

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Mayor's message

Welcome to this Spring edition! It's time for some good news and sunshine. The major decision made by your Council was the approval of the Annual Budget and Long Term Financial Plan. This means a 0% increase in rates for the second year in a row.

Two very important Citizenship Ceremonies were held in The Regal Theatre in June, with 135 new citizens from 38 different countries becoming citizens and making Australia (and Burnside) their home. The Regal is also continuing to be updated with exterior painting, the upgrading of audio-visual equipment and lighting improvements.

Celebrations of Reconciliation and NAIDOC Weeks have involved staff and elected members working with local Kaurna elders and library staff working with children from Burnside Primary School. We have also been involved in cultural awareness training and the commencement of our Reconciliation Action Plan.

The former Laurel Avenue Nursery site has been officially renamed the 'Laurel Avenue Pirkurna Wirra/Peter Bennett Organic Community Garden'. This is going to be a wonderful community asset and place of growth and contemplation. Thanks to the Rotary Club of Burnside for providing a picnic table, seats and a cubby house.

You should start looking for Blue Plaques in Burnside. A number of these plaques telling the brief histories of these homes in Burnside have been installed. There are more to come, with 'oldest' businesses also being considered for a similar form of recognition. We need to be reminded of our history.

The Biodiversity Team held their Native Plant Giveaway from The Hub to Burnside ratepayers for enhancing our environment. Many vouchers for larger tree planting have also been collected. Continued planting is important for habitat and cooling because of the rapid loss of canopy happening in Burnside.

We opened the recreational and play space on the corner of Fullarton and Greenhill Roads. It is already proving popular with families with all-age children, teenagers and young adults. This area was completed by Cedar Woods for Burnside, in conjunction with the Brownhill and Keswick Creek Stormwater Scheme development that you can see continuing in the east parklands. This Scheme is a partnership with Mitcham, Unley, Adelaide and West Torrens Councils.

The Tusmore Wading Pool has commenced construction, with hope that our much-loved facility will be available in early 2022. The pump track continues to be popular and is now in Penfold Park. By that time it will have been located in every ward in Burnside, so all youngsters have had the chance to try it out in their local area.

The Glenunga Tennis Club building is at lock-up stage and should be completed by November and it looks great. The Newland Reserve tennis courts are being resurfaced, and the East Torrens and Kensington Gardens court redevelopment is also progressing well, with new public toilets being attached to their existing building and available for all park users.

There have been two Master Plans approved by Council, one for Penfold Park and the other for Tregenza Oval. These plans provide us with opportunities for staged development. The Old Collegians' Rugby Clubroom at Tregenza Oval has been transformed with great support by the club and both Burnside Council and State Government. These facilities will benefit female and male players of all ages and be available for private hiring.

I hope you are enjoying the online videos on our website and Facebook page. The 'Burnside Neutral by 2030' is informative about actions being taken by Council to help the environment. Different operational groups have been recorded in 'Burnside at Work' and the first two in the 'Our History' series are online for viewing. Seek help in the library if you have trouble connecting with these. My 'Burnside Highlights' continue fortnightly, and I was pleased to share a couple of these with the Combined Probus Club of Burnside when I joined them on their 12th birthday.

Finally, thank you for being positive, patient, responsible and resilient during the COVID lockdown. It caused some stress and pain for all and our businesses suffered. Many events and celebrations had to be cancelled, but we came through it. Get vaccinated and keep safe!

CEO's message

The approval of the Budget and Long Term Financial Plan will drive operations over the next 12 months. I am cognisant of the requirement to maintain the 118 services and at the same time reduce costs with a savings target of \$750,000. A number of new and renewed capital projects will be progressed despite the 0% increase in rates.

Council approved a wide range of Community Grants for individuals and groups within Burnside, covering health, art, education, sport, history, recreation, social and cultural projects. Your Neighbourhood Budget winners were voted by community members and soon you will have a new drinking fountain with a tap and dog bowl in Kensington Gardens, a shelter in Langman Reserve, a handrail for the steps in Michael Perry Reserve and a Little Library in Bell Yett Reserve (see story P 10). Both of these opportunities will be available again in 2022.

Construction works in Kensington Gardens Reserve south east corner redevelopment is progressing well and Kaurna artists have already begun to carve sculptures and seating from trees that needed to be felled for the wetland development. The tennis court retaining walls are being constructed, bridge and boardwalk structures are being placed and the path network will begin shortly. All the time the children attending 'Kindy in the Park' are genuinely engaged in these works.

