

## Mayor's Message

### Waterproofing the East

In the Spring Focus edition two years ago I advised of Burnside's commitment to this visionary stormwater recycling project, which will store stormwater in underground aquifers during winter flow, recover the stored water in summer months and reticulate it to parks and gardens in Burnside, Walkerville and Norwood, Payneham and St Peters. The genesis of the scheme was the very adverse consequences of the 2005 - 09 drought years on the parks and gardens in these three councils.

The project has been underpinned by generous grants of \$10 m from the Federal Government and \$2 m from the Mt Lofty Ranges Natural Resources Management Board. The three councils shared equally the balance of cost to a total capital spend of \$22.8 m.

The project is environmentally sound and (with the assistance of the grant funding) financially viable for the participating councils. It will deliver non-potable (not of drinking quality) water along a distribution network covering 46 kilometres at a cost considerably below the prevailing SA Water price. Water will be available to be sold to other potential users along the network with many schools and businesses expressing interest.

Two years on, what is the status of the venture?

The project may be divided into four stages. The construction stage is the essential infrastructure of the reticulation network, pumping stations for injection and extraction, storage tanks and filtration ponds. Some residents may have experienced what I trust was a minor inconvenience if the reticulation network construction travelled down your street. This stage which carries the greatest financial risk because of unknown ground conditions, is now 90 per cent complete and expected to be completed at below budget cost – a most commendable outcome.

The second stage, component commissioning - the testing of installed infrastructure - is 85 per cent complete. The third and fourth stages, systems commissioning and operations have yet to commence but these phases carry relatively low technical and financial risk. It is anticipated that stormwater harvesting will be underway this time next year for distribution the following summer.

During the construction and commissioning phases, the project is in the capable hands of consulting engineers Wallbridge Gilbert Aztec, which has delivered on every milestone. The project will in due course be operated by a regional subsidiary controlled by the three participating councils in a model similar to East Waste, which manages waste collection for six participating councils.

This project is an outstanding example not only of cooperation between neighbouring councils but also cooperation between the three tiers of government.

#### **Electronic Rates Notices**

Go Green. Go Electronic. Receive your rates via email.

A new 87 cent charge for a hard copy rates notice has been introduced by Council to encourage the electronic distribution of rates, provide convenience for ratepayers, allow delivery of notices in a timely manner, save paper and reduce waste. eNotices (the new electronic delivery of rates notices) will make it easier to manage rate payments and your rates notices will be accessible on any computer or mobile device anytime, anywhere, 24 hours a day, seven days a week. To register for eNotices please visit www.burnside.sa.gov.au and refer to your first instalment rates notice for your eNotice reference number to avoid the 87 cent charge.

Ratepayers who hold a concession/seniors card and cannot access the internet, can however request for this fee to be waived. This can be done via the following methods:

#### Learn to Swim

Burnside Swim School lessons teach swimming strokes as well as water safety. Children enrolled in the term programs receive free entry to the centre during the time of enrolment (even on non-swimming lesson days).

## **Streamlining Depot Work**

The Depot has now gone live with a new work order system that allows teams working in the community to go from one job to the next, creating more efficiency in managing Depot works.

Up until recently a Depot Team would complete a work order, for example responding to a resident's request to fix a pot-hole, and then return to the Depot for the next 'job'. Now staff can receive their next work order while they are out in the community using tablets on a touch screen using a cloud based system. Depot staff no longer have to go in and out of the office to get hard copy work orders – they are transmitted electronically to their tablets to create and receive their work.

The Work Order system uses a newly released off-the-shelf product that was tailored using in-house IT expertise to accommodate the many services that the Depot provides for the community. All work orders are now entered electronically into a request system and all the data is stored and accessible for other workers and supervisors to use for continuous improvement and future evidence based decision making.



## Help with your Spring Clean

Preparing for your 'spring clean' or getting ready for the summer and holiday season?

For rubbish that can't go into your regular kerbside bins book your hard waste collection now!

The City of Burnside and our collection partner, East Waste, offer an At-call Hard Waste collection service that allows you to book a collection time that is convenient for you. Due to high demand from the community your pick-up will occur within 4 weeks from the date of your call, on Wednesday or Thursday of each week.

You are entitled to one FREE pick-up per year and you can book at any time of the year by calling East Waste on 8347 5111, or go online at www.eastwaste.com.au

When you book your collection with East Waste you will be provided with a sticker to place on the items you want collected.

