The importance of placing food scraps in the green bin

Council provides kitchen caddies (pictured below) for each household. Kitchen caddies can sit on your kitchen counter or in a cupboard. They are used for collecting food waste.

Each household is also entitled to 150 compostable bags per financial year. Your free rolls are available for collection from the Burnside Civic Centre.

Each compostable bag fits neatly in the kitchen caddy. This system makes it easy to collect food waste.

Every few days, or when the compostable bags are full, place them into your green organics bin.

Bin placement

Bins should be placed 1 metre apart at kerbside by 6 am on your collection day or the night before.

Please remove bins from kerbside within 24 hours of being emptied.

Why place items in the right bins?

There are two important reasons to use these services correctly.

- Sending materials to landfill is expensive: Recycling costs 60 per cent less and composting is even cheaper.
- It is environmentally beneficial. Recycling saves resources and composting generates fewer greenhouse gas emissions than landfill.

So, it is important to prioritise recycling and composting when you can.

What goes in each bin?

Green organics bin:

- Food: fruit, vegetables, bread, meat, dairy, seafood, bones, shredded paper, pet waste, paper towels, pizza boxes, cardboard takeaway containers and tissues.
- Garden: garden clippings, twigs, leaves, lawn clippings and weeds.



Recycling bin:

 Clean paper, cardboard, rigid plastic containers, cans, tins, aluminium foil, glass bottles and jars.



Waste-to-landfill bin:

 Soft plastics like plastic bags and bread bags, old clothing, polystyrene foam, broken glass and nappies.



Electronic waste, hazardous waste or building materials must not be placed in any kerbside bins.



Other waste services

Hard Waste collection

Each household is entitled to one free collection of hard waste per financial year. Hard waste may include furniture, whitegoods and timber. Some items are not acceptable, like carpet rolls and bricks. A maximum of 2 cubic meters can be put out for collection. There may be a wait of up to 6 weeks from when you request a collection. Electronic waste

Any electrical item with a cord, battery or switch that is broken, irreparable or no longer useful is electronic waste. These items can be recycled and must not be placed in any household bins. For further information about e-waste disposal visit: burnside.sa.gov.au/E-Waste

Paint and household chemicals

These items can be dropped to a metropolitan hazardous waste depot for free. For further information, visit: burnside.sa.gov.au/Hazardous-Waste