In Magill, much is happening behind the scenes. Tenders are soon to be called for construction of the Magill Road Development and our Project Community Engagement Officer continues his consultation with the Magill Road traders. Traffic counters and car parking sensors have been installed and detailed investigations of underground service providers are being conducted.

The City Master Plan on Urban Form and Transport has been out for consultation for the past two months. Neighbouring councils and stakeholders have been consulted, such as State Government and other relevant organisations. Once the data has been collated, it will be brought to Council as a report with recommendations for their consideration. School students have also been invited to provide input into the City Master Plan.

Back in 2012, Council created a Recreation and Sport Strategy. This is currently being reviewed through a process of consultation and with our Strategic Plan 2030 in mind. Stage 1 involving engagement with Council-leased sporting and recreational organisations has commenced. Community Focus Groups, a Club Forum and further consultation with the community will occur in Stage 2.

A state-wide COVID lockdown meant closure of facilities in mid-July, but my amazing team worked tirelessly to ensure all essential services continued to support you, our valued community members. The City of Burnside continues to be proactive in its response to COVID-19 and supporting the State and Federal Government in their response to the pandemic.

Your Neighbourhood Budget

Your Neighbourhood Budget (YNB) is a participatory budgeting program where residents are able to suggest ideas for small capital assets and events to occur in their neighbourhood. The community can then vote on their favourite two projects that they would like to see implemented. This program provides one of many opportunities for the community to say how rates are spent as part of the annual business plan and budget. The winning Your Neighbourhood Budget projects for 2021/22, as voted by you, have been decided.

This year's program resulted in 24 submissions, with 12 of these projects assessed as eligible to proceed to the community voting stage. A total of 56 residents participated in the voting.

Based on the votes, the successful projects which will be implemented in 2021/22 are:

- Drinking fountain, Kensington Gardens Reserve, to improve hygiene. Taps and new water service from meter with backflow valve.
- Handrail, Michael Perry Reserve, at rear of Willowbridge Grove Stonyfell to improve safety.
- Little library, Bell Yett Reserve, maintained by local residents. To create a stronger sense of community and engagement and stimulate greater interest and reasons to be out and about in the community.
- Shelter, Langman Recreation Reserve, close to tennis courts, barbecue and water fountain.


Deborah Lindsay and her family have hosted or attended many birthday parties and social gatherings with school parents or neighbours in Langman Reserve over the years. "I suggested a shelter and seating as a great focus for the facilities already there, which could be used in various weather conditions," Deborah, of Burnside, says. "It feels good to know that your suggestion has been supported by both the community and Council."

Jim Muir lives next to Bell Yett Reserve and suggested the Little Library. "One of the key ideas behind the project is to build connections between people and give them another reason to be in touch with each other, extending the quality of community within the local area," Jim says.



Playground Recycling Content

Council is committed to reducing the amount of waste we send to landfill by encouraging re-use, repair and sharing. In line with this Council has used recycled content in the new W H Holmes playground. The rubber softfall underneath uses a lot of recycled product. This thick impact layer is 100 per cent recycled rubber predominantly made up of recycled truck tyres. The thinner top coloured layer is made up from 20 per cent black recycled tyre rubber also, with some non-recycled colour granules that will ensure the product keeps its vibrancy and looks good long-term.



Council's Reconciliation Action Plan

On Thursday 3 June City of Burnside's Reconciliation Working Group participated in a highly valuable workshop to commence the development of Council's first Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP).

It was an exciting day shared in partnership with Kaurna community representatives, Elected Members and Council staff. This day was chosen as it was the anniversary of the Mabo court decision and the last day of Reconciliation Week.

CEO Chris Cowley, Chair of the RAP, says the practical actions outlined in the City of Burnside's RAP will help build strong relationships with First Australians and develop a deeper understanding of the Traditional Owners of the area of the City of Burnside, the Kaurna People.

"It is a powerful tool that turns positive intentions into actions, builds trust and respect, lowers prejudice, and increases understanding between Indigenous and non-Indigenous Australians," Chris says. "The City of Burnside's RAP represents the Council's commitment to reconciliation and respect towards the Traditional Owners of the land."

"This workshop has set the foundation for what will be Council's commitment to practical actions that will drive our organisation's contribution to reconciliation both internally and in the communities in which we operate."

NAIDOC Week (4 – 11 July) celebrations highlighted the history, culture and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. "It is an opportunity to celebrate and learn more about the world's oldest living culture," Chris Cowley says.