#### What do I do with items not accepted as hard waste?

All residents can play an active role in sorting hard waste for recycling before their service occurs by checking out Council's A-Z Domestic Waste Disposal Guide, especially for what will be accepted for hard waste collections, at www.burnside.sa.gov.au, and what you can do with items that are not 'hard waste'.

waste will be held at Norwood, Payneham and St Peters Depot, Davis Road Glynde, Saturday 28 October 9 am – 3 pm.

The following items will be accepted:

- Acid and Alkalis
- Brake fluids
- Car care products
- Cleaning products
- Coolant
- Other household chemicals
- Paint. Liquid only. (Maximum of 100 litres, secured in containers of not more than 20 litres www.paintback.com.au)
- Pesticides, insecticides, rodenticides, herbicides and other garden chemicals
- Photographic chemicals
- Polishes
- Pool chemicals
- Solvents (including paint thinners, turpentine).

#### What happens on pick-up day?

Place your hard waste items on the kerbside the night prior to your collection or before 6 am on the collection day.

Hard waste not salvaged or saved will be disposed of at an alternative fuel facility; processing the hard waste into an engineered fuel product used to fire the kilns at Adelaide Brighton Cement, replacing the use of non-renewable fossil fuel.

Using the hard waste service is an environmentally responsible way of reducing landfill and meeting the needs of our community.

## The cost of business

Every year Council estimates the increase in the 'cost of business' to deliver services to the community (ie construction and maintenance of roads, footpaths, drains, parks, facilities and environmental projects, staff salaries and contractor costs such as waste management and recycling).

Other pressures such as State Government cost shifting and cost increases above general inflation (such as electricity costs) are also considered.

In the 2017/18 budget year the estimated increase in cost of business is 2.88 per cent.

Through financial savings and discipline Council is delivering a 2.30 per cent average rate increase instead of 2.88 per cent.




## **Rates**

The City of Burnside seeks to achieve rate stability over time while ensuring that the services, projects and infrastructure needs of the community are met.

The fundamental principle of equity within the community and an assessment of the impact of rates across the Council's area forms the criteria for annual rates modelling, which is then used to develop a planned review of the basis of rating each year.

The City of Burnside's Rating Policy provides detail on land valuations and valuation objections. 
#### Our 2016/17 achievements

Include providing and maintaining high quality and targeted services and programs for our community.

- Installed irrigation and grass at the Conyngham Street Dog Park.
- The City of Burnside assumed management of the 6,800 sqm historical Attunga Gardens that are part of the Burnside War Memorial Hospital grounds.



• 23 km of new footpaths and 800 m of new drainage



- Electronic lodgement of development applications through the City of Burnside website.
- Achieving cost savings through the sharing of IT investment and services with neighbouring Councils.
- Outdoor Cinema in the Park events.
- The eroded fire trail at the head of Chambers Gully Reserve was repaired by resurfacing, installing cut off drains and earth shaping to manage stormwater flows from the cliff areas and to prevent a repeat of the erosion; to ensure that emergency and management vehicles can access the base of the Burnside walking trails and also Cleland Conservation Park.
- As Harris Reserve new fencing was installed to improve safety of, and allowing views into, the reserve. A new recycled bitumate pathway was installed linking Glynburn Road with the existing path to Lock Avenue. A raised mesh platform was installed to protect the Morton Bay Fig tree roots.

 ANZAC Lookout Remediation works that included vegetation clearing and the installation of an ANZAC memorial in recognition of the 100 year ANZAC anniversary.

#### Strategic initiatives for 2017/18

Continue providing and maintaining high quality and targeted services and programs for our community.

- Continued commitment to the Brown Hill Keswick Creek Project; a collaboration between the Cities of Burnside, Mitcham, Unley, West Torrens and the Corporation of the City of Adelaide to develop a Stormwater Management Plan for the Brown Hill and Keswick Creek catchment.
- Silt removal in Hazelwood Park and Michael Perry Reserve Ponds.
- Up to \$200,000 to progress the Magill Village Partnership - a collaboration between the City of Burnside and Campbelltown City Council to improve the Magill Village experience.



•Local Artists Exhibition Support project to encourage and support community groups, schools, not-for-profit organisations and artists to exhibit artwork and connect with the local community.

It is an artist/group run space supported by Council, giving local artists and groups the opportunity to exhibit and showcase their work for public display.

