with a 50m lap pool as well as paddle pools for the kids. GBSC is a great spot for swimming lessons with classes available for both kids and adults. Over the past 12 months we have significantly upgraded this facility including the recent pool heating upgrade to an electric system, the updated school change rooms and a Changing Places compliant facility.

Both pools are now open for the 2024/25 season.

Annual Report and Financial Audit

We are also in the report time of year. Council recently completed its audit for the 2023/24 financial year. The auditors gave Council's financials a clean report. Some of the key points from the 2023/24 financial year worth noting are:

- \$3.3m deficit result, inclusive of subsidiaries.
- The large deficit is result from an infrastructure asset revaluation and the flow on effect to Council's annual depreciation.
- Council successfully completed
 \$15.6m of Capital Works. 79 per cent
 of these works were replacement
 and renewal of existing assets.

Council also recently completed our 2023/24 Annual Report highlighting many of our achievements over the past year, including:

- 224,222 visitors to the Burnside Library
- 1,541 tr ees planted on Council land
- 6.5km's of renewed footpaths
- 30,763 calls through to our Call Centre.

The grant, supplied through Toy Libraries Australia, will provide \$1,000 to create a social story on how to visit the toy library. The goal of this story is to provide support for children with developmental delay and additional support needs including ADHD and Autism, as well as those who may have English as a second language.

The story will provide information on what the toy library looks like, what to expect and how it runs, including noise, children, sharing, toys and behaviours. By providing this information and scenarios, we aim to ease any fears or anxiety so that your toy library visit is positive for both children and adults.

Penfold Park: Cooler, Greener, Wilder

Council has been successful in a recent application and been awarded a \$25,000 Cooler, Greener, Wilder Grant from Green Adelaide for Water Sensitive Urban Design (WSUD) Investigation and Design for Penfold Park.

The project will improve stormwater quality with natural treatments to improve drainage, increase onsite retention of water, improve planting, improve amenity and increase water quality. Council has recently completed similar projects such as Glenside detention basin and the Kensington Wama / Kensington Gardens Reserve wetland.

Youth Concert Band Celebrates Milestone

Congratulations to the Burnside Youth Concert Band on celebrating their 20th year.

Burnside Youth Concert Band is led by conductor John White and is for musicians aged 8-26 from across Adelaide's Metropolitan area. It provides a fun, safe, inclusive and supportive space for young musicians to share their enjoyment in performing live music.

Shed Hosts Minister for Health and Aged Care

George Bolton Swimming Centre

The City of Burnside's most popular swimming destination is now open for the swim season, with a brand-new electric heating system powered by solar panels.

Prior to these recent upgrades, George Bolton Swimming Centre was heated using an old gas system which was responsible for one third of Council's carbon emissions. This upgrade will go a long way towards the City of Burnside's objective of reaching carbon neutrality by 2030. New heat pumps and noise attenuators have also been installed.

Due to the delayed opening there will not be a Term 4 Swim School program. However the Term 1 2025 Swim School program will continue as planned.

Hazel's Poolside Cafe is also back and open for business.

Unfortunately, Council has made the decision to close the playground at the George Bolton Swimming Centre for the entirety of the 2024/25 swim season due safety to concerns. For more details and to have your say on the playground's future, complete our community engagement on page 17.

Burnside Community Grants

In 2024 the City of Burnside offered the Community Grants Program, providing financial support to local community groups of up to \$5,000. These funds were to help deliver community programs and services that would otherwise go unfulfilled.

Gold Foundation – Inclusive Hospitality Program

A not-for-profit organisation providing support for young people on the Autism Spectrum, the Gold Foundation was successful in their application for funding towards their Inclusive Hospitality Program.

A comprehensive 12-week program, the course will teach Autistic young people the ins and outs of working in the hospitality industry from highly experienced mentors. Modules for the program cover topics including hands-on coffee making experience, customer service, health and safety, food handling, stocktake and experience working in the Gold Foundation's 'Shine Like Gold!' Mobile Café and the KOM Café.

Community Manager for Gold Foundation Connor Pangallo said that the participants gain more from the program than just hospitality abilities. 'Participants develop essential skills, knowledge, and confidence to successfully transition from school life into adulthood, enabling a fulfilling and independent livelihood,' Connor said.





Friends of Cleland National Park – Weed Control and Restoration

Undertaking works to restore the stunning Cleland National Park, including weed and invasive species control, Friends of Cleland National Park devote thousands of volunteer hours per year to the surrounding areas.

Awarded funds for the purchasing of bush care equipment, the group will undertake continued works in areas affecting City of Burnside residents, including Chambers Gully and Winter Track.