"The 2021 theme Heal Country encourages Australians to embrace First Nation's cultural knowledge and Council participated in NAIDOC Week to celebrate and raise awareness of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander culture, heritage, knowledge and language."

As part of National Reconciliation Week (27 May – 3 June) Burnside Library events including Baby Chat, Toddler Tales and Storytime, had a special focus on Reconciliation and learning more about First Nations People as part of their regular programming. The Library hosted a colouring competition using the 'Colour for Reconciliation 2021' artwork by artist Jessica Johnson.

A screening was held at The Regal Theatre of the docu-film 'The Australian Dream' on Tuesday 1 June. It tells a powerful story about race, identity and belonging. Members of the Reconciliation Action Plan working group (mix of Elected Members, Council staff and Aboriginal community representatives) attended the Reconciliation SA breakfast at the Convention Centre.

Carvings in KGR

Artists from Aboriginal Contemporary Arts (ACA) have been engaged to create wooden carvings of items to display at KGR. They include a platypus, shield and interpretive signage.







Indigenous Employment Opportunities

RAWsa is partnering with Council and our contractor CAMCO SA to actively achieve employment outcomes for First Nations People across the Council's boundaries.

The Kensington Gardens Reserve Project has provided over 3,000 hours of indigenous workforce participation in the first six months of this project which equates into four full time positions working operationally on the ground. The Council has invested in a RAWsa employed, and Kaurna Yerta Aboriginal Corporation (KYAC) endorsed, Aboriginal Workforce Participation Officer (AWPO) position on the project as part of the commitment to reconciliation. The role of the AWPO is to maximise workforce participation opportunities for First Nations People.

Activation of the AWPO has provided the project with access to Kaurna community consultants engaged for community interaction workshops with local Kindergartens and other key stakeholder activities. It also supports the four Workplace Participation Program team members and maximises opportunities for additional Kaurna involvement in construction.

Community Grants 2021/22 awarded

Council recognises the local community sector plays a vital role in empowering people to have an active role in shaping their own future and achieving their aspirations.

Council is committed to the development of effective working partnerships with individuals, community groups and organisations in ensuring the City of Burnside has a resilient, happy, healthy and connected community.

Community Grants of up to \$5,000 were awarded to eligible community groups and organisations for the 2021/22 financial year.

Medieval Martial Arts & Craft Centre SA \$3k

Eastway Vikings Project will enable weekly meetings and demonstrations for members of the community interested in the 'Viking Age' (period of 9th-10th century). President Alex Foster says the grant means a lot to the group. "We want to bring like-minded people together to learn and have fun and this grant will help us to keep doing that," Alex says. "Everyone is here to learn and develop their skills through old crafts, and we have members with a wealth of knowledge in areas such as jewellery making, woodworking and leatherworking." Alex says the group performs at festivals and fairs across SA and interstate. "One day we would love to attend international events in Europe too. We really appreciate the support from the City of Burnside and we would love for more people to join us and get involved."

SA Mosaics \$1.28k

SA Mosaics received a grant for their Mosaic Art exhibition to be held at Pepper Street, from September 3 to 24, incorporating a full day at Glenunga Hub, which will include talks, a Q & A with a panel, and demonstration of tools, materials and techniques. Kristin Wohlers said the grant has helped tremendously as it covered the hire fee for Glenunga Hub and Pepper Street Arts Centre. "It allows people to come together and share ideas and information."

Eastern Suburbs Camera Club (ESCC) \$3.5k

ESCC secured a grant for a new projector for the club to use at fortnightly meetings (presentations and/or club competitions) as well as the annual inter-club competitions.

These two groups secured Quick Response Grants. These grants are intended to be a fast approval form of the Community Grants, capped at \$500 per application, focusing on positive ageing, youth, environment, sport and small equipment purchases.

Adelaide Marlins Little League Baseball Team

Theoh McWhinnie-Wong played in the team at the Australian Little League Championships in Lismore, NSW in June. The Marlins finished fourth, the highest result for the Team. A grant of \$500 paid for Theoh's uniform and contributed to his registration fees.



Play It On

Play it On is a social enterprise that provides funding to assist children from families that are financially challenged, to participate in their chosen sport by providing sports equipment, clothing and footwear. Founder and CEO Theresa Brown encourages sporting clubs to collect new or slightly used sports equipment at their clubrooms. To assist in the collection she approached The Shed to see if they could make some wooden boxes as a collection point.

Shed Coordinator Evan Reay said some of the men at The Shed built four custom made boxes with wheels using photos of similar boxes as a guide. The Shed are working on six more boxes.