- An Efficiency and Effectiveness Program will target \$560,000 worth of savings through efficiency and effectiveness of service delivery.
- The development of a detailed Conservation Plan for Michael Perry Botanic Reserve with an implementation timetable and costings to preserve the historic garden.
- Design and plan upgrades to reserves, playgrounds and tennis courts in line with the Asset Management Plans.
- Planned upgrades of old traffic signals to LED technology through the Traffic Signals Light Emitting Diode (LED) Upgrade project.

## Council Champions Biodiversity in Burnside

The dedicated City of Burnside Biodiversity Team is one of Council's hidden treasures, working to maintain and preserve biodiversity in Burnside.

The team consists of 10 dedicated volunteers working under the guidance of Dr Mark Ellis, Technical Officer Conservation and Land Management, and supported by the Burnside Bio-Team of Donna Spandrio and Jess Gaedtke. They grow local indigenous plants, wild flowers, grasses, shrubs and trees. Annually, the nursery produces 10,000 to 15,000 plants.

The team is passionate about preserving native plants and promoting them. The biodiversity team aims to propagate five new species each year, and often trades plants with other local Councils and shares information. "There are many native species that we don't know how to grow yet in Australia," Dr Ellis says.

"Seeds have a natural dormancy that must be broken in order to germinate. In the wild, it could be animal ingestion, extreme heat or extreme cold." The team tries to replicate these conditions artificially, by heat treatment, refrigeration and using smoked water, which replicates a bush fire.

Dr Ellis says it is important to protect local species and not allow 'foreign' species to take over. "We collect seed locally, to maintain species integrity," he said. "We try to grow as close to native bush as possible, as this can bring local wildlife back into the area."

"Indigenous plants are disappearing in urban areas and we need to protect them," he said. "Extinction is forever."

Dr Ellis encouraged people to help protect Burnside's precious flora and fauna by planting local native plants in their garden, creek line or hills face property.

"Council recently held a Native Plant Day which was so popular the nursery ran out of plants in just three hours." Almost 2,000 plants were given away for just a gold coin donation.

Native plants protect and provide habitat for everything from bees and butterflies to birds and small mammals. Some of our local native plant species only remain in small pockets in Council reserves. By residents also planting in their gardens it increases their numbers and extends their population – important for maintaining genetic diversity and ensuring cross pollination.

Derek Bransbury has been a biodiversity volunteer for seven years. Each week he spends two to three hours working at Alan E Cousin Reserve, Burnside. "I get a lot of satisfaction from seeing the area transformed from a weedy mess to native vegetation," Derek says. "We have echidnas back and at least one resident koala." Koala Rescue chose the reserve to release two young koalas saying it was one of the best sites in Burnside.

The Garden commemorates Constable Hyde who was shot in the vicinity 100 years ago while trying to stop an armed robbery. It is community land which cannot be sold and is provided for passive recreation in what has become a very busy area. Council is working with the community to develop a management plan for the Garden.

This is an opportunity for local households, charities, community groups and schools to join up to sell or trade their unwanted clothing, goods etc and maybe make a small profit. The City of Burnside recognises that the local community sector plays a vital role in empowering people to have an active role in shaping their own future and achieving their aspirations and goals.

The City of Burnside offers four different funding programs: Community Grants, Quick Response Grants (Individual and Community Group / Organisation), Strategic Community Partnership Grant and Major Grants.

In providing community funding, Council aims to achieve five objectives:

Ours is a very diverse community with very diverse needs. Tough economic times weigh heavily on everyone. Many rapid changes are upon us. ## **Ballroom Series**



Writing about Council finance and debt is less enjoyable than extolling the achievements of parks and gardens and service to residents.

Rose Park & Toorak Gardens Ward

The 10-year Long-Term Financial Plan will be presented to Council in October and follows the 2017/18 budget which increases debt.

We had almost no borrowing three years ago but now have borrowings of about \$15 million against annual income of \$45 million, and the current Plan projects \$24 million of borrowing by 2022 with repayments extending over 20 years.

Inevitably contingencies arise such as the \$500k unbudgeted each year over the next three years for Waterfall Gully flood mitigation, and we have off balance sheet exposure for the Brownhill and Keswick Creek stormwater project, and possibly ERA Water.

Convention measures Council debt as the Net Financial Liabilities Ratio. Ours is 45 per cent and projected to rise to 57 per cent. In comparison, Campbelltown has a ratio of 5 per cent and over the next 10 years will have liquid financial assets of \$30 million rather than debt.

While there is debate in state politics about rate-capping, Council debt should also be part of the equation, for it has potential to leave a legacy of financial burden.

Spending more is easy, but is it fair for the next generation?