Chapel Street Community Garden – Growing Together: Children's Community Garden Pilot Project

'Growing Together' aims to enhance Chapel Street Community Garden as an educational space for local children with the help of experienced volunteer gardeners, focusing on sustainable food production and fostering a connection with nature. This initiative is designed to educate young children about sustainable food production, promote healthy eating and foster a sense of community responsibility and environmental stewardship.

Kensington Gardens & Magill Ward Councillor Jo Harvey said the community garden was a hub for local enthusiasts and the grant money would provide vital support to the fledgling program, as it seeks to guide local children through the process of sustainable food production from planting to harvesting.

Intergenerational Program, Support Across Generations

In a feel-good program that is bridging generational divides, this initiative in Kensington Gardens is helping bond young and old members of the community.

As an intergenerational program, this initiative seeks to build strong, cross-generational bonds by bringing together residents of Estia Health Kensington Gardens and students from Kensington Gardens Preschool Centre. With the support from facilitators SA Montessori, the program creates opportunities for meaningful interactions and relationship-building in a structured and supportive environment.

With their close proximity on either side of Kensington Road, the pairing is a natural fit. Two groups of students take turns visiting the aged care facility throughout the year, spending time with residents and forming connections.

Kensington Gardens Preschool Centre Director, Melissa Quartuccio said the guidance provided by SA Montessori had been invaluable and that the children had been thriving with a new sense of community.

'It can be difficult to build the initial connections. The City of Burnside has been essential in getting this off the ground. We couldn't have done this without them,' Melissa said. 'The kids really love being able to interact with older people. We have a lot of children who are new arrivals, so they don't have their grandparents around - they love the interaction and the one-on-one time.'

Facilitators SA Montessori were engaged through the City of Burnside, who funded their inclusion in the program through a partnership agreement. Consultant with SA Montessori Jessica Langford said other communities had implemented this type of engagement with great success and the organisation hoped these types of programs would become the norm moving forward.

'The benefits of intergenerational engagement are becoming a lot more widespread,' Jessica said. 'There are benefits that perfectly align for both groups and those that are separate. The beauty of this is that it benefits both. Both groups get the positivity around the connection, friendship, communication and positive interaction.'

'In long-term intergenerational programs, we see a correlated reduction in the decline of cognitive abilities, including those with Dementia or Alzheimer's. When engaged in programs like this, the rate of decline is much slower than in those who are not.

'It can be challenging in a residential aged care environment to get everyone engaged. There's something about having the children there with their energy and enthusiasm that encourages you to get involved. The kids don't let you sit back and watch.' Known lovingly within the program as 'grandfriends', the residents have been enjoying the opportunity to engage with the students and break up their usual routines.

Leisure and Lifestyle Coordinator at Estia Health Kensington Gardens, Sonisha said the program was igniting passion for the residents, which had been on display during the sessions.

'This program has been something they are really looking forward to and gives opportunities to residents who do not usually come to other activities. Some of the less social residents can be overwhelmed by activities, but not with the children. They really look forward to days like this,' Sonisha said.

One resident who has certainly had their passion ignited is grandmother of six and former high school home economics teacher, Pat, who said the program had already had an impact on residents, herself included, and especially on some of the older members.

'It puts a smile on their face,' Pat said.

Wheelchair-bound, Pat said many of the children had never interacted with someone in a wheelchair before. They eagerly approached her with questions, which she used as conversation starters and educational moments.

'Most of the kids here seem to be really involved in what they're doing. If you look around, there isn't a sad face, and there is no one who doesn't want to be here.

'I'm looking at going across the road to the Preschool and doing volunteering, just to get me out of here and stimulate me a bit more.'










Shaping the Future of Youth Programs



At the City of Burnside, we recognise the vital role that young people play in shaping the future of our community.

Youth programs are not just about recreation—they are a strategic investment in our city's growth. These initiatives provide young people with the skills, knowledge and opportunities to contribute meaningfully to Burnside's development and become active citizens.

By participating in these programs, young residents offer fresh perspectives and innovative ideas, while also gaining a deeper sense of responsibility and belonging in their community. This engagement empowers them to take ownership of local issues, driving positive change now and into the future.

As part of our continued outreach pathway, Council recently created the Youth Development Officer position to lead a variety of programs and initiatives for young people, maximising positive interactions for youth in the community.

Tasked with the goal of increasing youth participation and investment in the Burnside community, the Youth Development Officer position has been filled by Jessica Watts (pictured) since July 2024. One of Jess' main focuses since commencing her role has been the initiation of the Youth Action Plan survey – Future Focus Gen Z: Your Voice, Your Future, designed to understand the needs and requirements for youth in the city aged 12-25.