Theresa said the \$500 grant from Council was crucial as they receive no other funds. The grant went to the cost of wheels for collection boxes and printing posters to place on the front. "We are also grateful to the sports associations, clubs, teams, businesses and shops who have donated sports gear, end of run clothes and footwear for Play it On to sell," Theresa said.

Goodbye winter, hello spring! After a wild, woolly, and wet winter we welcome the warmer weather and promises of spring.

We also acknowledge the pain endured by many in our community who have experienced the negative effects of the pandemic, with the significant impacts of the lockdown on families, schooling, business, Council and community life.

One of our highest priorities is the commitment to taking action on climate change. A major action to manage this – along with the expectations of our community – is the work to preserve and maintain our tree canopy.

Importantly, you will have noticed the Burnside tree planting program has continued in our streets and parks, as Council works to increase greening to counter the effects of tree losses across our suburbs resulting from storm activity, disease and increased urban development. Adding pressure to this loss is the increase in urban warming contributed to by the comparatively dramatic increase in grey cover due to larger house sizes and growth in dry, paved areas.

But we need your help. We recognise there are many benefits for maintaining birds and wildlife that additional tree and shrub plantings can make in your gardens and we have recently had great uptake of Council's Native Tree giveaway for local garden owners. We also encourage residents to plant lawn and/or shrubs on their verges, help water street trees and participate in our community gardens. Construction of the new Laurel Avenue Community Garden is well underway and available for all residents to participate in. Please register your interest with Council staff.

Earlier this year, the community was involved in providing feedback on the future use of The Regal Theatre site. Council has since approved the development of a master plan for this site and staff are currently working on consulting with performers, industry partners and bodies, and key hirers to determine current and future needs for the site. Future options for the site will then be developed into a draft plan which will be ready for consultation in early 2022.

We are also looking forward to development of the City Master Plan to manage future planning for residential development along with strategies for the existing and developing traffic and transport issues. Residents were given the opportunity in the middle of the year to provide feedback on 'trouble spots' within the City of Burnside and this information will assist staff to develop overall city strategies for managing the way that our residents move around the city.

A Marryatville Precinct Master Plan is also being explored to ensure that this area, with its interesting heritage, shops, cafes and park can be linked, revitalised and beautified, to improve residential safety and support business.

We are keeping a close watch on the traffic experienced in Beulah Park streets as the Portrush/Magill Road upgrade progresses. Work is also underway for the pedestrian activated crossing on Greenhill Road (adjacent Hazelwood Park) with the hope that work will be completed by October 2021.

City of Burnside has approved no increase in rates for the second consecutive year.

In 2020, zero increases were widespread throughout Local Government in recognition of COVID-19. This year, Burnside is one of only a handful of Councils not increasing its rates. Ratepayers should demand a third year of no increase in 2022/23. Rate adjustments are needed to do two things – balance the budget and pay off debt.

City of Burnside's debt has increased in recent years as we have taken opportunities to build quality infrastructure – eg Conyngham Street, Kensington Gardens – with the assistance of Federal and State funding. However, our debt is highly manageable. It is not an urgent requirement to draw from ratepayers, often managing their own debt, to pay Council debt.

Balancing the budget is the challenge. Costs of goods and services always increase to some extent, and sometimes significantly like waste disposal in recent years, balancing the budget without increasing rates requires either to stop providing services we value or provide them more efficiently.

City of Burnside is not wasteful in respect to costs. It is well-managed, able to respond to pressure points as they occur. Approval of no rate increase creates pressure to perform services slightly more efficiently and I am confident that they will achieve this goal. Without impacting services, Administration has commenced a process of identifying recurrent savings which will deliver savings this year and future years.

We can't hold rates forever but let's go for a three-peat in 2022/23.

My ward of Kensington Gardens and Magill will see huge changes in the year to come.

Works on the north east corner of Kensington Gardens Reserve (KGR) are well under way. Some 20,000 plants, an expanded wetland, barbecue facilities, playgrounds and nature play will see the biggest transformation of KGR in its history. The cricket and rugby clubrooms for KGR have also been approved for redevelopment with a detailed design approved by Council. A new shared facility has been approved with funding from both Council and the state government. I am hoping for federal support soon so that works can start.

The Penfold Park Master Plan has also been approved with many additions and improvements to commence this year, chief among which will be a new playground and irrigation to be installed under the open space (where the dogs run) which will keep the grass green all year round.