In the coming months, the community can expect a range of youth programs with a renewed focus designed to foster connection and engagement with young people. These initiatives will aim to help young people build essential skills to become job-ready, offer support for mental health, and provide fun, safe events where youth can gather. Additionally, there will be collaboration with local sporting clubs and community groups to create opportunities that enhance community involvement and personal development. These programs aim to build a stronger sense of belonging and empowerment among young residents.

The City of Burnside's Your Voice, Your Future survey is out for consultation until 15 December. Open to community members aged 12-25, the purpose of the consultation is to assist Council in tailoring services and initiatives moving forward.

Prepare, Plan, Stay Informed This Fire Season

Preparing for a bushfire is essential to protecting your home and family.

This year the Fire Danger Season began on 15 November 2024 and will end on 30 April 2025.

By slashing long grass, removing debris, cutting back overhanging trees and cleaning gutters, you increase your home's chances of surviving a fire front, ember attack, or radiant heat.

Most of the City of Burnside area is leafy suburbia with no direct bushfire risk. However on the eastern extremes of the Council area is the Mt Lofty Ranges Fire Ban District. This area extends along the foothills of the southern Mt Lofty Ranges, one of the most fire prone areas in the world due to the Mediterranean climate and the characteristic hot summer months.


Living in a bushfire-prone area means having a written and practiced Bushfire Survival Plan. This plan will guide you in making informed decisions early, avoiding last-minute choices that could be deadly. Research shows that most bushfire fatalities occur when people attempt to flee too late, so planning to leave early is always the safest option.

Prepare now: clear around your property, pack an emergency kit and know your closest Bushfire Safer Place.

Plan ahead: do your 5 minute bushfire plan and share it with loved ones today, and plan for all your pets and livestock.

Stay informed: check the fire danger rating each day and stay informed using more than one source of information in case a fire starts near you.

Know your Fire Danger Rating, monitor local conditions and keep informed.

Australian Fire Danger Rating System

The Australian Fire Danger Rating System (AFDRS) is your simplified survival tool, telling you how dangerous a bushfire would be if it broke out, and what you need to do to stay safe on Moderate, High, Extreme and Catastrophic days. Go to bit.ly/CFSAFDRS.

The results of a recent community consultation have shown strong support for the establishment of dog on leash areas in three parks within or abutting our Ward, being Michael Perry Reserve, Chambers Gully Reserve and Heatherbank Reserve, which has now been approved by the full Council.

Please be aware of the new arrangements when walking your dogs in these reserves.

The 2024/25 budget was a testing time for all Councillors as a concerted push to reduce expenditure resulted in some Ward projects being deferred.

However, the Newland Reserve biodiversity site re-vegetation and the Lockwood Road South traffic treatments were agreed to proceed. In times of budget restraint and lower Council rate expectations, we continue to be vigilant in accessing grants from other organisations and institutions to assist us in delivering projects for our Ward. In particular, the internal upgrade of the Newland clubrooms, especially for female players, remains a key community concern for us to progress.

Eastwood & Glenunga Ward Cr Di Wilkins

The over-building in height and density that is planned on the former site of the heritage Glenside Hospital, is a lasting legacy of former Labor governments.

Current residents who have bought into the 8 storey apartment buildings & townhouses were not informed in their purchase contracts, that four 20+ storey towers were planned to be built on the remaining green space in this heritage precinct in the City of Burnside.

The Jamie Larcombe Centre, a Veterans' mental health precinct that provides mental health and Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder services, as well as the Glenside Mental Health Treatment Centre for people with mental illness, rehabilitation and recovery services, with severe and persistent needs, are located on this site.

There is increased traffic & parking congestion within this development now, as well as on the arterial roads of Fullarton and Greenhill Roads, particularly when the proposed new Housing Trust over-development is constructed on Greenhill Road next to the Air Apartment building.

Residents in Eastwood are already experiencing increased traffic and parking congestion in our narrow suburban streets, because workers in nearby businesses daily seek parking in our local streets. Drivers speed from Glen Osmond Road to Fullarton Road and 'cut though' John, Main, Elizabeth, Matilda and Markey Streets, to avoid the Arkaba corner and lights at Mulberry Street, in the new Glenside development. **Residents in Hauteville Terrace are** alarmed that there is increasing speeding traffic through Trust Lane, previously planned as a closed laneway for residents.

Safety for residents, both elderly and children in our community, should be the priority.

Kensington Gardens & Magill Ward Cr Kerry Hallett

Long before the arrival of Europeans, the Adelaide Plains and Mount Lofty Ranges were home to Kaurna Miyurna (Kaurna People) who shaped and managed the environment.

Early settlers reported Kaurna people camping, conducting ceremonies and burials in the Burnside area.