The last few weeks have seen significant rain in the Hills Face Zone which has resulted in what seems to be increased levels of silt flowing downstream. Upstream of course are the mines of Boral and White Rock Quarry. Cr Piggott and I are very aware of these issues and monitoring the situation and the effects on our ward. The Residents Against White Rock Quarry action group have been strong advocates which you can support and join.

It's been a huge year for my ward and I didn't even mention Magill Village which is also progressing well! I hope you have a great year and I look forward to seeing these great projects delivered.

2021/22 initiatives

A Regal Theatre Precinct Master Plan will be developed with community input to provide a strategic approach to future works and use.

Continuing the goal for carbon neutrality in 2030, two new eBikes will be purchased for staff to use to attend meetings rather than using cars; investment will continue in Smart Cities 2020 to collect data for the purpose of future decision making, asset management and the optimised use of resources.

The City Master Plan (Urban Form and Transport) will be completed to set out Council's future vision for development, urban form, and traffic and transport for the City of Burnside.

A new wetland and reconfigured tennis courts will be constructed as part of the Kensington Gardens Reserve Master Plan.

Traffic control devices will be installed in Verdale Avenue, Linden Park, to improve traffic management for local residents.

Construction of the Magill Village Redevelopment, comprising the revitalisation of the Village Heart, is scheduled to commence.

Upgrades to the Regal Theatre information technology will improve its internet access and connectivity to Council's operating systems.

Public amenities will be installed at Brock Reserve subject to community consultation.

A new Sport and Recreation Strategy will be developed, including a community consultation process.

New cycling infrastructure will see a wide, safe shared use path installed between Boucaut Street and the bottom of the South Eastern Freeway route, obviating the need for cyclists to cross the freeway at the current crossing point.

As part of the **Penfold Park Master Plan**, a new playground will be installed that features additional shade and seating.

Council will undertake an audit of all Council buildings and facilities to identify required modifications as a part of Council's Disability Access and Inclusion Plan (DAIP).

Construction of a new clubroom building for the Glenunga Tennis Club on Kingsley Avenue Reserve is almost complete.

A Pedestrian Actuated Crossing will be installed on Greenhill Road in the vicinity of Hazelwood Park.

Improvements will be made to the Bonvue Avenue and Lascelles Avenue road reserve including new lawns, shrubs and bench seating.

In Dulwich Avenue, traffic calming measures will be installed to ensure greater road safety.

An additional modular section for the popular pump track, #rideburnside, will be purchased.

A change room extension for the Old Collegians Rugby Club will see new female dedicated change rooms installed.

Restoration, rehabilitation and replanting of the indigenous species, along with installing a new irrigation system, will take place at the Linden Gardens Urban Biodiversity Reserve.

Electrification of the pool heating system will be undertaken to ensure the correct standard of heating at the George Bolton Swimming Centre, replacing the current gas boiler. The replacement will reduce Council's carbon footprint and is part of Council's commitment to become carbon neutral by 2030.

A new master plan for Bell Yett Reserve will be undertaken incorporating community consultation and landscape design.

100 years of ANZAC Lookout Upgrade. The project is to design and reinvigorate the ANZAC lookout which includes landscaping, tree stumps removal, irrigation, improved and more accessible pathways, lighting, and modern amenities.

Pool re-opens

"We are excited to welcome our community back to our beautiful outdoor pool and to see each other again," says Ben Grant, the Team Leader at the George Bolton Swimming Centre.

After the winter furlough and restrictions due to the pandemic in 2020, the pool will re-open on Saturday 25 September for the 2021/22 season to great excitement. "We've worked hard to put in place all the safety requirements and protocols," Ben says, "and we are so pleased to be re-opening."

Remember Watch Around Water and keep children safe at the pool.

With COVID-19 requiring the closure of the spa and steam area last year, the opportunity to thoroughly assess the state of the facilities was undertaken.

Extensive issues with plant, equipment and the buildings were discovered which would require upgrades to the value of \$770,000. In the last full year of use (2019/20 financial year) the spa and steam area was visited 3,079 times, this equates to 6.7 per cent of Burnside's residents visiting. The cost of safety requirements for this area is \$99,360 per year as a lifeguard is required to be present at all times when in use. With these costs in mind, and the need to minimise the financial strain on our community, the steam and spa area will close.

The savings from this closure will be invested to benefit the wider community with the electrification of the pool heating system to ensure the correct standard of heating at the George Bolton Swimming Centre, replacing the current gas boiler. The replacement will reduce Council's carbon footprint and is part of Council's commitment to become carbon neutral by 2030.