Kensington Wama (Kensington Gardens Reserve) was a special place for Kaurna Miyurna. It was a spirit place. The tall gums formed a natural protection against oppressive winds in summer and winter. The land had been shaped for hundreds of years by Kaurna firestick practice. The ancient Red Gums not only supplied materials for weapons and domestic use but were part of the ceremonies and rituals that governed life and death. Over tens of thousands of years, the Kaurna Miyurna laid to rest their warriors, their women, and their children in Kensington Wama.

Burnside Council commenced its reconciliation journey in 2020, establishing a working group of three Kaurna representatives, the Mayor and three other Council Members, the CEO and staff 'champions'. A City of Burnside Reflect Reconciliation Action Plan was collaboratively developed and endorsed by Reconciliation Australia.

However, as a result of our 2024/25 budget deliberations, Council decided to suspend its reconciliation journey. Consequently, there is now an opportunity for community members to come together to champion and progress reconciliation.

Reconciliation is celebrated in workplaces, schools, community organisations, groups and by individuals Australia-wide. Now more than ever, a voice for reconciliation is needed in our own community. 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New Experiences for Volunteers

Volunteering is a great way to be active in the community and give back in an area you are passionate about.

At the City of Burnside we are lucky to be supported by 371 volunteers across 34 programs. Collectively these volunteers donate approximately 26,500 hours per year to volunteering throughout our Council area, the equivalent of 13 full-time staff.

A 2020 study from the Australian Bureau of Statistics found that over an estimated five million Australians volunteered through an organisation, with women aged 40-54 the most populous group.

One of the city's most dedicated volunteers is Christine Baillie, who has been a volunteer with Burnside for over 25 years and gives her time to the Biodiversity Nursery on Conyngham Street. Christine was the city's first ever official biodiversity volunteer.

Contributing to local biodiversity projects in an informal capacity for five years prior to the establishment of the Conservation Volunteer Program, Christine has been involved in the original planting of native flora in several high-profile biodiversity sites, including the Bell Yett Reserve creek line, Kensington Park Reserve, Tusmore Park and Langman Reserve. Today she is a regular participant in the weekly Karra Tartu (Waterfall Gully) bush regeneration project. 'It's wonderful to get out with likeminded people and be learning on the job and seeing the rewards of what you have accomplished,' Christine said. 'The knowledge I have gained is invaluable.'

'It's a very good feeling being at Waterfall Gully and seeing the indigenous regeneration once the weeds are gone.

'The experiences I have had while volunteering are hard to explain in words.'

Another dedicated Burnside volunteer is Bryan Draper, a member of our library team, who recently celebrated his 95th birthday!

A volunteer of 16 years, Bryan is the heart of the Library Books Repair team, coming in twice a week to help restore damaged books and assist new volunteers in the program. Named Volunteer of the Year in 2020, Bryan is an indispensable member of the Burnside Library.

Thank you to all our outstanding volunteers for their hard work, dedication and commitment to making Burnside the best it can be!

Council Members Fight for Safer Community Hub

Multiple Council Members are in the process of lobbying the Department of Infrastructure and Transport for funding to assist in the construction of a new pedestrian refuge, which would be located on Kensington Road outside the Wattle Park Shopping Centre.

This high-density foot traffic area is located on a 60 km/h road which is also home to a nearby kindergarten and grassed reserve space. The stretch of road is frequently used by trucks and is a key thoroughfare for multiple bus routes.

Burnside Ward Councillors Mike Daws and Jenny Turnbull and Kensington Gardens & Magill Ward Councillor Jo Harvey have lobbied for this project on behalf of their communities, with the aim to have this funding approved to increase safety and accessibility for the many residents who cross this road every day. 'This area of Burnside is one of the busiest in the city,' said Cr Daws. 'A pedestrian refuge on Kensington Road in close proximity to the Wattle Park Shopping Centre and the local kindergarten will significantly raise the safety levels for all ages as they cross Kensington Road at all times of the day.'

Kensington Road acts as a border between the Burnside and Kensington Gardens & Magill Wards and is managed by the State Government as a key arterial road, running from Wattle Park in the east to Kent Town in the west.

Cr Harvey reinforced the need for support from the State Government. 'Hopefully the State Government recognises the need to support our community with a safe refuge crossing, which is desperately needed here on busy Kensington Road. To get this recognised as a high-risk area is an essential step forward in safety.'

'The library girls call in with a book for me every month. When I was no longer able to read because of my eyesight they started to deliver me audio books.'

Now settled in seamlessly to Pineview Village, Bess can sum up her time living in the city with one quick statement – 'What a good decision!'

Repair Cafe Consultation




